Madison High School

- The 44th Annual AMTNJ High School Math Contest will take place on January 19th. Students will have 45 minutes to complete 9 open-ended math problems covering material from prealgebra through precalculus. The top five scoring students will form the MHS team.
- Students in MHS' Honors Technology, Engineering, and Design Level III course placed third in the National Trans Options Hydrogen Fuel Cell Challenge by designing and constructing a prototype vehicle propelled using a zero-emissions hydrogen fuel cell drive system.

• The Seal of Biliteracy was administered to students on December 9th. 30 students were tested in Spanish, 14 in French, 13 in Italian, and 4 in Chinese. The Seal of Biliteracy is an NJDOE initiative that seeks to encourage students to study languages, certify attainment of biliteracy, provide employers with a method of identifying people with language and biliteracy skills, provide universities with a method to recognize and award academic credit to applicants seeking admission, prepare students with 21st century skills, recognize and promote second language instruction in public schools, strengthen intergroup relationships, affirm the value of diversity, and honor the multiple cultures and language of a community.

MHS Guidance

- The MHS Guidance Department has processed 2,001 college applications to date. Some of the amazing acceptances for students include Yale University, Brown University, The College of New Jersey, Wake Forest University, Northeastern University, American University, Southern Connecticut State University, Providence College, Centenary University, Colgate University, and Mount Holyoke College.
- The Guidance Department will be hosting 11th Grade Information Night on January 19th and will hold a 10th Grade Information Night on February 16th.

Michael was originally nominated as the MHS representative for his selfless commitment to his community, school, and teammates. Madison Junior School

- In honor and remembrance of Martin Luther King, Jr., activities were conducted school-wide and in the classrooms. The Conflict Resolution Club created a wall mural centered on giving back to the Madison community. Students are posting what they are doing for others and our community in honor of this special day. Students also designed morning announcements to share the work of Dr. King. Sixth grade is integrating the learning of MLK day into their interdisciplinary civil rights unit and are reading the novel *Watsons Go To Birmingham*. Social studies units on civil rights will enrich this novel, and students will also be studying the *I Have A Dream* speech and taking this background knowledge into their historical fiction literature circles in English class. Seventh-grade classes will be defining and exploring ideas of prejudice and discrimination as they read passages surrounding civil rights and Rosa Parks. Eighth grade students will be making connections between MLK and Gandhi and analyzing the work and impacts of both leaders. MJS celebrated MLK through an advisory lesson where students learned about the importance of listening to others, compassion, and empathy.
- Tryouts for the MJS Spring Musical *Into The Woods, Jr.* took place at the end of December and the first weeks of January. The show is scheduled to be performed the first weekend in March. Director Mrs. Layman and Assistant Director Ms. Jordan are excited to work with students on this performance!
