The regular meeting of the Twin Cedars Board of Directors was held on the above date.

President Kelly Carlson called the meeting to order at 5:00 PM. Directors Steve Gilkerson, Ashley Carlson, Brian Moore and Paul Haselhuhn were in attendance. Dave Roby and Kim Roby were also in attendance.

A motion was made by Director A.Carlson and supported by Director Gilkerson to approve the agenda as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

A motion was made by Director Haselhuhn and supported by Director Moore to approve the August 8, 2016, regular meeting minutes as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Financial reports were reviewed and filed for audit.

A motion was made by Director Moore and supported by Director A.Carlson to approve the bills as presented. The motion carried unanimously.

Communications

There was no communication to the board and no citizens in attendance.

Administration Reports

Mrs. Roby gave an update on summer school. 15 of the 27 students that completed the summer school program retained or gained in their words per minute. Research shows that on average a student loses one word per week over the summer. First round of FAST assessment is week of September 19. SIPT team reviewed data and set goals. We received our STEM grant materials. Beth Kelderman was trained last week as Reading Corp Internal Coach. Carrie Micetich and Ashley Schippers received additional training in 95% Group/Title I. Iowa Youth Survey for 6th, 8th, and 11th will occur week of October 17. Community Survey will occur week of October 24.

Mr. Roby said he has sent 2 groups of students to Jostens conferences. A younger group went to Fort Dodge and Seniors went to a Seniors only conference. This week is Homecoming week. He shared a letter that Twin Cedars received from the IHSAA. We had no ejections of coaches or players for the past year. Maria Moore was named Governor's Scholar. She was honored on May 1st. She named Kim Roby as her most influential teacher. There was discussion on the Activity Trip Policy. It was decided the policy is written as it was intended. Mr. Roby will inform coaches to uphold this policy.

Mr. VanderSluis shared the tentative enrollment numbers. As of today, we would have 12 more students than last year. He went thru the Unspent Balance Worksheet and explained the tax ramifications. The parking lot was discussed and was decided that Mr. VanderSluis will gather more information for a future meeting. New scoreboards are being installed at the softball, football and baseball fields.



<u>Directions</u>: Review the myths and facts about the FAST universal screening and progress monitoring assessments. Reflect on whether or not this information confirms or refutes your prior understanding of the FAST assessments.

Myth	Fact	Previous Understanding Confirm or Refute
1. FAST reading fluency is about asking students to read fast.	 ✓ FAST instructs students to do their BEST reading. If they speed read, the instructions are to start over. ✓ Asking students to read fast vs best is like shaking your wearable device. Your data may look better, but they aren't accurate! ✓ Fluency and automaticity in each underlying early literacy skill is a critical component to becoming a skilled reader. 	
2. FAST passages are too easy.	 ✓ Passages were written below the Lexile (readability) band that typically defines "grade level" material. ✓ Less difficult passages ensure a larger sample of reading behavior (i.e., teachers observe students reading more words). ✓ Automaticity of reading skills is most closely related to high frequency words, phrases, and patterns that are familiar to most read 	
3. FAST benchmarks are too high.	 ✓ FAST passages are highly-controlled and the benchmarks were set to predict reading outcomes. ✓ Every test you use has different targets. FAST is no different. ✓ Feel free to read a passage doing your "best" reading and time yourself for a minute if you doubt the benchmark. 	
4. Fluency passages are only for students who need a fluency intervention.	 ✓ Assessment is different than instruction. ✓ Fluency is still the best indicator we have for overall reading growth, regardless of the focus of instruction. ✓ Intervention should always be matched to the student's instructional need. ✓ Fluency is not an appropriate PM measure when a student has met the benchmark and is an accurate reader. 	
5. Students who score below target on Nonsense Word Fluency need a nonsense word intervention.	✓ Don't teach nonsense words! They are not a practical skill. We use them for assessment to really target the skill we ✓ want to know about (letter-sound decoding) This applies to each of the FAST assessments. We teach to the lowa Core NOT to the assessment!	
6. CBM does not directly measure comprehension.	 ✓ CBM-Reading does not provide a direct measure of reading comprehension. ✓ Automaticity is a prerequisite to reading comprehension by freeing up cognitive resources to focus on comprehension. ✓ CBM-R is highly predictive of outcomes on general reading 	1

That makes it a great progress monitoring tool! It's not intended to be the only skill taught, though, and is just the indicator that the instruction is or is not meeting the needs of the learner. ✓ It's akin to taking your temperature, or monitoring calorie intake. ✓ Fluency and comprehension have a reciprocal relationship 	
8.
