Special Edition: Quality Profile



The 21st Century Community Learning Center or Upper School was funded by the unprecedented passing of a 12.08 mills levy.

With 88,000 square feet, the school was designed with the concept of aviation in mind thanks to its proximity to the Cuyahoga County airport. It uses a mixture of curved metal panels and light brick to evoke feelings of lightness, movement and flight.

It is home to the following:

- · Cuyahoga County Public Library—Richmond Heights branch
- Multipurpose cafeteria with seating for 400, a stage with professional lighting, and built-in audiovisual equipment
- Gymnasium that supports school teams and the city's youth basketball program with multiple courts ideal for tournaments which can bring revenue to the city and district



MAKERSPACE


Makerspaces are designed to help students build critical thinking and problem-solving skills by taking classroom concepts and turning them into real-world applications.

Projects

- Entrepreneurship Club: Developed in partnership with the Network for Teaching Entrepreneurship, students build business plans and use Makerspace equipment to implement that plan.
- Summer School: Students learned to sew and started a store. With the help of Cosmic Bobbins, a local screen printing company, they printed Spartan T-shirts that are being sold to students and community members.

SUMMER SCHOOL

In an effort to keep students learning this past summer, Richmond Heights provided unique, project-based summer school. Students participated in the following:

- Social justice project Students selected an issue at the state, local or federal level, then conducted research, developed an action plan and honed their presentation skills by giving a report of their findings and recommendations.
- Small business development Students learned how to develop a business plan.
- Friday Field Experiences Each Friday, students went out into the community to learn a new skill or simply have fun. Trips included visits to Cuyahoga Valley National Park, Young Chefs Academy, and a bowling and skating party.

SPECIAL EDUCATION

We believe that students with disabilities should be educated to the maximum extent with their peers in general education classrooms. Our services include: specialized instruction, modifications in curriculum, and accommodations as appropriate to access the general education curriculum. Eligibility is determined through an Evaluation Team Report by school staff and families according to state and federal definitions and regulations. If a student qualifies under one or more of the 14 categories an Individualized Education Program (IEP) is developed. During the 2020-21 school year, the co-teaching instructional model continued at the elementary and secondary schools. There have been many positive academic and social-emotional results from our inclusive practices for our students with disabilities.

Richmond Heights Schools To Consider Replacing District Property Tax With an Income Tax

The Richmond Heights Board of Education is considering a proposal made at the Dec. 30, 2021, board meeting by David Conley, president of Rockmill Financial Consulting, to study the development of a taxation policy to restructure the district's taxing methodology.

As part of the proposed structure, the district would eliminate some, or all, of the district's existing property taxes and replace them with either a traditional or earned income tax. The benefit of the shift in taxation could be lowering the overall tax cost of the schools to current residents, especially senior citizens, and those on fixed incomes.

The new tax structure would potentially create additional income tax revenue from renters moving into the district in the future, to lower taxes for existing residents.

The district, in partnership with Rockmill, is conducting additional research and analysis before having further board discussion.

The Role Economic Development Plays in School Districts

When new development takes place in a community, it is standard practice that city officials, the local school board, and the developer have a seat at the table to ensure equitable funding for taxpayers and local government entities.

Although this was not the case in the instance of the Belle Oaks project, Richmond Heights Schools remains committed to being a collaborative community partner so that we receive our fair share from future economic development in order to continue providing the best education possible to our students.

Richmond Heights Local Schools earned *Ohio's Auditor of State award* in 2020 for clean and accurate recordkeeping, which recognizes the district's efforts to protect taxpayer dollars.

Richmond Heights Lead Plaintiff in School Voucher Lawsuit

A lawsuit was filed in early 2022 by advocates and nearly 100 school districts across Ohio declaring the state's school voucher program unconstitutional.

Richmond Heights Schools is a lead plaintiff in the case, arguing that vouchers are being used by primarily nonminority students, even though the program was meant to assist economically disadvantaged minority pupils.

The district has testified on this issue before the state legislature, and will continue to fight for fair and equitable funding for every student.

How Can I Get Involved?

Join a Feb. 23 online forum, led by school district leaders from four of the plaintiff districts. This is an opportunity for the public to learn more about the importance of vouchers to public school funding, the plaintiff's motivation for filing suit, the substance of their claims, the desired relief, and next steps for concerned citizens. EARLY COLLEGE EARLY CAREER PROGRAM

Through the Manufacturing Growth Network and its Early College Early Career program, select high school juniors are participating in workforce development, paid on-the-job training and are earning college credit. As part of this initiative, Richmond Heights Schools is also working with Amatrol to purchase equipment and curriculum so that students can earn an industry-recognized manufacturing certificate.

Additionally, the district is working toward a paid preapprenticeship program through a partnership with Component Repair Technologies, Inc. of Mentor, which specializes in turbine engine component repairs for the aviation, industrial and marine industries.

POST-SECONDARY OPPORTUNITIES

Richmond Heights Secondary School offers three face-to-face AP classes, and its blended learning model gives students the chance to participate in 11 other AP courses. And — they are one of only 40% of schools in the nation to offer AP Computer Science.

LANGUAGES

American Sign Language is a course offering. Additionally, students can choose to learn any foreign language taught virtually by certified teachers.

AVIATION CLASSROOM

Richmond Heights' aviation program introduces students to aviation careers as early as seventh grade, with a formal curriculum beginning in ninth grade. Thanks to the Expanding Opportunities for Each Child grant, the district expanded its resources in the aviation-designated classroom last year. They purchased 10 flight simulators, which give students hands-on experience while learning flight navigation from a virtual private pilot. The classroom also offers drones so students can earn their FAA Part 107 Small Unmanned Aircraft Certificate. Additionally, six students and two staff members participated in Discovery Flights led by T&G Flying Club, which provided students the opportunity to log flight time toward a private pilot license.
