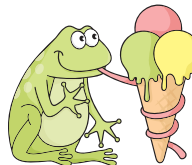

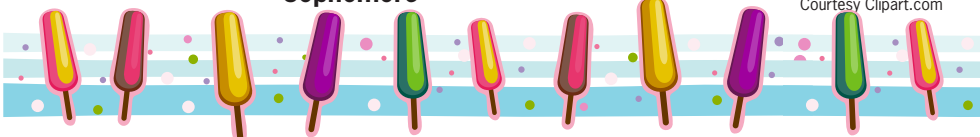

New Intervention Program addresses CK student needs

The Cody-Kilgore staff works hard to meet the needs

of all students. This year we have really made a push to implement an Intervention Program for our K-8 students. Our district used the MTSS model which stands for Multi-Tiered-System-of Support. Using this model, we are to have 80 percent of our students proficient in both Reading and Math using our core curriculum. It is a high achieving goal but as a district we want to set our goals high. After reviewing our Data and seeing the gaps in some of our students learning we are preparing to implement an Intervention Program K-8. In order for an intervention program to run right, it needs to have a leader that can monitor the progress, screen the students, and provide resources for the teachers. The district saw the need and created an Intervention Position. Ashley Kasner will be our K-8 Intervention Teacher next year. She has experience working in this

position and has a good understanding of how the process should work.

The Elementary School will have an all-hands-on deck approach. During

each class. Students will be identified using our MAPS and Aimsweb Data and will be monitored throughout the school year to check for progress or regression.

At the Middle School, we have a dedicated class period for intervention. Currently, Mrs. Jones, Mrs. Naslund, and Mrs. Ford provide interventions for students that are not in Band and Choir each day. The addition of Mrs. Kasner helping with interventions and providing resources for the Middle School staff will be a nice addition.

Here at Cody-Kilgore we are continuously looking for ways to improve academic performance. Good progress has been made and we look to implement a strong intervention program. If you have questions about our Intervention Program, please contact me.

The FFA Meats competition is a Career Development Event, or

CDE. This means that its purpose is to prepare students who are interested in pursuing career opportunities in the meat animal industry. My team, Abby, Colby, Riley, and myself competed in the event. The State FFA Meats Competition consists of five classes of tests. These tests included beef carcass quality grading, yield grading and pricing, identification of 30 retail cuts, a written test of 20 questions, and a laboratory practicum. The participants of the contest were asked to walk through a sequence of specified refrigerated facilities to grade different cuts and quality of meat. Overall, this event can be justified as an exceptionally valuable learning experience. 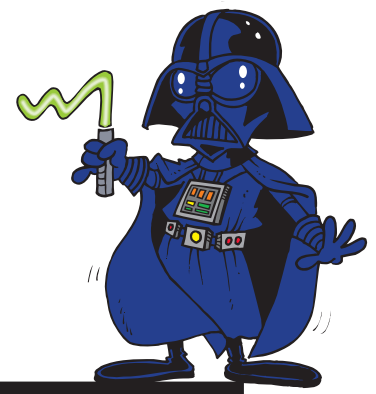

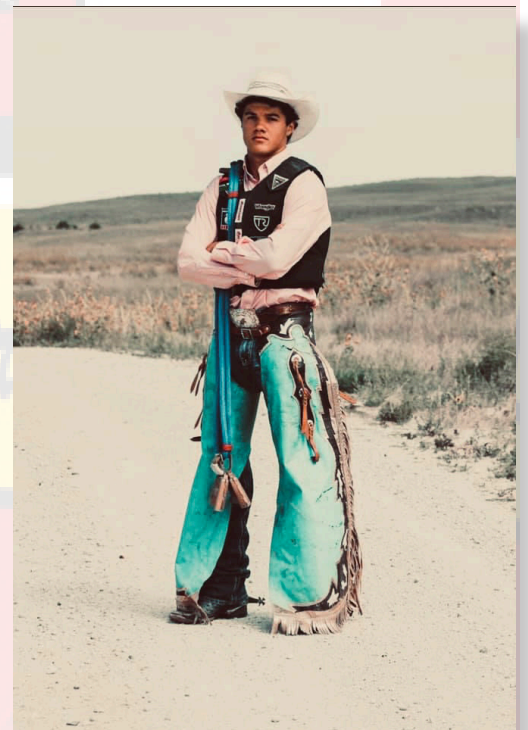

The Cody schools held the first ever commencement on Thursday May 18, 1905. The graduates on this occasion were Lyle Reed and Maude Stotts. It was an occasion to be proud of and the large crowd that assembled evidenced the deep interest of our people in the welfare of the schools.

The annual school meeting of the Cody district was held Monday evening, but the attendance was very small. El. L. Heath was elected moderator and W.H.Carter treasurer. The estimated expense for running the school the ensuing year was \$1950. The meeting voted a levy of 10 mills for teachers fund, which will be about \$1230. Amounts from other sources make in the aggregate over \$2400. It may be seen from this that the school will have plenty of money for the expenses of the coming year, and probably considerable to spare. School will begin on Sept 4 and continue nine months. Mrs. Petycrew has

been re-employed at a salary of \$50 per month, and Miss Daisy Briggs of Beamer, Neb., will have the intermediate at \$45. The principal has not yet been hired. The Cow Boy regrets very much that there was such a small attendance at the meeting, as it places the few who are there in a hard position. There are always a lot of people who haven't the energy enough to get out to a school meeting who become mighty energetic kickers at something that is done at the meeting. If you want to have a good school and something to benefit your children get out and vote your sentiments at the annual meeting.

The Village of Cody purchased a bell for Curfew. It was decided to place the bell in the Methodist Church tower. The village won't have to build a tower and the church won't have to buy a bell. (update - this is not the current bell that is in the tower of the Methodist Church)
