Welcome to a meeting of Prosser School District Board of Directors!

Your views and interest in education are important to us and to your schools. Whether your visit is for the purpose of bringing information to the board's attention, solving a problem, or simply to see what's going on, we hope you'll feel welcome and comfortable at this meeting. We also hope that you will leave with a better understanding of your school district and its board of directors.

How the Board Operates

As the board meeting progresses, you may notice that there is quick action on some items. This is because the board generally considers an issue for several meetings before taking action, and also because background materials on the various items are sent to members for their careful study prior to the meeting. Sometimes the board will approve a motion that encompasses many items. These items, grouped under the "consent" portion of the agenda, are considered routine. You'll be able to follow the action more carefully if you pick up a copy of the agenda that is available

About Board Meetings

Business meetings are held twice each month, usually on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays. The first meeting of the month is also a time for the various educational programs of the district to provide an educational presentation to the Board. These meetings begin at 7:00 p.m.

The board encourages input on all issues under discussion at the business meetings.

About Executive Sessions

The board may occasionally go into executive session, thus excluding the public and the news media from witnessing the discussion. You should know though, that the board will only discuss issues in executive session. It must, by law, take all actions in an open meeting. The law also limits what the board can legally discuss in executive session. These closed discussions may only concern litigation, personnel selection or evaluation, negotiations, complaints against an officer or staff member or real estate transactions where public disclosure would be damaging to individuals or the general welfare of the district. Before going into executive session, the board president must estimate the time the board will return to open session.

Study Sessions

Board Study Sessions are held by the board to address specific issues and to give the board an opportunity to have staff make presentations regarding specific areas of instruction or operation. Study sessions are open meetings and offer the community an opportunity to hear the issues being discussed. Study sessions follow the same protocols as regular board meetings for addressing the board with questions or concerns.

Addressing the Board

You may present a concern to the board during the time reserved for hearing public comment. If this is the case we ask that you:

- Prior to the start of the meeting, sign in, noting the topic you intend to address to the board.
- Come to the microphone and state your name.
- Do not reflect adversely on the political or economic view, ethnic background, character or motives of any individual.
- Do keep your comments concise, nonemotional and brief.

The board is interested in hearing your concerns and your compliments too. It's best to call the superintendent's office a

couple of days before the meeting. If this isn't possible, you can ask the board president to recognize you during the hearing section.

Board Hearings

The school board can be compared to a "court of last resort." If a concern cannot be solved by first talking with the teacher, principal, or appropriate district personnel, it may be forwarded to the board for hearing. Sometimes this hearing may be conducted in "executive session," meaning the public and the media are not in attendance.


About Your Board

Public schools are especially close to the communities they serve because they are governed by men and women selected from the community. These men and women - your school board; are volunteers who spend a great deal of time on the many details involved in providing quality education.

Board members serve four-year terms. They are required to file financial disclosure statements with the Washington State Public Disclosure Commission and must be registered voters of the school district

School board members attend meetings, keep communications open with other members of the community and represent the needs of the district before local, state and national representatives. They make critical decisions that have a direct impact on what children learn and how they learn it. However, a school board is a legal body and can only make decisions as a body.

You may notice that many of the decisions the board must make are not directly related to instruction. School board members are also responsible for keeping the buildings and grounds in good shape, balancing the budget, protecting the district's legal interests, and providing for long-range planning.

Board members present included Dr. Warren Barmore, Peggy Douglas, Bruce Matsumura and Andy Howe. Also present were Dr. Ray Tolcacher, Superintendent; Craig Reynolds, Business Manager; Deanna Flores, Assistant Superintendent; Julie Hyatt, Secretary; and an audience representing district staff, media and community members. The meeting was held at Keene-Riverview Elementary MPR.

INFORMATION ITEMS:

Minimum Basic Education Requirements Compliance

Deanna Flores reported that each year, school districts across the state of Washington complete the Minimum Basic Education Requirement Compliance form by reporting through the iGrants system online. Reporting on this form gives assurance to the State Board of Education that school districts are in compliance with the minimum requirements of the Basic Education Act. District compliance is checked to meet minimum requirements for entitlement to basic education allocation funds. These funds represent the largest portion of our school district revenues for any given academic year. This year, as in all previous years, the Prosser School District meets or exceeds all program requirements and is in full compliance with the Basic Education Act. The document was provided to the Board of Directors for information. Records are maintained in the district to support certification.

PROTOCOL FOR ADDRESSING BOARD:

Dr. Tolcacher read the protocol for addressing the board.

HEARING OF VISITORS:

Mikki Symonds – Mrs. Symonds said she had sent an email to the board, which she then provided Julie Hyatt for the official board file. She also provided a letter of support for the teachers, which had been signed by many community members.

Mikki said she was speaking on behalf of those who were too fearful to speak for themselves. She also said the teacher/district negotiations affect the entire community because Prosser is so small. We have lost 50 teachers already and it does not bode well for the future of education in Prosser. She is concerned that if teachers continue leaving, there may be a "brain drain", by families not having their children attend Prosser schools. This could even affect our local economy.

Walker Orr – A student, wanted to address the board about the pivotal experience he has had with the excellent teachers in Prosser. If we lose the vibrancy of effective teachers, it will affect the community. He asked the board to pay teachers a good wage so they'll stay in Prosser.

Miguel Orr - Is a PHS student who had received a letter of acceptance into the Honors

English class. He understands that class is now not being offered. He has heard that the class was cancelled as there wasn't a teacher to teach the class. Miguel asked if that teaching position had been posted. Miguel asked to have the issue explained as to why the class was cancelled.

Mr. Lusk said it was a curriculum issue, not a lack of a teacher.

Dr. Tolcacher said this topic will be brought back to the next board meeting for further discussion.

Dawn Steinmetz – an employee of Paterson School District spoke about the importance of her son, an incoming freshman at PHS, being in Honors English. He and several classmates worked hard to reach their goal of being in the Honors English class. He received a letter stating he was going to be in Honors English, but he, nor she was notified about the cancellation of the class. She saw it on Facebook. She wanted the board to know that many Paterson students who had planned to be in that class are very disappointed. She would like an explanation as to why the class was cancelled.

Laura Ripplinger – a parent, addressed the board about the Honors English class. She was very disappointed, as was her daughter about the cancellation of the class. They received a letter just a few days before the start of school – the cancellation seems so last minute. She said that not offering this class might even prevent her daughter from getting a scholarship.

Mrs. Ripplinger also said the teachers in Prosser work very hard and there needs to be a way to find the money to pay them. This is an embarrassment to Prosser. Regarding a new bond issue effort; she thinks there is a lot of distrust in the community and the board needs to possibly make a major change if the bond is too succeed.

Laurie Hawker – Her daughter has been a Paterson student for many years. She and her daughter were both very disappointed about the cancellation of the Honors English class. She thinks it sets a level of mediocrity for the school. These students strive very hard and urged the District to rethink the decision.

At the conclusion of the speakers, President Jenkin asked Dr. Tolcacher to bring this item back as a Discussion item at the next board meeting.

Assistant Superintendent's Report

Deanna Flores reported that she helped first and second graders find their classrooms this morning at Keene-Riverview Elementary.

Business Manager's Report No report

Superintendent's Report

Dr. Tolcacher reported that there were very few glitches today on the first day of school. Even with the change of not having a Back-to-School Night last evening, things still went well. Our enrollment is on target for what we had anticipated it to be. Dr. Tolcacher reported that we have every teaching position filled. There are only three school districts in Central Washington that are fully staffed – and one of those is Prosser.

Dr. Tolcacher reported to the audience that we are in the middle of collective bargaining with the teachers' union. He said the legislature has not done their job, by not fully funding education in Washington. The unrest that is happening in school districts across the state is not going away until the state does its job of funding education. He said that the District has had good conversations with the Association as we continue collective bargaining. He also thanked the teachers for being professional today at school.

Dr. Tolcacher reported on the flooring problem at KRV over the summer which has resulted in beautiful new floors.

Board Members' Reports

Dr. Warren Barmore reported that he attended the orientation and fall sports meeting last night at Housel Middle School. He enjoyed it very much.

Andy Howe reported he and Bill Jenkin had been involved in the Study and Survey Study Session which was held recently. He encouraged everyone in the audience to attend the next meeting.

Bruce Matsumura reported that he also attended the Study and Survey Study Session. He found it very informative. He encouraged those in the audience to come to board meetings regularly. He thinks it would further all of our cause to hear regularly from the community.

Peggy Douglas reported that she had been in a few classrooms earlier this week. She said the buildings looked great. She thanked everyone for the hard work getting the schools ready. She said the Study and Survey meeting was an eye opener, to let her see the needs of the District. She also encouraged others to attend the next meeting.

Bill Jenkin thanked those who are involved in negotiations for all of their hard work.

Student Representatives' Reports

Zebbie Castilleja reported that he had attended the orientation at HMS last night. Community, Involvement, Action (CIA) was also there, promoting their parenting program. Zebbie also reported on the Honors English program. He has heard from several students about the disappointment of dropping the Honors English class. He then read comments from students voicing their disappointment about the loss of this class as well as a general disappointment in the community of Prosser.

Tye Taylor reported that last week there were many FFA members showing their animals at the Benton-Franklin County fair. He thanked the board again for changing the start date of school to accommodate these students. There were five Grand Champions in Prosser FFA. Prosser Explorers were also present in the Benton County Sheriff's Office booth. They were teaching the public on when it is appropriate to call 911. Tye invited the board to the FFA Open House barbecue which will be held next Wednesday evening.

Juan Guerra said the renovations at the high school are looking great and students are

enjoying that. He also provided his own observation about our new student records system, Skyward. Juan said that half of his teachers really enjoy it and half are still trying to figure it out – but he thinks it is an improvement. He also reported that ASB is up and running and the Drama Club will meet tomorrow at lunch with their advisor, Mrs. Starr, who all the students love and enjoy.

Taylor Beightol said the football field looked great for Prosser Youth Football, which started Saturday. Because she is a Link Crew leader, Taylor was at school all day on Monday, preparing for Freshman Orientation. She is very grateful for this opportunity as it relieves a lot of anxiety of incoming freshmen. As our Unleashed correspondent, Taylor will be meeting next Wednesday with the rest of the correspondents. Her first article will be on the Prosser Balloon Rally.

Dr. Tolcacher provided a brief explanation of the Unleashed competition and how Prosser will be well represented by Taylor.

PERSONAL SERVICE AGREEMENTS:

1. 2015/2016 Larry Gregory Service Agreement:

Larry is the Hearing Officer for the Prosser School District. The service fee is \$225 per hearing plus mileage with funding provided through the General Fund. This agreement is for the 2015/2016 school year.

2. 2015/2016 Diana Larson Consultant Service Agreement:

In order to maintain district compliance with State and Federal guidelines, Special Services is asking to renew a previous contract with Diana Larson. Diana will provide supervision of SLPA (speech and language pathologist assistant) and SLP (speech and language pathologist) services, IEP writing and assessment. She will provide services at Housel Middle School and Prosser High School. She will work 2-3 days a week at a rate of \$70 per hour with funding provided through the Special Ed budget.

3. 2015/2016 Lourdes Health Network Professional Service Agreement:

Lourdes will provide education and therapy programs for students placed in the Children's Day Program of Lourdes Counseling Center. The rate is \$46 per hour for each student enrolled in the program each month.

4. Tears of Joy Service Agreement- Keene-Riverview Elementary;

Tears of Joy will perform a double performance of "When Animals Were People" on October 1, 2015. The cost of this double performance is \$800. Funding will be provided through the ASB budget.

5. <u>Tears of Joy Service Agreement- Whitstran Elementary:</u>

Tears of Joy will perform "When Animals Were People" on October 20, 2015. The cost of this performance is \$700. Funding will be provided through the ASB Budget.

Background:

On September 4, 2015 the District and PEA completed negotiations with a tentative agreement. The District was notified on September 7 that the PEA members ratified the contract. Some of the main provisions that have been agreed to are listed below:

1. The teacher evaluation system was modified and moved from a Memorandum of Understanding into contract language.

2. 2015-16 Wednesday Calendar and 2016-17 Student Calendar with school starting on August 30, 2016. In future years, school will always begin the week prior to Labor Day.

3. Longevity pay increase for members with 23 or more years of experience in the Prosser School District.

4. Additional paid days above the 180 day contract, which include Optional, Professional Development, Mandatory, and Time, Responsibility and Incentive (TRI)

2014-15 total extra paid days = 9 days 2015-16 total extra paid days = 14 days 2016-17 total extra paid days = 16 days

5. PEA members will be allowed to cash out up to three unused personal days at \$200 per day.

6. Contribution of an additional \$25 per employee per month in insurance benefits for 2015-16, plus an additional \$10 for 2016-17.

7. Staff developments funds increased from \$300 to \$350 per employee per year.

8. Increase of elementary planning time from 165 to 180 minutes in 2015-16 and further increased to 200 minutes per week in 2016-17.

9. The contract is for two years and will end on August 31, 2017.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors ratify the two (2) year collective bargaining agreement between the Prosser School District and the Prosser Education Association.

Background:

The District is in need of continuing to upgrade our transportation fleet. The purchase of three new school buses was included in the 2015-16 Transportation Vehicle Fund budget.

The first two will be a 2016 Blue Bird Front Engine Transit 78 passenger school bus. The price of this school bus is \$117,973.48 including sales tax. The third bus will be a 2016 Micro Bird, 12 + 2 passenger wheel chair lift bus. The price of this bus is \$73,637.74 including sales tax. This bus will be used to transport special needs students.

These buses were selected by using the state quote specifications, so no formal bid process was needed.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that Board of Directors approve the purchase of three buses as described above, out of the Transportation Vehicle Fund.

Background

The Prosser School District applied for and received \$56,295 in grant funding from the Office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) for emergency response. The district used this funding to upgrade the existing phone system and to implement the Rapid Responder Alert System Module. This upgrade provides location accuracy when dialing 911 and allows instant access to building floor plans maintained in Rapid Responder so that first responders can go to the specific location of the problem.

The projects have now been completed, and OSPI requires a board resolution that states the emergency response systems are installed at the intended school sites, are functioning as expected, and will be maintained in working order.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the Board of Directors of the Prosser School District adopt Resolution No. 08-15, OSPI Emergency Response Grant Acceptance as Complete.

<u>Agreement</u>

The 2015-16 budget included \$1,000 for a Prosser High School student to become a member of the Yakima Herald-Republic's "Unleashed" program. By signing an agreement with Educational Service District (ESD) 105, the district will become a full member of the "Unleashed" Cooperative. The agreement will be effective for the 2015-16 school year.

Meetings for student members are planned to occur twice a month during the school year and once a month during the summer. Training sessions and related learning experiences will be on journalism, communications and media ethics.

Recommendation:

It is recommended that the board of directors approve the "Unleashed" Cooperative Agreement.

"UNLEASHED" COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into by and between EDUCATIONAL SERVICE DISTRICT 105, hereinafter referred to as "ESD 105", and PROSSER SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 116 hereinafter referred to as "the District."

WHEREAS, ESD 105, under RCW 28A.310.200 provides services to school districts;

WHEREAS, the District desires to enter into a cooperative service agreement with ESD 105;

IT IS HEREBY AGREED that ESD 105 shall receive funds from the District and shall expend such funds for the purpose of providing the services of the Yakima Herald-Republic's "Unleashed" program through the "Unleashed" Cooperative ("Unleashed Co-op" hereinafter) in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth herein:

I. TERM OF AGREEMENT

This agreement shall be effective September 1, 2015 to August 31, 2016. This agreement shall be automatically renewed year to year for one-year periods beginning September 1, 2016, unless the participant serves written notice of its election to terminate this agreement by April 15 prior to the desired termination date. This Cooperative shall set a budget and determine service level at least 30 days prior to the date required for the termination notice.

2. MEMBERSHIP IN "UNLEASHED" COOPERATIVE

The District shall become a full member of the "Unleashed" Cooperative effective with the signing of this agreement. The "Unleashed" Cooperative shall make significant decisions on changes in the structure of the Co-op, and shall elect a five-member Executive Committee. Executive Committee members shall be elected for a two-year term and the terms shall be staggered to ensure continuity. The Executive Committee shall have the responsibility of advising the ESD on the operation and budget of the Cooperative.

3. "UNLEASHED" PROGRAM SERVICES

The ESD will provide the following services in support of the "Unleashed" program:

Selection of high school students from the pool of "Unleashed" Co-op member districts to serve on the "Unleashed" program's staff during the school year. Total number of staff members will be based on the program's overall funding. Students will be paid for each original article, photo, or graphic published under the Yakima Herald-Republic's "Unleashed" program. An "Unleashed" page devoted to student submissions will be published every other Sunday (and on sporadic occasions elsewhere in the newspaper)



throughout the academic year (26 total issues per year, not counting articles appearing elsewhere in the newspaper).

A contracted "Unleashed" coordinator who will manage the student staff, plan meetings for staff to be held twice a month during the school year (September-May) and once a month during the summer, assign stories, work with students in developing their material, edit all submissions, and provide recommendations on participants' grades to the high school counselor or a certified teacher as designated by the principal of the student's school. Coordinator would have the option to cancel a meeting at his or her discretion.

Meetings for student members planned to occur twice a month during the school year (September-May) and once a month during the summer. Food will be provided to students during these sessions.

Supplies for student staff members necessary for their "Unleashed" assignments.

Training sessions and related learning experiences for student staff members on journalism, communications, and media ethics.

Students will receive 1 graded high school credit for each year of participation in the Unleashed program.

4. DUTIES OF ESD 105

The following shall be the responsibilities of ESD 105:

- A. ESD 105 shall be responsible for hiring, supervising and evaluating all cooperative personnel.
- B. ESD 105 shall keep the Executive Committee apprised of issues affecting the cooperative.
- C. ESD 105 may dissolve the cooperative, when in the judgment of the ESD Superintendent, the cooperative cannot be managed effectively.

5. DUTIES OF THE DISTRICT

- A. District will participate in interviews of new staff as needed and requested by ESD 105.
- B. District will notify the ESD 105 Public Information Officer of any service delivery concerns.



C. District high school counselor or certified teacher as appointed by the high school principal will assign a grade for each participating student from the school, based on evaluation by Unleashed coordinator on the student's work.

6. COST TO THE DISTRICT

The cost to the District shall be the amount listed on Exhibit A, attached or as hereafter amended.

The costs are due and payable in advance.

The ESD shall assess an administrative fee equal to the amount allowed for indirect costs on state programs.

7. CONFIDENTIALITY

All materials furnished to the "Unleashed" Coop by the District pursuant to this agreement, including but not limited to, student data, reports and tests records shall remain the property of the District and shall not be disclosed to third parties except by written consent of the District. Student submissions published by the Yakima Herald-Republic shall remain the property of the Yakima Herald-Republic.

8. ACCESS TO PUBLIC RECORDS

No record of the District shall be made available for public inspection or copying by the "Unleashed" Co-op of ESD 105 without the express written authorization of the District. Requests pursuant to RCW 42.17 for inspection or copying of public records of the District, held or maintained by the "Unleashed" Co-op shall be referred to the District.

9. DISPUTES

Any dispute, claim or grievance arising out of or relating to the interpretation or application of this agreement shall be resolved between the Superintendent of the member District and the ESD 105 Superintendent. If this process fails to settle the situation, the dispute, claim or grievance shall be submitted to the ESD 105 Board of Directors for final resolution.

10. TERMINATION FOR BREACH

If either party fails to comply with the terms and conditions of this agreement, the other party, upon 30 days prior written notice to the breaching party may terminate this agreement.



11. INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT

This agreement shall be in addition to the authority vested in the parties pursuant to RCW 28A.310.200 and RCW 28A.320.080, be deemed to be in satisfaction of the provisions of RCW 39.34, and that this agreement shall be deemed a contract pursuant to RCW 39.34.080.

12. ASSIGNMENT

This agreement may not be assigned by either party without written consent of the parties.

13. WAIVER AND SEVERABILITY

No provision of this agreement, or the right to receive reasonable performance of any act called for by its terms, shall be deemed waived by a breach thereof as to a particular transaction or occurrence.

If any term or condition of this agreement or application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, such invalidity shall not affect other terms, conditions or applications, of the agreement which can be given effect without the invalid term, condition of application; to this end the terms and conditions of this agreement are declared severable.

The parties acknowledge that they have read and understood this agreement, including any supplements or attachments hereto, and do agree thereto in every particular. The parties further agree that this agreement, together with all appendices, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes all communications, written or oral, heretofore related to the subject matter of this agreement. The agreement may be modified or amended with the mutual consent of the parties.

"UNLEASHED" COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

PROGRAM COURSE DESCRIPTION

Yakima Herald-Republic Journalism Experience

Available as a cross-credited offering at the discretion of each participating school district in English, Fine Arts, or CTE, based on the participating student's area of emphasis in the program; assignment as a CTE credit must involve student work that meets the state's additional compliance requirements for this type of credit.

1 year, 1 credit (repeatable for each year of acceptance into program)

Prerequisite: Admission into program

This class gives students practical experience in becoming professionally published writers, photographers, and artists through the Unleashed student journalism program of The Yakima Herald-Republic. Student reporters will be given opportunities to develop their skills in writing columns, reviews, and feature stories. Student photographers will develop their skills in photojournalism and video editing. The program requires attendance at two group meetings held each month during the school year (September-May), during which instruction will be provided on additional areas of professional communications, such as Web-based media and broadcasting.
