Training Future First Responders

This fall, a couple of high school seniors and two community members are participating in EMT (Emergency Medical Technician) training at Kim School through an opportunity sponsored by the Kim Fire Department. The 110-hour class started on August 22nd, 2022, at no cost to the participants, thanks to the Care Forward Colorado Training Program. The classes are taught in 2-hour blocks on Monday through Thursday, along with extra hours required on some weekends.

Nikki Shannon, an EMT Intermediate, along with help from other EMTs and paramedics from other local area agencies, are teaching the onesemester course. The students will earn 12 credits through Trinidad State Junior College. This is equivalent to a full-time college schedule which is a massive undertaking for the students

who have additional high school classes as well as extracurricular activities. In addition, the students are required to complete 36 hours of clinical time with outside ambulance services and emergency departments. Upon completion of required clinical hours and skills testing, the students will take the National Registry Exam to earn EMT credentials.

Peyton Cranson and Cade Smith are the two Kim High School students who have chosen to take on this admirable task. When interviewed about the class, Peyton said, "It's like learning a second language. There is a lot of terminology to learn. It is the most

wanted to learn how to help. This training will help Peyton prepare for his chosen future career as a firefighter because EMT is a minimum requirement for most fire departments. He says he may even go as far as an advanced EMT or paramedic. Despite being challenging, the students say that it is a fun class. Community members John Robertson and Chellsie Bulkley are also taking this fall's 110-hour course.

Earlier this summer, Peyton and Cade took the Emergency Medical Responder (EMR) 56-hour class along with Kinton Shannon, Teagan Keeler, John Robertson, John Cranson, and Chellsie Bulkley.

The roles of the EMRs and EMTs vary somewhat. Emergency Medical Responders provide immediate

lifesaving care to critical patients who access the emergency medical services system. EMRs have the knowledge and skills necessary to provide immediate lifesaving interventions while awaiting additional Emergency Medical Service (EMS) resources to arrive. EMRs also assist higher-level personnel at the scene of emergencies and during transport. Emergency Medical Responders are a vital part of the comprehensive EMS response. Under medical oversight, Emergency Medical Responders perform basic interventions with minimal equipment. EMRs cannot transport via ambulance; they must wait for EMT/ Paramedics. Their scope of practice is more limited than EMT but should by no means be discounted. For a full, detailed explanation of the differences, you can see it on nremt.org.


Emergency Medical Technicians provide out-of-hospital emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients who access the emergency medical services (EMS) system. EMTs have the basic knowledge and skills necessary to stabilize and




safely transport patients ranging from non-emergency and routine medical transports to lifethreatening emergencies. Emergency Medical Technicians function as part of a comprehensive EMS response system under medical oversight. Emergency Medical Technicians perform interventions with the basic equipment typically found in an ambulance. Emergency Medical Technicians are a critical link between the scene of an emergency and the health care system.



The participants in this class have made a colossal time commitment and should be commended for their dedication to serving the Kim community. Nikki Shannon states, "I am very proud to see these young adults take the initiative to be able to help people in dire need and to be calm in high-stress situations." Upon completion of this certificate program and passing the NREMT requirements, these participants will be employable EMTs wherever they end up.



Layers of the Atmosphere Project


Left to right: Kaiden Gamez, John Tell Burnham, and Charli Wait. The students proudly stand in front of their hand-drawn poster of the atmosphere

Mrs. Nittler's third through fifth-grade class recently learned about the layers of the Earth's atmosphere. Her four students were each assigned to describe and draw a different layer of the atmosphere. First, John Tell Burnham covered the troposphere, the bottom or first layer of the atmosphere. The troposphere is the layer of the atmosphere where we live. The air we breathe is in this layer, along with all the weather the earth experiences. Next, Charli Wait studied the stratosphere. It is twenty-two miles thick and thirtyone miles from the Earth's surface. The stratosphere is the layer where planes and some migratory species pass through. An essential feature of the stratosphere is the ozone layer: a band of ozone gas that protects humanity from radiation from the sun. Next, Kaiden Gamez wrote about the mesosphere. The mesosphere exists thirty-one to fifty-one miles above our planet and protects the Earth from meteors and asteroids because the gasses in the mesosphere burn them up. In addition to burning up meteors, this layer also protects people from UV rays from the sun. Finally, Lylah Buhrow studied the thermosphere. The second to last layer of the atmosphere before reaching space. The thermosphere is the layer that produces the auroras and also where satellites orbit the Earth. It is 70 miles above the Earth and can reach temperatures of 4,500 degrees Fahrenheit! There's a reason it has "thermo" in the name! Good job on your project, and keep up the excellent work class!


