Richwood High School Memorial Walking Trail

In accordance with Stipulation I.C.2 of the Memorandum of Agreement Among the Federal Emergency Management Agency, West Virginia Historic Preservation Officer, the West Virginia Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management [now West Virginia Emergency Management Division], School Building Authority of West Virginia, and the Nicholas County Board of Education Regarding the Demolition of Richwood High School, Richwood, Nicholas County, West Virginia (MOA), a walking trail with memorial signage and benches has been designed for a portion of the former Richwood High School and Middle School property, located at 1 Valley Avenue, Richwood.

The signatories of the MOA are requesting public comment on the design of the walking trail. RICHWOOD HIGH SCHOOL MEMORIAL WALKING TRAIL

Welcome to the Richwood High School
Memorial Walking Trail. Along this trail you
will learn some of the rich history of this
location and the school that occupied these
grounds on the banks of the Cherry River.

The Richwood High School Memorial Walking Trail was built to honor the former Richwood High School building which was significantly damaged by a devastating flood on June 23, 2016. The building was later demolished.

The citizens of Richwood wished to commemorate their alma mater that stood proud for over 50 years, by building a walking trail on the former school grounds.

This trail features four different informational signs along the path that pay tribute to various aspects of the former Richwood High School building.

The locally sourced wooden bases of each sign pay respect to the City of Richwood's storied history in the lumber industry, and the beginnings of the Richwood school system in buildings furnished by the Cherry River Boom & Lumber Company.

THE HISTORY OF RICHWOOD HIGH SCHOOL




Richwood High School's roots extend to the beginning of the 1900's and are deeply connected to the lumber industry. The building for the first school in Richwood was donated in 1901 by the Cherry River Boom & Lumber Company. In 1903, a series of buildings on Walnut Street, became known as the Hillside Academy (shown on the right).

The original Richwood High School (middle photo) was constructed in 1917 and could accommodate up to 500 students. It served as the nucleus of learning in Richwood for nearly 50 years. However, by 1959, RHS's enrollment had ballooned to approximately 1,000 students. Voters approved a special levy to fund construction of a new high school in 1960. By 1961, the science wing was completed, providing ten new classrooms to be used for Physics, Biology, Chemistry, English, Science, Civics, and Spanish.

The second wing of the building was completed in January of 1965. This wing contained sixteen classrooms that were used for English, Mathematics, History, and Shorthand. It also housed the Home Economics Department, the Commercial Department, and two faculty lounges. Another addition was completed in January, 1968. After two years of traveling between buildings for classes, the school was united under one roof.







FAST FACTS

- Cherry River Boom & Lumber Company donated the building for Richwood's first school in 1901.
- The West Virginia Legislature created the Richwood Independent School District in 1903.
- Richwood High School was first constructed in 1917.
- A new building, designed by Emory Mick, was constructed in 1981.
- Over the years, four additions were added to the 'new' Richwood High School

HISTORY OF THE MARCHING BAND Richwood High School is also home to the Lumberjack Express Band. The band has made many appearances in parades, festivals, and events throughout the United States and Canada. The members have performed at Walt Disney World, Niagara Falls, Ontario, the Kentucky Derby, the Coca-Cola 600, the Indianapolis 500, and the Shenandoah Apple Blossom Festival in Winchester, Virginia, to name a few. The band has been featured on regional and national television during these events, where they have also won numerous awards. Also, the Richwood band has performed in many large stadiums, presenting pre-game shows for the Atlanta Braves, Cincinnati Reds, Philadelphia Phillies, Washington Nationals, and Pittsburgh Pirates. The band has also received Superior ratings for its marching and concert performances at the West **Virginia Secondary Schools Activities** Commission's regional band festival.

WAGON WHEEL AT STAKE TONIGHT

RICHWOOD, Oct. 1 - The Richwood Lumberjacks play the Cowen Bulldogs on the RHS athletic field, this Friday at 8 p.m., in the first home game of the season.

A large crowd is expected to see if the Lumberjacks can make if four in a row and regain the coveted Wagon Wheel lost to Cowen in 1952, 14-13. The Richwood High school band will present a half-time program, after its return from the Forest Festival at Elkins.

For the years from 1948 through 1951 the Lumberjacks retained the trophy. Oct. 26 Richwood defeated Cowen 38-6. Oct. 27, 1950, 25-0. Nov. 11, 1949, 26-7. and Nov. 12, 1948. 45-0. Cowen defeated Richwood in 1946, 13-6, and 1947, 21-0.

The Wagon Wheel contest was begun in the 1930's. If was promoted as an interfown rivalry by John "Bugs" Teets, then editor of the Nicholas Republican. He also originated the Spud and Splinter Festival.

In 1938 the game was played on Thanksglving, in eight inches of snow. The late Frank Montrose was one of the stars that day, with the game ending in a scoreless tie.

The Wagon Wheel Tradition was started in 1937 by John "Bugs" Teets, Editor of the Nicholas Republican Newspaper. It was a football tradition between Richwood High School and Cowen High School. The winner of the "Wheel" displayed it at the winning school. The winner kept the wheel until the next football game between the two teams.


The lumberjack, "Big Luke," is a tribute to the company that supported the very first school in Richwood, the Cherry River Boom & Lumber Company. In 1901, the company donated a box car to serve as the first school, adding a porch and flag pole to make it a more permanent fixture. It even supplied fuel for the potbellied stove that warmed the building. Due to its overwhelming support for the students of Richwood, the RHS mascot will always be a lumberjack.






"Big Luke" has faithfully stood watch over Richwood football games for more than 40 years. He was originally produced in the mid 1960's as a mascot for the Lombard Chainsaw Company. During Homecoming of 1977, one of the fourteen-foot statues was purchased and placed at Richwood High School's Dean Memorial Field.


In February of 2019, a wind storm blew Big Luke from his perch, causing extensive structural damage. Several members of the Overbaugh family received permission from the Nicholas County Board of Education to make the necessary repairs with materials purchased by the Board. The project was completed in secrecy, and Big Luke was unveiled as a surprise to the community. THE MIGHTY LUMBERJACK was returned to his home at Dean Memorial Field during Homecoming 2019.

Only seventeen of the fourteen-foot versions of Big Luke are known to exist in the United States.








