Watervliet Public Schools is blessed to serve a supportive community where families want to live and where the school system has served as a central hub of learning, growth, and community pride. Alumni of our schools have found incredible success in all walks of life: legal, medical, finance, business, scholarship, entertainment, athletics, and many more. And over the years our Panther Pride has shined brightly.

In 2020, the Board of Education set out to define the next step in the district's evolution in the pursuit of excellence. With the help of educational and community leaders, the Board established a new strategic plan that includes the following four goals:

Goal One: Watervliet Public Schools will be an innovative leader in high-quality teaching and learning.

Goal Two: Watervliet Public Schools will lead with exceptional extra-curricular programming that develops well-

rounded leaders.

Goal Three: Watervliet Public Schools will develop deep collaborative partnerships with our school community. **Goal Four:**

Watervliet Public Schools will develop and support the infrastructure necessary to implement our

strategic plan and realize our vision.

Several targets and strategies have already been realized, relative to these goals. They include:

> Stadium. We have secured grants to improve our building security in all school buildings. And, we have developed a Master Facilities Plan and are asking the voters to consider a bond issue to fund critical

elements of that plan.

Key Information About the Upcoming Bond Proposal

On May 2, 2023, Watervliet Public Schools voters will consider a bond proposal to repair and improve facilities at all Watervliet Public Schools campuses. If approved, this proposal will provide \$29.9 million for projects identified as "high priority" in the recently updated Master Plan for Facilities. This bond proposal builds on the work completed in the 2014 bond program.

What is a bond proposal and how can bond proceeds be spent?

A bond proposal is how a public school can ask its voters for authorization to borrow money and levy taxes to pay for large capital improvements. Voter-approved funds may be spent on items like new construction, additions, remodeling, site improvements, athletic facilities, playgrounds, furnishings, and equipment. Funds raised through the sale of bonds cannot be used to pay for employee salaries and benefits, textbooks, or other operational expenses.

What are the key areas of this proposal?

This bond proposal focuses on three key areas: Safety and Security; Improvements to Aging Facilities; Improved Educational Programming and Learning Environments.

What will the proceeds from this bond proposal be used for?

Safety and Security Needs:

- Secure building entrance at Watervliet Middle School
- Classroom door hardware upgrades for improved security
- New internal security doors to isolate security threats inside buildings
- Redesign and replace the parking lot at the HS campus to improve safety and traffic flow

Improvements to Aging Buildings:

- Restroom remodeling in all buildings, improving access by bringing all restrooms in compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA).
- Mechanical upgrades, including water heater replacement in all buildings
- New classroom spaces for the W.A.Y. program, replacing the deteriorating portables where the program is currently housed.
- Resurfacing the track; constructing new concessions, restroom, and storage facilities at Panther Stadium

<u>Improved Educational Programming and Learning Environments:</u>

- Addition of STEM classrooms and programs at both elementary buildings; Addition of STEM/Robotics classroom and programming at the Middle/High School building
- Addition of a cafeteria at the Middle School
- Construction of an auxiliary gym and weight room at the HS campus
- Science lab renovations and improvements
- Selective furniture replacements

How much will this bond proposal cost a homeowner?

If approved, the debt tax rate for 2023 will increase by 1.2 mills over the 2022 tax rate. This amounts to approximately a \$5 per month increase for every \$100,000 of the assessed value of a property.

Individual property owners can see the estimated impact on their property taxes by using the "tax calculator" on the district website (https://bit.ly/402rqrY). Please use your "taxable value" and your voting jurisdiction when utilizing this tool.





If approved by voters, it is projected the debt tax rate for 2023 would increase by 1.2 mills over the 2022 detax rate. Generally, for an owner of a \$100,000 assessed market-value home (\$50,000 taxable value), this net increase equals approximately \$5.00 more per morth in 2023 compared to the 2022 debt tax rate.

What got completed in the last bond proposal and how is that different from this proposal?

Many folks have asked if everything that was proposed in the 2014 bond program was completed and why this program is needed. Following the blueprint from the 2010 Facilities Study, a Master Plan was developed in 2014. Many priority needs from the 2010 study were addressed in that plan, but many were also not able to be addressed at that time. This table outlines the two plans and how they fit together to address important priorities from the 2010 study and the 2022 update of that study.

2010 Master Plan

Long Term Facilities Project Identification

In 2010 the district began to study school buildings and sites. Things like roofing, paving, electrical and mecanical systems, safety and security, and educational programs were assessed.

Phase 1 of the Master Plan was the 2014 bond, which took care of many critical issues, there are still core infrastructure systems that have outlived their expected life cycles.

The Master Plan was updated in 2022 to identify the projects completed and understand the status of previously identified issues.

Phase 2 of the Master Plan is the 2023 bond proposal which would address the remaining identified issues, and also enhance educational programming & learning environments.



Isbrecht, Donna Jewell, and Vicki Pletz for their dedication to the students and North School. Best wishes to you in your retirement!




MIDDLE SCHOOL MATTERS



More About Canvas (LMS) Learning Management System

In the fall of 2022, the middle and high schools rolled out an "LMS" called Canvas. LMS is the abbreviation for learning management system. It serves as a platform where teachers can post assignments, create discussion boards, and upload content like slide presentations and instructional videos. For students, Canvas creates a one stop shop to see assignment details, due dates, and learning resources for all their courses. At teachers' discretion, students are also able to submit assignments through Canvas.

The adoption of the Canvas Learning Management System represents a significant shift in the access parents have to monitor class resources, assignments, and student submissions. It is imperative that we have one place where parents can go to monitor their student's courses.

While there are numerous benefits for parents, WPS decided to adopt Canvas because it's a tool that is going to help improve student achievement. Students will always have access to course assignments and due dates.

What does Canvas do for parents?

Canvas gives parents an everyday overview of their student's learning interactions including calendars, assignments, student submissions, and class resources. As a parent, not only will you be able to see assignment details like due date, instructions, and requirements, you can also customize your notifications so you will be alerted when new assignments are posted.

In the fall of 2023, we hope to roll out further features to the middle and high schools and also introduce some content features to our elementary schools.

We have received nothing but positive feedback from students and parents and will continue to monitor the integration progress of our LMS into our learning culture at Watervliet P.S.

The importance of state assessments

Each spring, our students in grades 3-11 will take state assessments to measure their learning progress. These assessments are important for the schools to celebrate learning successes through the school year. Additionally, schools make vital decisions regarding students using the results of those state assessments. Some of those decisions include additional support during the school day for struggling students, additional opportunities to explore for students who excel, and goal setting for students and buildings.

Additionally, the SAT brings opportunities for students post graduation. The PSAT in 8-10th grades allow students and parents to gauge where improvements need to happen in order for the student to be successful on the SAT. Once successful on the SAT, colleges weigh those scores for admission. Some colleges and universities even award scholarships including "full rides" if students score above a certain level.

What can parents do?

- Communicate the importance of these state assessments to your child.
- Encourage your child to do well and to give their all on test day.
- Be sure to allow them plenty of rest the night before the test.
- Make sure they have a good breakfast on test day before going to school.
- Celebrate after the test if they gave their all on it.

We are always excited to partner with parents to help encourage our students to perform at their highest level, and we can't wait to celebrate our students' success!

Watervliet Relays Celebrates 50th Year



On Friday, April 21, 2023, teams from all over southwest Michigan will be competing for the prestigious title of the buth Annual Watervliet Relays Champion. The Watervliet Relays stands as one of the oldest annual track meets in the state. Former track coaches Gene Bednarowski, Ron Farac, and Geof Geisler were some of those instrumental in the success, popularity, and longevity of the event.

The meet began with boys races in 1972 and has been an annual event except for 1994 when a new track was being installed and 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Hartford was the first every Watervliet Relays Champion. Girls Relays were added in 1984 and Cassopolis took home the first girls championship. Holding current championship status are Berrien Springs for both the Boys and Girls. We are looking forward to seeing who will earn the titles in 2023.

At least 12 schools will participate in this year's event. Each year it is exciting to see which Relays records will be broken. Some of the longest standing records are in the boys 4x800 (won by Watervliet in 1974) and the 4x400 (Decatur, 1977). For the girls, long-standing records include the long jump (Covert, 1984), shot put (Marcellus, 1985), 4x200 (Cassopolis 1985) and Panther Relay (Cassopolis 1985).

Current event organizers and Watervliet track coaches Greg Grear and Aaron Weber are planning some special things for this year's 50th anniversary event and invite any alumni Relay participants or volunteers to come out to be part of the 50th running celebration.
