Are you ready for an adventure that combines history, science, and the great outdoors? Look no further than the Washington Trust for Historic Preservation's Youth Heritage Project! This summer, join us at the Manhattan Project National Historical Park at the Hanford Site, a former plutonium production complex now engaged in the world's largest environmental cleanup.

Students will have the chance to learn about the contributions and perspectives of the Tribal Nations who have called this area home since time immemorial and the workers who helped build the world's first plutonium production facilities. They will explore the complex legacies of the project that ushered in the nuclear age and learn about the challenges that come with preserving cultural sites, historic districts and a National Historic Landmark sitting inside the boundaries of a federal Superfund site.

Learn about efforts to co-steward the stories of the Hanford Site this summer with experiential activities and new friends while giving back to the community through a project proposal at the conclusion of the jam-packed week. Come discover historic Hanford with us!
