With the confidence she gained in the classroom, she is a leader in the program, helping her peers while she reaches out to professionals in the music industry to learn from them. This has given her the confidence and clarity to plan a college and career pathway in music technology.



Callum also attends the Digital Design

program but came here to enroll in engineering. It was a visit to DACC's campus where he stepped into the Digital Design lab and instinctively knew that was the career for him. His courageous choice to shift into a new career pathway has led him to discover more career opportunities than he had realized were possible.

We know that students must have their essential physiological needs met before we can expect them to be active participants in school. At DACC, our staff strives to be a learning organization where our students are not only participating in school but also are truly engaged in the learning process.
