Management Discussion and Analysis

Year Ended June 30, 2021

This section of Bering Strait School District's annual financial report presents its discussion and analysis of the District's financial performance during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021. Please read it in conjunction with the District's financial statements, which immediately follow this section.

Financial Highlights

- The assets and deferred outflows of resources of the Bering Strait School District exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources at the end of the fiscal year by \$192,607,269 in FY21 compared to \$190,496,841 in FY20 (net position). This increase of \$2,110,428 is a result of a decrease in unfunded net pension liability along with a decrease in current liabilities.
- In total, net position increased by \$ 2,110,426 compared to a prior year increase of \$17,269,479. This increase is the result of the decrease in unfunded net pension liability and a decrease in current liabilities. All activities in this district are governmental activities. There were no business activities in 2021 or 2020..
- Total general revenues accounted for \$60,285,661(80 percent) of all revenues in FY21, compared to \$63,032,855 (73 percent) in FY20. This decrease is primarily due to decreases in investment income. Charges for services accounted for \$ 1,561,423 in FY21 and \$1,478,250 in FY20, which is approximately 2 percent of total revenues. Program specific revenues in the form of grants and contributions accounted for \$14,342,226, or 19 percent of total revenues of \$75,313,162 in FY21. Program specific revenues in the form of grants and contributions accounted for \$9,727,576 or 11 percent of total revenues of \$86,138,267 in FY20.

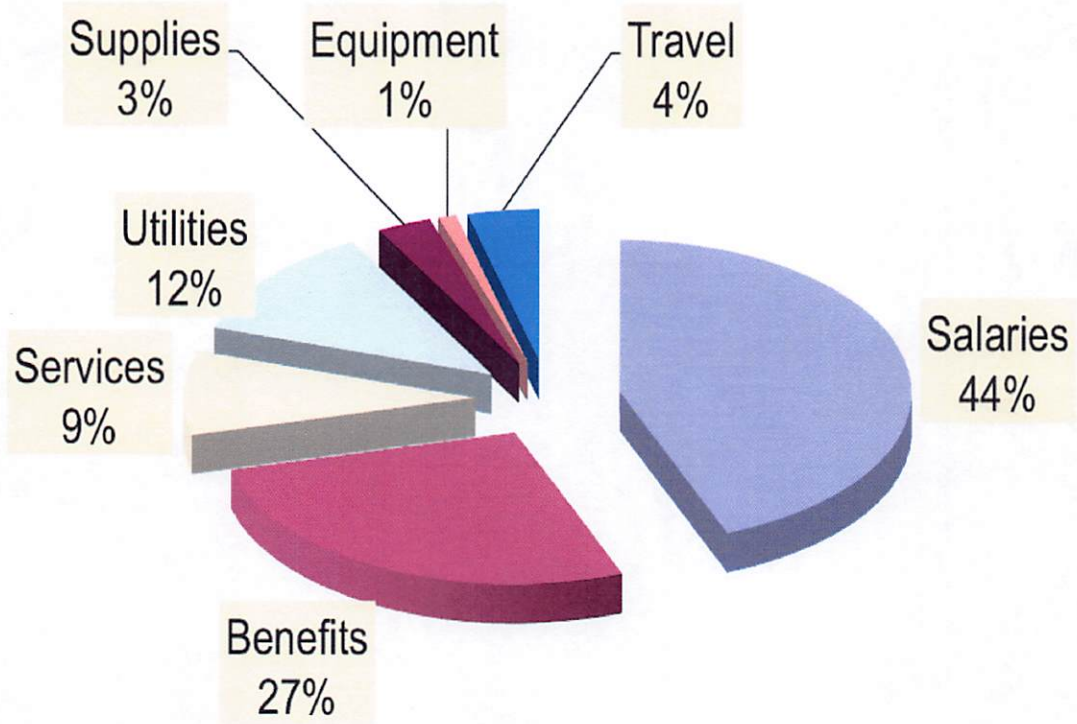

2020 - Covid Session

- Legislature recessed March 28
- Emergency mode – ministerial duties to allow the state to receive and expend CARES ACT, American Recovery ACT and other federal grant awards to states necessary to address the pandemic
- Frustration develops between the balance of power between the executive and legislative branches

2020 Election & Impact

- August Primary - sets the tone
 - 2 experienced Senators & 3 experienced House members bounced in the primary election
- November General
 - House unable to organize well into the 2021 session
 - Senate shapes up with high hopes but the situation deteriorates
- Operationally, very thin margins translate to very light capacity, limited agenda

2021 Regular Session

- Covid and Budgets take center stage
- No public access to the Capitol Building
- Budget brings the process to a grind
 - Revenues are relatively flat
 - Little appetite for deep spending cuts
 - Investment market boosts savings accounts
 - Administration insists upon large dividend
 - Political camps further divided and dug-in

Special Session (x4)

- Summarizing – very little constructive gained
 - FY2022 budget delivered
 - Governor rejects – characterizes it as ‘defective’
 - Second Special Session restores vetoed elements for the most part
 - No $\frac{3}{4}$ vote; PCE endangered, court ruling provides relief
- Third & Fourth Special Session focus primarily on fiscal matters; i.e., dividend, overdraws, new revenues, etc.
- 217 days in session 2021 – a new state record

Legislative – Executive Relationship

- Overall high level of fatigue
- Fracture lines have been wedged further apart
- 2022 Electioneering already underway
- Trust between the branches is at all time low
- Covid has not retreated, Alaska is lagging
- No shuttle diplomacy visible
- Unsettled scores certain to play out next year

Relations within the Legislature

- Surprisingly is the situation within the Senate
 - 13-7 now more like 6-7-7 – is there a ruling majority?
 - Deeply divided on numerous issues, including Covid-19
- House majority operates on razor thin margins (21-19)
 - Relationships not as bad but clearly divided
 - Some risks but perhaps the House can muster through the regular session with light agenda

FY2023 Budget Outlook

- Perhaps there is reason for optimism
 - Oil price and volumes are steady and +
 - Could provide additional unencumbered general fund for delayed capital spending
 - Investment markets are performing well, this could impact PERS/TRS unfunded liabilities
 - Additional consideration for extended flat funding in formula programs; i.e. foundation formula
 - Additional available revenues could translate to smoother relations and more productive session

Redistricting & 2022 Election

- 2020 US Census released
- Rural Coastal Alaska population outpaced state growth
- Mat-Su will gain House seat without doubt
- Redistricting maps will be finalized November 10; likely court challenge to follow, 2022 election use new election boundary maps
- Ranked Choice Voting – see demonstration

Notes:

- HB100 – Extends TVEP Program June 30, 2024
 - NACTEC receives \$400,000+ annually
- Second Regular Session convenes January 18, 2022
- Adjourns May 18, 2022 (121st day)
- Election filing deadline – June 1, 2022
- Primary election – August 16, 2022
- General election – November 8, 2022
- Voters in the General Election will be asked to consider whether Alaska should hold a Constitutional Convention – Yes or No.
