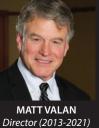

BUILDING PATHWAYS TO SUCCESS

The 2021-22 school year included milestone moments, COVID barriers and so much for which to be grateful and proud. Our school year included masks, online academies, vaccination clinics, visitor restrictions and other COVID protocols that impacted staff, students, mental health and educational outcomes.

In the midst of our third year of pandemic impacts, there is much to celebrate. Our staff, students and families showed amazing dedication, flexibility and resilience as we focused on safety while keeping students in-person for classes, sports and activities as much as possible. The entire community supported us with grace, patience and responsibility as we worked together to focus on student success and provide a safe, quality education for each student.

The opening of Moorhead High School Career Academy was one of the most significant highlights of the 2021-22 school year. The career academy is the first step in an overall high school transformation project that includes personalizing education for every 9-12 grade student in the district. Academies, career clusters and programs of study are being developed to provide hands-on career discovery in a wide range of fields. Students will receive experiential learning opportunities to be able to graduate choice ready.

An additional part of the educational transformation is the construction at Moorhead High School that also began in the 2021-22 school year. This multi-year project will result

in a new high school facility to be completed in the 2025-26 school year. While new facilities are important, the buildings are not the focus. Our goal is to embrace students where they are, celebrate who they are, help them discover a sense of belonging to the Spud family and work together to become the best they can be. We are excited about this new era at Moorhead Schools as we innovate the high school experience.

The theme for the 2021-22 school year was *Building Pathways to Success*. While the pandemic brought many mental health and educational challenges, it also provided "pathways" for our administration and staff. Innovation, flexibility, creativity and teamwork were required to meet students' needs and lead them toward success.

Together, we strive to ensure educational excellence and equity as we are united in our mission to develop the maximum potential of every learner to thrive. SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GOALS

Objective 1

Early Learning students will be progress monitored using a Kindergarten Entry Profile (KEP) Assessment tool (COR Advantage, Hawaii Early Learning Profile, and Preschool Early Literacy Indicators). Data will be reviewed in collaborative teams to plan and inform instruction.

Objective 2

Inclusive Content will be embedded into Early Learning curriculum across all programs in cooperation with Comprehensive Literacy State Development. Educational equity resources and training will be explored throughout this school year to support inclusive programs and responsive instruction. Responsive classroom planning will be based on student/family backgrounds.

Objective 3

100% of students will demonstrate growth in areas of social-emotional development, communication, and literacy skills as identified on curricular assessments and special education services plans.

CELEBRATIONS

Probstfield Early Learning Center's School Readiness programs have a four-star rating from Minnesota Parent Aware.

JumpStart Preschool, which has received funding from United Way since 2012, received a United Way grant for 2023-25.

Objective 1

Increase the percentage of students who demonstrate proficiency using the AIMSweb+ probe for each grade level: K 95% LWSF; 1st / 2nd 60% ORF; and 3rd 70% and 4th 80% Reading Composite by spring 2023.

Objective 2

100% of Dodds' teachers will incorporate an interactive read aloud on a daily basis that supports and engages students through relationships, shared experiences, advocacy and a sense of identity.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GOALS

Objective 1

Students in third and fourth grades will increase their overall reading achievement from 41% to 50% and their overall math achievement from 56% to 64% on the MCA-III assessments.

80% of students in kindergarten through fourth grade will meet the target for their grade (40th percentile) in math and reading as measured by aimswebPlus.

Objective 2

90% of families will rate the communication and partnership with teachers as positive based upon the Spring 2023 Comprehensive School Climate Inventory.

95% of families will rate the communication and partnership with teachers as positive based upon the fall and winter parent conference surveys.

Objective 3

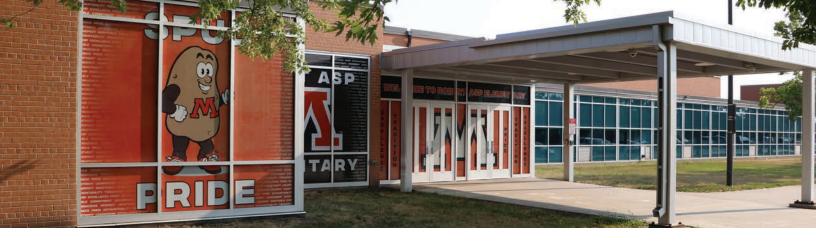
Increase the attendance rate from 85.7% to 93% during the 2022-23 school year and lower the incident rate to less than 100.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GOALS

Objective 1

90% of students will meet annual growth rate expectations as measured by common grade level assessments and benchmark measures for reading and mathematics.

Objective 2

Third and fourth grade students will increase the proficiency rate by 5% in the reading and mathematics MCA result.

Students who receive federal meal benefit will increase proficiency in the MCA result.

Objective 3

Increase attendance rate to 95% and realize a 10% reduction of classroom incidents compared to the 2021-22 school year.

CELEBRATIONS

Our school-wide plan identified our highest needs for reading and mathematics and utilized federal dollars to reduce class size in these sections, allowing increased individualized instruction for these students.

Each grade-level team met weekly as a professional learning community to plan a guaranteed viable curriculum and identify and assess essential standards.

95% of our total student population had no documented discipline referrals.

Objective 1

Objective 1

At the end of the 2022-23 school year, we will have at least 80% of students in Tier 1, and no more than 13% in Tier 2, and 7% in Tier 3 based on the Northwest Evaluation Association Measure of Academic Progress Assessment

Objective 2

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GOALS

Objective 1

Develop a guaranteed and viable curriculum for Alternative Education with a completion goal date of the 2024-25 school year. The MALC will move from no defined system to defining a process for assessing credits earned by quarter for enrolled students. All teachers will work to tie the core curriculum standards in relation to the credit units being earned in at least one core course by the end of the 2022-2023 school year.

Objective 2

Offering at least one period of a hybrid independent study model period, in which students will have the opportunity to recover partial credits in core courses in order to complete the grad credit requirement.

Objective 3

Build an understanding of the use of a "calming room" as a place to self-regulate behavior and emotions in order to return to class and maintain a productive outcome in the school day.

Utilize "Citizenship Grades" in which students will be able to monitor and reflect their performance in attendance, academic efforts and academic attitude.
