President Dr. Thomas Flanders called the Regular Meeting of the Board of Education of the Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi to order at 6:05 p.m.

Presentations -

Speech & Debate Club

Speech and Debate Club – Ms. Jennifer Stanton, Site Coordinator for the New York State Forensics League State Championship Tournament 2014 to be held at Delaware Academy, updated the Board of Education on the anticipated attendance and what Board members and the general public can expect from the tournament. She presented a handout to the Board members.

The NYS Forensics Tournament is scheduled to take place at Delaware Academy on Saturday, April 5, and Sunday, April 6, 2014. Ms. Stanton informed the Board that there are currently 72 schools participating, 900 students, and 237 judges. She explained a brief history of the NYS Forensics League and there will be 16 students crowned state champions at the end of the tournament.

Ms. Stanton commented on the benefits to the community by hosting the NYS Forensics Tournament in Delhi; economic, volunteerism, recognition, tourism, and population. She has contacted local businesses to let them know that there will be over one thousand additional people in the Delhi area on April 5th and 6th to allow them to prepare for the influx of business. Participants and others involved in the tournament will also stay in the Oneonta area as there are not enough hotels or bed and breakfasts in the Delhi area. Mr. Alex Legg, Speech and Debate Club member spoke about the personal benefits to him since joining the Speech and Debate Club. Mr. Legg joined Speech and Debate in 8th

grade. He says it has helped him with academics, and he enjoys the competitions.

Ms. Maggie Hargrove, Speech and Debate Club member spoke about the personal benefits to her; she's found new friends, she looks at the Club Advisor, Ms. Stanton as a second mother, she feels more involved and has more confidence in herself.

Ms. Judi Byam, Elementary Principal reported:

- Last week the students were given the NYS ELA assessment in grades 3-5. Today, we began testing students in Math.
- The monthly CARES meeting was held last Tuesday. A video clip of the talent show was shown to the students.
- Last Friday, students took home their 3rd quarter report cards.
- She met with representatives from Bassett healthcare regarding a fitness initiative for Elementary school children called the Mileage Club, which promotes student activity and fitness.
- Parent letters sent out explaining the program.
- Beginning April 29th, students may choose to participate in the program during recess. The students will be given a card to keep track of the number of times they walk around the track; each time the card is hole-punched. After completing 5 miles, the children are given foot tokens to wear on their shoelaces, or tie to a string for a necklace. Each student will get a certificate of participation. After walking 10 miles, they get a larger foot token or a bracelet. This is a non competitive activity to promote fitness and activity. Teachers may choose to take their classes down to walk the track as well, whenever they feel the need for a little activity. Teachers will receive packets with information and ideas for encouraging students; walk backwards day, environmental walk- collect trash, ball walk- kick, dribble or pass a ball when walking, are just a few of the ideas.

The Board thanked Ms. Byam for her report.

Ms. Marian Chrisman, Business Administrator reported:

- Kellogg funds have increased by \$422,000. The funds have grown \$1.3 million since July 2013.
- Our school lunch fund profit total to date is \$14,661, compared to same time period last year of \$6,141.
- We've initiated proceedings to bid our electric delivery and hopefully prices will be locked in within the next month.
- The Kellogg Memorial Committee met earlier in the month. We are in the process of establishing the process by which we'll be disbursing funds. We did decide it was too late to establish guidelines for those students from District 16 scheduled to graduate in June of 2014. The committee wishes to make this a meritorious award and not just an entitlement. Guidelines and parameters for these awards are still being worked on. It's anticipated there will be a pamphlet available for incoming seniors this fall. In addition to the graduate awards, the committee will be funding educational programming sponsored by 501 (C) 3's Delaware Academy or municipalities. All opportunities will be held in Treadwell and must provide an enhanced or enriched educational experience. It's been determined from the Kellogg Settlement agreement, field trips, guest speakers, and exceptional experiences would be termed educational. All programs would be open to the entire Delaware Academy student body. We've decided on two funding periods per year, summer/fall to run from July through December, with applications due in May, and winter/spring to run from January through June

They established that the village will be responsible for clearing the walkway during the winter months. They plan to bid out the job of clearing the walkways.
- There was a kickoff construction meeting held last Thursday at 10:00 a.m. The construction members will have an office at the back of the middle school that has a separate entrance. This office will be the project office for the entire time of the project.

- March 22nd Delaware Academy hosted the first Junior Iron Chef competition in our area. Delaware Academy had one middle school team and two high school teams at the competition. The competition was featured on WBNG.
- The Food Service Department is preparing for the Speech and Debate Tournament April 5th and 6th.
- February's claim report notes with 12 serving days. We served 1,938 breakfast and 5, 522 lunches.

Whereas: Efforts by the Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi to sustain programs and services and contain budget are simultaneously constrained by Property Tax Cap Legislation, unfunded and underfunded mandates, and increases in pension, health care costs; and mandated implementation of Common Core Learning Standards and teacher/principal performance reviews; and

Whereas: Adequate State funding is constitutionally mandated and essential to meet all mandates and obligations and to maintain the quality of education in the Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi; and

Whereas: New York State, through its Gap Elimination Adjustment, has systematically reduced K-12 funding since 2010-11; and

Whereas: New York State touts recent aid increases as generous support to schools, although overall, school districts are receiving less in State Aide than 2008-09; and Whereas: Some school districts even have had State Aid DECREASES;, that the Delaware RESOLVED, Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi Board of Education calls upon the New York State Legislature to immediately exempt State Aid for education from the calculation of the Gap Elimination Adjustment.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF NOT EXCEEDING \$7,750,000 BONDS OF DELAWARE ACADEMY CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT AT DELHI, DELAWARE COUNTY, NEW YORK, TO PAY THE COST OF THE RECONSTRUCTION OF AND CONSTRUCTION OF IMPROVEMENTS TO VARIOUS SCHOOL DISTRICT FACILITIES, IN AND FOR SAID SCHOOL DISTRICT.

WHEREAS, at the Special District Meeting of the qualified voters of Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi, Delaware County, New York, held on February 12, 2013, a proposition was duly adopted authorizing the Board of Education of said School District for the reconstruction of and construction of improvements to various School District facilities, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery, apparatus, appurtenances, site improvements, and other incidental improvements and expenses in connection therewith, at a maximum estimated cost of \$7,750,000, and providing for the levy of a tax therefore for a portion thereof to be collected in installments, with \$7,750,000 obligations of said School District to be issued in anticipation thereof (the "Proposition"); and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to provide for such class of objects or purposes and the financing thereof; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, by the affirmative vote of not less than two-thirds of the total voting strength of the Board of Education of Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi, Delaware County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The reconstruction of and construction of improvements to various School District facilities, including original furnishings, equipment, machinery, apparatus, appurtenances, site improvements, and other incidental improvements and expenses in connection therewith, is hereby authorized at a maximum estimated cost of \$7,750,000. Section 2. The plan for the financing of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes shall be by the issuance of not exceeding \$7,750,000 bonds of said School District hereby authorized to be issued therefore, pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law. Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid class of objects or purposes is thirty years, pursuant to subdivision 97 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law.

Section 4. The faith and credit of said Delaware Academy Central School District at Delhi, Delaware County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged for the payment of the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said School District, a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such bonds as the same become due and payable.

Section 5. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the President of the Board of Education, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said President of the Board of Education, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 6. All other matters except as provided herein relating to the serial bonds herein authorized including the date, denominations, maturities and interest payment dates, within the limitations prescribed herein and the manner of execution of the same, including the consolidation with other issues, and also the ability to issue serial bonds with substantially level or declining annual debt service, shall be determined by the President of the Board of Education, the chief fiscal officer of such School District. Such bonds shall contain substantially the recital of validity clause provided for in Section 52.00 of the Local Finance Law, and shall otherwise be in such form and contain such recitals, in addition to those required by Section 51.00 of the Local Finance Law, as the President of the Board of Education shall determine consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Bond Resolution continued

Section 7. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- a) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said School District is not authorized to expend money, or
- b) The provisions of law which should be complied with as of the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,
- and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or
- c) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution. Section 8. This resolution shall constitute a statement of official intent for purposes of Treasury Regulations Section 1.150 2. Other than as specified in this resolution, no monies are, or are reasonably expected to be, reserved, allocated on a long-term basis, or otherwise set aside with respect to the permanent funding of the object or purpose described herein.

Section 9. This resolution, which takes effect immediately, shall be published in summary form in the official newspaper of said School District for such purpose, together with a notice of the School District Clerk substantially in the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.

It was noted that this bond resolution was approved last year; however, since there wasn't 2/3 of the Board present to vote, ORRICK requested a second vote.
