CDC Safety Recommendations	Has the LEA Adopted a Policy? (Y/N)	Describe LEA Policy:
Universal and correct wearing of masks	Y - procedure	The District requires face-coverings be worn by all, at all times, while inside district buildings. Exceptions will be made for individuals with health conditions and those who cannot easily remove the mask themselves. Alternate protection (face shields) will be provided for these individuals. Students will not be required to wear face coverings when eating or drinking.
Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding)	Y- procedure	Isaac Elementary Schools will group students into "cohorts" where possible. Cohorts are groups of students that will remain together throughout the school day and minimize to the greatest extent possible intermingling with other groups. Where cohorts are not possible, students will maintain at least 3 ft. of distance between each other, teachers will maintain a seating chart for all students. Cohorting minimizes the risk of exposure to illnesses outside of the cohort, and should a member of the cohort become infected, it facilitates contact tracing among affected students. Cohort parameters will be established at Isaac's discretion and may be assigned by classroom or other groupings as appropriate. Where possible, Isaac will limit intermingling between cohorts – student and employee groups will remain as static as possible by having the same groups of students interact with the same employees each day, and this applies during class, recess, and on buses, to the extent possible. Assigned seating in classrooms and on buses should be used at all times. Students will also maintain a 3 ft. minimum social distance between one another and 6 ft. between Isaac employees who are not fully-vaccinated whenever possible. Although this may not be feasible at all times, it will be encouraged by Isaac employees and students may be reminded of this requirement with announcements and signs. 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Handwashing and respiratory etiquette	Y- procedure	Employees/ students shall keep their hands as clean as possible by washing using soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Employees/ students shall also be reminded to wash or sanitize their hands at the following times: • Upon arrival at school; • After being outside for physical activity; • After blowing one's nose, coughing, or sneezing; • After using the restroom; • Before and after eating or preparing food; • After physical contact with other employees or students; • After contact with animals or pets; • After using shared equipment; • Prior to leaving school for home. Cleaning and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving ventilation	Y- procedure	Isaac employees and cleaning staff follow the CDC's Disinfecting Facilities Guide instructions Isaac has a daily cleaning and disinfecting plan for all facilities. This plan includes but not limited to high touch surfaces, bathrooms, sinks, classroom desk and chairs, shared spaces, cafeteria, floors and carpets and horizontal surfaces. Isaac ensures Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC) settings are maximizing ventilation when weather conditions allow. In addition, the district has installed The Novaerus NV900W Air Purifier units in all classrooms that are in use as well as in some high-traffic areas.
Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in collaboration with the State, local, territorial, or Tribal health departments	Y- procedure	Isaac will perform Contact Tracing to identify the close contacts and proximity individuals to the positive case of COVID-19. All Close contacts and Proximity individuals identified will be notified. The district follows the most up to date CDC and county recommendations regarding quarantine and isolation for both employees and students. (SEE DISTRICT MITIGATION PLAN)
Diagnostic and screening testing	Y- procedure	Isaac is now offering voluntary rapid testing to students and staff using the <i>Abbott BinaxNow Rapid Antigen Diagnostic Test</i> , a program that is provided by Maricopa County Department of Public Health. A rapid COVID-19 test detects protein fragments specific to COVID-19. The test is available for parents to pick up at District Office and will also be conducted by the school's

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Efforts to provide vaccinations to school communities	Y- procedure	Health Assistant and results can be expected within 15 minutes. Test are available for students and staff who are symptomatic or a close contact to an in school positive case (after 5 days of exposure). The district, in conjunction with a local health agency, offers vaccination events for employees, students and the community. Incentives are provided to both employees and students who become fully vaccinated.
Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies	Y- procedure	Special accommodations, along with compliance with all applicable state, federal, and local laws, shall be made for Isaac students with disabilities or those with unique medical needs. Where possible, these students should wear masks and maintain a 3 to 6 ft. social distance, and employees who interact with these students should be informed that wearing masks in their presence is uniquely important. To the extent possible, these students arrive at school at a separate, staggered start time and maintain a staggered schedule that allows for separation from other students. Virtual or distancing learning options should be readily available for these students. Isaac will also ensure that it protects the privacy of those students at higher risk for severe illness regarding underlying medical conditions.

In addition, a before and after school program is now offered at each site for both remediation and enrichment, 6am-6pm. A counselor and/or social worker is available at each school to assist Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs the students with social, emotional needs. In addition, support is offered for students in the after school program. Other Needs (which may include student health Students who attend the after school program are provided a snack and food services) and given dinner prior to leaving, in addition to all students receiving free breakfast & lunch. **Staff Needs:**



Social, Emotional and Mental Health Needs	The district began a districtwide wellness program for all employees. The plan includes activities and incentives for participation.
Other Needs	Employees are provided incentives for vaccination and retention.
