
Howard ('45) and Irene (Banke '46) Wilbert Family

Why did you choose to send your children to St. Mary's Colgan Catholic Schools?

From our Pastor







The Three Tabernacles

In June of 1949, newly appointed pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes, Rev. Alex Stremel, announced plans to build three new buildings, a rectory, a gym and a convent. After three weeks as pastor, this was part of Fr. Stremel's message to the congregation. "The question is: when are the three tabernacles to be erected? We would like to build all three this summer and have it all over with. This can be done if everyone in the parish will do his or her part. All of you without doubt realize that all three are needed. Our rectory is an eye sore, we all admit; the Sister's house is too small; and the gym is needed the worst way to provide more classrooms. My dear friends, therefore let us pray that the three tabernacles will become a reality in the near future." By the end of 1952, all three were built.

The Rectory

The new rectory was built to accommodate four priests and was completed in 90 days at the cost of \$65,000. Twelve hundred people attended the open house on October 16, 1949. The Rectory served the parish well and was replaced in 2010.

The Gym

The new gym was to be known as the Monsignor McCullough Memorial Gym, in honor of the late and longtime pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes. The cost of the gym was \$150,000 and was used for the first time on December 7, 1950. Although not the primary gym on campus, the McCullough Gym is still used today.

The Convent

The bid for the convent of \$69,000 was paid for by the Towner families. The furnishings, which totaled \$30,000, were paid for by the McNally family. The convent was built with 17 private rooms. The Sisters of St. Joseph moved in in September of 1952. In 2008, after 113 years of service to our parish and school, the last of the Sisters of St. Joseph returned to the motherhouse in Wichita. In 2010, the chapel of the convent was converted into Christ the King Adoration chapel which has adoration continuously Monday through Friday. Beginning in 2018 IHM Sisters began teaching at St. Mary's Colgan schools and living in the convent.

Susie (Walker) Edwards ('77)



Living the Stewardship Way of Life

Featuring Tom Compton

The Diocese of Wichita defines stewardship as **the grateful response of a Christian disciple who recognizes and receives God's gifts and shares these gifts in love of God and neighbor.** Tom Compton ('70) has taken his God given gifts of teaching and counseling and shared them with the students of St. Mary's Colgan schools. But it took some patience.

Tom's life motto could be "How can I serve St. Mary's Colgan?" For the past 40 years, that is what Tom has done. Mr. Compton recently shared how it all started and what he does today.

Tom's first foray into school at St. Mary's was less than perfect. Tom's Dad became interested in the Catholic faith and, after taking instructions, the entire family was baptized. Monsignor Stremel approached Tom's parents saying that they should send their children to St. Mary's. Tom is the oldest of eight children and was in the second grade. When the first day of school rolled around, Tom's Dad dropped him off outside of the school and left. Tom climbed up the east steps of the elementary school and looked in through the little skinny windows of the big white doors. It looked dark inside so he waited for someone to open the doors. After what seemed like an eternity to a sixyear-old, he decided it must not have been the first day. Tom walked home - all the way to the edge of PSU campus. He even stopped near the old train depot on Joplin street to eat his lunch, even though it was still morning. His mother was guite surprised when Tom walked in the door. When his Dad came home for lunch. Tom was taken back to school and

this time his dad walked him all the way in to the second-grade classroom. Tom kept coming back and graduated with the class of 1970.

Tom graduated from PSU with his bachelor's degree in education in 1974 majoring in History with a minor in Philosophy. "I liked to learn, so I planned to get my Masters. I ran into Pat Forbes at coffee and donuts at the Newman Center and he asked if I could teach two hours of history the next year." That fit nicely in his plan and gave Tom his first taste of teaching. "Some of those kids that I taught as juniors in high school that year, now have grandkids in the school," Tom laughed. Tom then took a job teaching in Neosho, MO. After a couple years in Neosho, Tom and Sharon moved their family back to Pittsburg and Tom worked for Moore's furniture store. But Tom could not shake the need he felt to be in the classroom. He applied unsuccessfully for a few jobs, but with the desire of raising their girls near grandparents in Pittsburg, the options seemed limited. So, Tom turned to God. "In 1983, I distinctly remember," Tom said. "after receiving communion, I prayed 'OK God, I am going to try one more fall for a teaching job and if I don't get it I'm going to take that as a sign from You that I'm to do something else." He then asked St. Mary's Elementary principal Sister Elizabeth Ann about an open 7th grade position, but it was already filled. Sister told Tom to leave his resume. A few weeks later, Tom received a call from St. Mary's School Board member Melva Wilbert, who happened to work in the Education Licensing department at PSU. St. Mary's now had an opening for an 8th grade home room teacher. After seeing Tom's transcript, Melva realized that Tom was only six hours short of being eligible to teach 7th-9th grade

English and asked if he would be interested. An interview with the entire school board followed. Tom was asked many questions, but one by Jerry Stockard stuck out; would he be willing to coach. Tom had told himself he did not want to be the stereotypical history teacher who coached, but he would do it to get the job. That was the right answer. Tom was hired as the 8th grade home room teacher in the fall of 1983. The 6th, 7th and 8th grade teachers collaborated to cover all the subjects.

Fr. Eck recognized early Tom's servant heart and his inability to say "No." In a casual meeting, Fr. Eck told Tom he needed to get his license to drive the bus and tossed him the keys with the instructions to "drive it around the block a few times and take the test." So, Tom became a bus driver, which he continued until COVID. Since Tom was driving the bus and keeping the book for the junior high girls basketball team, it just made sense for him to coach also. With little coaching experience, he assisted the boys team for one year; but then the boys coach also left. Tom happened upon Principal Sister Rebecca and Fr. Eck talking about it, and Sister asked Fr. Eck who was going to coach the boys, to which Fr. Eck quickly answered, "Tom will." And he did. For six years Tom coached both boys and girls junior high basketball, then for an additional 13 years coached just the boys. Some of his best advice came from assistant coaches Bill Gill and John Duncan. "Bill told the team, 'You may be the only bible these other people see.' That stuck with me."

With the high school in the need of a counselor, the fall of 1990 took Tom across the street to fill that need. He once again went back to PSU to take the necessary courses. As counselor, Tom oversaw state testing, scheduling classes and enrollment, QPA (Quality

Performance Accreditation), career counseling and more, as well as teaching four hours each day. Tom's ability to teach a variety of subjects came in handy as he built the schedule each year. After Mr. Forbes retired in 2005, Tom was the constant who worked to shepherd the new principal as well as protect and honor the history of the school. As Tom saw a couple of principals come and go, he decided to once again step up. It is a good thing he likes to learn, because Tom once again returned to PSU to become licensed and served as principal from the 2013-2014 school year through 2016-2017. During Tom's four-year tenure as principal, the school was finally able to hire a full-time school counselor. But after four years, Tom felt it was time for someone new to lead the school. "I had a vision but didn't see the school moving as I had hoped it would, so I thought a younger principal might be better." In his humble way, Tom stepped aside but was still led by the question, what can I do now for the school? That question was answered by the need for a technology facilitator on campus. Tom continues to provide the on-campus IT support for our teachers and staff. This became even more important during COVID and moving forward as our students each have a school supplied Chromebook computer. During COVID, Tom helped prepare the faculty and students for remote and virtual teaching. Tom was prepared to retire last year; he had turned 70 years old and thought it was time. But the school again needed him, so he stayed on part time to oversee Power School and technology support as well as to help collaborate with the new JH/HS Counselor.

"I prayed for this job, and I always felt like this is where I was supposed to be," Tom said. He doesn't consider what he has done and continues to do for SMC to be anything special. As a student at Colgan, Tom witnessed families demonstrating stewardship. "We didn't keep track or a tally sheet, we just did it." He didn't grow up using the word stewardship, just doing what needs done. Tom said he is ready to retire but will do whatever the school needs. Maybe he will be a substitute teacher. It is hard to say what Tom Compton will do in the future, but it is easy to say that when he does retire, he can be assured that he was where God wanted him to be and that his example of stewardship was witnessed by generations of students at St. Mary's Colgan.


A glimpse into the life of the wife and family of a Deacon's wife

John and I got married at Our Lady of Lourdes in 1993. About eleven years into our marriage our pastor (who actually presided over our wedding Mass), Fr. Bill Porter, asked to meet with us and informed us that the Archdiocese of Kansas City in Kansas was starting formation for its first cohort of permanent deacons. He suggested John should apply and asked us to pray about it. At the time we had three kids aged six and under, and our fourth was on the way. So, our season in life was a main focus of our discernment, whether we were being called to this vocation with such a young and growing family. 


JOE KOLARIK class of 2015

... 20 Year Kimmy (Norris) Dent



... 40 Year Leo Brown

After graduating from Colgan High School in 1983, Leo attended Pittsburg State University, graduating in 1987 with a degree in communications and history. He joined the Air Force in 1988, serving as a journalist at Plattsburgh AFB, NY, until his discharge in 1992. During this time, he volunteered to do religious education classes for the Catholic chaplain at Clinton Correctional Facility (New York's largest state prison) in Dannemora.

Leo resurrected his military career in 2001 when he joined the Air Force Reserve. Based at Whiteman AFB, Mo, he's a senior master sergeant with 26 years of service. Highlights include deployments to Afghanistan and Kuwait and being named the Air Force Journalist of the Year in 2007.

Back to the past. Leo traded in his military uniform for civilian clothes in 1992 and, in 1993, began a fiveyear stretch of formation for the priesthood. While he never was ordained, he wouldn't trade the education, friendship and travels he had in formation, as his stops included New Jersey, Washington DC, and Chicago. In 1998, he was hired at St Thomas Aquinas High School in Overland Park, KS, where he still teaches theology courses. After high school Steve went to Pittsburg State University with the plan to major in chemistry, like his dad, Thomas, who was a chemist at Dickey Clay for many years. "I took a class called Intro to Computer Science and knew that was what I wanted to do. This was during the time when the Apple 1 had just come out." Steve wrote. While in college, Steve joined the Army Reserve and was at the 1010th Supply and Service unit in Pittsburg. He was sent to cook school in California. This training helped him pay his way through college as a cook at Ken's Pizza on North Broadway, followed by assistant cook at Crestwood Country Club and the head chef at the Boardwalk Supper Club. He continued to live in Pittsburg and for several years served as the Scoutmaster of Boy Scout troop 81 sponsored by the Knights of Columbus. Steve's service to Boy Scouts continued as he was the Roundtable Chair and District Training Chair, earning the Silver Beaver award. He also completed ten years in the Army Reserve at the 89th ARCOM as a Staff Sergeant. Steve was asked to move to Louisville in 2003, where he finished his career as an IT Project Manager with YUM! Brands, the owner of Pizza Hut, Taco Bell, and KFC. Steve has had his real estate license for over 30 years and in his retirement teaches real estate license and broker classes. Steve still plays golf regularly and walks 18 holes as well as shooting sporting clays. Steve and Joyce have two daughters, and five grandchildren who also live in Louisville. Marshall Lenne attended St. Mary's High School, now SMC, from kindergarten through high school, graduating in 1963. His memories of St. Mary's are of the opportunities to know Jesus as Lord and Savior as well as someone he could rely on. He recalls fondly the many Sisters of St. Joseph who helped form his love for our Lord and who prepared him academically for the challenges ahead. His classmates and he shared many hours of time together and they all influenced his life. Marshall's father died when he was thirteen. During Marshall's senior year, Coach Frank Crespino opened the door for him to seek an appointment to the United States Air Force Academy (USAFA). which Marshall received from Senator Frank Carlson. Marshall graduated from USAFA in 1967 with a BS in Mathematics. He met his wife of 55+ years, Victoria, while at the Academy and they were married in the Catholic Cadet Chapel upon graduation. He became a pilot in the USAF and was selected to be an instructor in single seat jet aircraft. After leaving the Air Force, Marshall returned to the classroom to obtain a BS in Business/Economics and then an MBA. He worked for thirty-plus years in the industrial environment in management positions. He credits his father and mother, the discipline of his education at St. Mary's, his fellow classmates and certainly those who educated and supported him throughout with blessing his life. Monsignor Patrick J. McCullough

Fr. P.J. McCullough was assigned as the pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes parish in 1928. Recognizing the work he had ahead of him, Fr. McCullough requested an assistant. He was assigned

the newly ordained Fr. Alex Stremel. The list of accomplishments made by the parish, under the direction of Fr. McCullough is long. He cleared the parish of \$60,000 debt, and at the same time bought several lots and a house for the pastor. The transepts were added to the Church, at the cost of \$35,000, and the Church was rededicated on November 27, 1931. It was written of Fr. McCullough, "Difficulties to the ordinary man are not difficulties to the genius." A pipe organ was added and dedicated on October 12, 1933. In 1935, he was elevated to be Monsignor McCullough. In 1936, Msgr. McCullough changed the lives for so many in the future, when he inaugurated St. Mary's High School, with the addition of 9th grade. The same year, kindergarten was added. To better accommodate the growing student body, in 1937 the third story was added to the school. In 1940, the first class graduated from St. Mary's High School. In 1944, Msgr McCullough, began fundraising for a new gymnasium, but, other school and parish needs

St. Mary's Gets a New Bus in 1941

A newspaper article written in 1941 recently surfaced with this picture of the St. Mary's bus students. Msgr. McCullough worked to build St. Mary's in both faith and numbers, and these busses allowed more students to receive a Catholic education that would have been otherwise not been available. The article recounted that there were two busses serving the students of St. Mary's grade and high school. The article says, "For the past four years a bus route has been operated to bring students from Chicopee, Capaldo, Radley and Fleming. It covers a route of 58 miles a day and carries 30 pupils. Eight of the graduation class (1942) are pioneer bus riders, having come all four of their high school career on the bus to St. Mary's. They are Mary Machetta, Sylvia Jones, Frank Montemurro, Frank Tisot, Carl Wettstein, Edward Craney, John Chiapetti and Margaret Peak. This year another bus brings students to St. Mary's. It starts in Columbus, travels through Stippeville, Turk, Mackie, Scammon and Weir. It covers 62 miles and carries 26 students."

delayed the project. In 1947, Msgr McCullough added his last touch to the Church with the addition of a steeple peal of bells. The bells were named Frank, Domicela and Joseph, after the donors of the \$8,000 to purchase and install the bells. Msgr. McCullough passed away on November 24, 1948.

Monsignor Alex G. Stremel

Fr. Stremel first served Our Lady of Lourdes parish as an assistant to Fr. McCullough from 1928-1929. He was later reassigned as pastor in 1949. Shortly after arriving in Pittsburg, Fr. Stremel proposed the building of three new buildings, the Three Tabernacles, as he called them, a rectory, gym and convent. In a very short amount of time, by September of 1952, all three buildings were built and occupied and by the end of 1955, Fr. Stremel sent a check to the Most Reverend Bishop Mark K. Carroll in the amount of \$8,150.68 clearing all debt of the parish. Fr. Stremel not only built new buildings but he built community and spirituality at the parish. Fr. Stremel had previously written a Passion Play that he entitled Calvary Hill. From 1952 through 1957, Calvary Hill was performed each year by parishioners of Our Lady of Lourdes. At the parish Diamond Jubilee celebration on September 22, 1956, he was elevated to be Monsignor Alex Stremel. The last of the campus additions under the supervision of Msgr. Stremel, was the addition of the new high school building in 1960. Msgr. Stremel was pastor of Our Lady of Lourdes until 1963. He

additional pastoral and spiritual formation. He, along with about 20 other men in our Archdiocese spent one weekend a month being trained by Theology professors and spiritual directors from all over the United States. John was a full-time practicing attorney during formation and continues his full-time practice today. He, like many other deacons, do ministry work in the evenings and on the weekends. John's cohort was the first ordained in our Archdiocese in April 2011. Since the diaconate program was new to the Archdiocese, most Catholics in the area didn't realize the impact the deacons would have on their parishes (assisting priests, forming souls, teaching the faith, administering to the sick, etc).

What does John's ministry work look like? John serves at daily Mass and two to three Sunday Masses, occasionally he gives the homily, however deacons do not preside at Mass like priests. Deacons can be ministers for Baptism and also can witness Marriage vows, so John assists the parish with those sacraments. He often gets called to lead a Holy Hour for Eucharistic Adoration or a Prayer Service. John and I together lead a marriage enrichment program at the parish for newlywed couples. He also is an Overland Park Police Department Chaplain. Most deacons, like John, do not get paid for their ministry unless they are serving a specific full-time position within the Archdiocese (for example, the director of Religious Education or Parish Administrator).

What's John being a deacon mean for our family? Well first off, John is always serving at Mass, up in the Sanctuary, assisting Father and has for the last almost 12 years. So parishioners, especially in the beginning, that didn't know our family - would see me with our kids especially when they were little - Logan (24), Michaela (23), Landon (19) and Aviana (17) - in the pew and think I was a single parent. I do miss sitting with John at Mass, as do the kids, so sometimes he'll come to an "extra" Mass, where another deacon is serving, so he can sit with us. Our family, every once in a while, slips into John's homily and we're all now used to it... so honestly, I think it keeps our kids on their best behavior. In all seriousness, I think one of the best things that has come from John's diaconate ministry is the spiritual growth of our little domestic church and its impact on the universal church.

Sr. Maria Jacinta, IHM JH/HS Religion Teacher

Sr. Maria Jacinta, IHM grew up in Arkansas City with her parents and two brothers. Her family attended Sacred Heart Parish. Upon graduating high school, she attended Emporia State University for two years, then she took a break from school to volunteer with the National Evangelization Team Ministries and St. Paul's Outreach. Sister John Marie, IHM grew up traveling with her dad's Air Force career. She lived in various states and countries with her parents, sister, and brother. Growing up she enjoyed hobbies such as gymnastics, the Sunday Mass choir, CYO, concert band, theater, and soccer. She spent three years in college at Fort Hays State University, actively engaged in the Catholic college community and playing in the marching and concert bands. She joined the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary of Wichita, taking the name "Sr. John Marie" after St. John Vianney, patron saint of priests, because of her devotion to praying for priests. Since professing her vows she has completed a Bachelor's degree in Elementary Education and a Master's degree in Systematic Theology. Sr. John Marie taught first grade for 10 years in Wichita before coming to Pittsburg. At St. Mary's she has spent three years as a CGS catechist and K-1 Music teacher, and two years as a 1st grade teacher. Upon graduation, she felt called to give her life to Christ and entered the community of The Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary and professed vows in 2003. Bishop's Dream



Back in the late 40s and the early 50s of the old century, I dreamed dreams in the old St. Mary's Church.

They led me to live as a priest (1969), and as a Bishop (1998), and now as a Bishop Emeritus (2011). They led me to a group of women and men in something called GRACE THAT REIGNS.

It was founded by a Malaysian woman who grew up in Canada, Ms. Jacqueline Loh, an architect whose life had been turned upside down by the Lord in 1998. People were drawn through her to the Word of Christ and the Sacraments of his Church. The essential themes of His own preaching became the essential themes of their own lives. Those lives flowered in new and creative forms of the corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

GRACE THAT REIGNS is a way of praying that is mostly attentiveness to the Real God. It is a way of doing retreats, and missions, and days of recollection.



It is also a way of doing spiritual direction, and a way of healing for those wounded by sin and the hard business of living.

We now see a growing number of persons in parishes all over the United States and Canada who are **practicing contemplatives**. You don't need a monastery to be one. You don't need a convent to be one. You don't need an ordination to be one. You need only be lost in wonder at the Real God.

From the Archives We are Colgan! But do you know why?

On July 24, 1966, Fr. Thomas Colgan died along with three others in an automobile crash at Chicopee, Kansas. In honor of Father Thomas Colgan, the high school was renamed Colgan High School. Fr. Colgan was born in Wichita on July 6, 1930. After attending Xavier University and Kenrick Seminary, he was ordained for the Diocese of Wichita by Bishop Carroll at the Cathedral on March 26, 1955. As an assistant he was assigned to St. Anthony's Parish in Wellington, St. John's Parish in El Dorado, and St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Wichita. He attended Catholic University of America in Washington, DC to earn his degree in administration. Upon completion of studies, in 1964, he was appointed to Our Lady of Lourdes in Pittsburg. His assignments included being administrator of St. Mary's High School, assistant at Our Lady of Lourdes parish and moderator of the Catholic youth in the Pittsburg deanery. Fr. Colgan was one of five children. His twin sister became Sister Martin de Pores, S.M.D., and his brother Jerome also became a priest. Fr. Jerome Colgan was the celebrant of the solemn funeral Mass and Bishop Leo C. Byrnes delivered the eulogy at Our Lady of Lourdes. The remains were taken to Wichita where he laid in state prior to the funeral Mass. Fr. Colgan was buried in Calvary cemetery in Wichita. Fr. Colgan left a lasting impression on those who knew him. He was greatly respected by Our Lady of Lourdes parish and especially the students of St. Mary's High School. In his honor, the school was officially renamed with the class of 1967 receiving the distinct honor of being the first class to graduate from Colgan High School. In the late 90's, the school became known as St. Mary's Colgan High School.

On the next few pages you will find the homily Bishop Byrne offered at Fr. Colgan's funeral.

Funeral Sermon--Rev. Thomas H. Colgan--July 29, 1966 June Synce "I press toward the mark to the prize of the supernal vocation of God in Christ ^Jesus." (St. Paul's Epistle to the Philippians--III Ch. XIV Verse)

Our first thoughts today at the funeral of Father Thomas Colgan, æe those of gratitude. All of us are grateful to God for the years, eleven plus, of his life as a priest of God. Only last year, the modern historian, Arthur M. Schlessinger, Jr. wrote a book <u>A THOUSAND DAYS</u>. It was a book about John F. Rennedy in the White House. Father Thomas had over four thousand days in the service of Christ working in the Diocese of Wichita, and every one of us are grateful to ^God for the four thousand days (plus) of his Holy Priesthood. Obviously, our hearts today are deeply **d**addened and I am pleased to speak for all the clergy and religious and laity here in expressing our warmest sympathy to Mrs. Colgan, Father's dear mother, to Father Jerry and the girls, Sister Martin de Porres and to Rita and ^Margaret, to his dear aunts and all other relatives. We know the depth of your sorrow, but we also believe that you are grateful as are all the rest of us, and I am sure that you cannot find words to express to God your appreciation of the priesthood of Father Tom.

As followers of Christ, we all have a two-fold vocation--a vocation to dedicate our abilities and our emergies that God has given to us for useful work among our fellow men. Then we know that this first vocation has as its ultimate purpose, a preparation for the eternal life that God has prepared for us. "I press toward the mark to the prize of the supermal vocation of God in Christ Jesus." This is our Faith, this we know, and yet for me and for you, in fact, for most d us, it is somewhat of a life struggle day by day to keep a grasp of these great significant truths before us. Because in this world there are so many clamoring claims on us every hour of our working day. But basic to our Faith and Hope--and Love too, is that heaven is our goal, the fulfillment of all our efforts.

One of the many reasons why we are grateful today is that Fa ther Tom was one of those chosen souls richly endowed with grace who seemed to be able to walk in the mixest of the busy act of life and never lose contact with the great reælity of the eternal. He was a real Follower of Christ in work, in delightful laughter and every endeavor. So we are gathered together today to offer the holy Mass for the repose of his soul, to bless his remains, and to pray to God that he will bless him in eternal life.

There is, of course, a real dadness in our hearts this morning and I suppose that if we would analyze it honestly, it is not only a sorrow for Father Thomas Colgan. It is sorrow for ourselves. The thought that keeps comingback to my mind is represented best in the words of the poet who wrote, "No man is an island entire of himself. Every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. Any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind, and therefore never seemed to know for whom the bell tolls. It tolls for thee." Each of us feels today that we have been deprived of something very important and we feel sorry for ourselves. It is not a custom in the Catholic Church to eulogize on the occasion of a funeral, but it does seem that today that we can emphasize something of a great spiritual strength in this young priest that will give all of us--bishops, priests, religious, and laymen a greater strength and inspiration to s eek out God's Will and to generously fulfill it. If I would try to say one word to characterize the splendid personality of Tather Thomas, it would probably be to say that he was first and always a priest. His priestliness <u>came through</u> at all times and for us, at least for the Catholics that are here, there is one Priesthood, the eternal Priesthood of Christ. We know that the eternal Priest was one who voluntarily emptied himself of his divinity and who freely came among men in his joy, passion, suffering and death.

It was on March 26, 1955, that the young man, Thomas Colgan, knelt before Bishop Carroll, his Ordinary, and was ordained to the Holy Priesthood. I am sure at that very time he told God that he was going to do his best to imitate with his priestly life Christ Himself. As we look at the relatively short years, four thousand days, we feel that the image of his Priesthood was fulfilled in a remarkable degree.


On the personal side, in the years that I have been Admanistrator in this diocese I had many, many occasions to admire his fine abilities and his readiness to accept responsibility in the cause and service of God. Almighty God had endowed him with an unusually fine mind, and the record of the Graduate School of the Catholic Universit bears this out. And the happy thing to recall is that he devoted his abilities of mind and heart to the spiritual good of his people and to the development of the character and the lives of the youth entrusted to his care. As Administrator of St. Mary's H^{\perp} gh School in Pittsburg, he won the affection of the students in a remarkable way and the esteem of their parents and the genuine respect of the members of the school board. All this was because he seemed willing at all times to give himself, never sceking recognition for work done. In giving of self, he devoted his abilities of mind and heart to the spiritual good of the people he loved so well and to the furthering of the great field of Catholic education.

Tather Thomas' death was sudden and violent. All of us were shocked and many of us might wonder and almost shake our heads; and yet dear friends, I am reminded of a thought given to us in the <u>Old Testment</u> in the book of Isaias, 55th chapter: For My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor My ways your ways, said the Lord, for as the Heavens are exalted above your ways and My thoughts above the earth, so are My ways exalted above your ways and My thoughts above your thoughts." How many of you are acquainted with the tapestry? If you see the reverse side, it seems to have no design; it is all puzzling and then turn the tapestry around and we see the beauty of the picture. Indeed it is true that our thoughts and our ways are not as God's, but as the Heavens are exalted above the earth so are His ways exalted above our ways and His thoughts above our thoughts. Only last Friday, our Vicar General had occasion of a long visit with Fat her Colgan, and he was truly impressed with the grasp of the task that was before him. Monsignor Glynn mentioned that he was really proud of him. On more than one occasion Msgr. Smith, Father Colgan's pastor, told me how wonderful he was as an assistant-what a joy to have him in the house hold and how dedicated he was to his work at the school. The only thing he commented on and this on more than one occasion, was he felt that he was working too hard.. I am sure that priest after priest and layman after laymanwould have a similar comment about his work-his enthusiasm-his spirit.

Recently, Bishop O'Donnell made the comment that love must fill a priest's life, a strong, free and respectful love that brings other people to life. "He loved me," St. Paul wrote," and gave himself up for me." This will be a good epitaph for Father Colgan who always saw people as the real prize of his apostolate. He knew he was called to the Priesthood not to ve remote from people, not to generate an esoteric mystique for his own satisfactions with them, but to love them for their sake to give his life as a ransom for many, to be poured out like water as he translated God's love by his own life into a message men can easily understand. The Priesthood takes healthy men who are fullymature because only such men can lead the life of Faith that the Priesthood is meant to be. Is is truly the vocation that asks most because it asks for everything that a strong man can give.

So dear friends, we begin our thoughts today expressing gratitude to Ged for the life and the work of this splendid young priest. It would be well to conclude in the same vein of thusing dow for him and all the four thomsand days of his Priesthood. W are grateful, dear God, for the life and work of Father Colgan and we ask you, all of us, every single person gathered here this morning, we ask you merc; for his soul; we pray you will bless him, give him light and refreshment and eternal rest, and in the language of Holy Mother the Church, we say: "Eternal rest grant unto Him, O Lord and may the perpetual light shine upon him. May he rest in peace." IN the name of the Father and of the Sone and of the Holy Spirit.
