

# Superintendent's Corner

On April 26th and September 14th the Spray School District staff invited our Spray community to two separate events at the Grange Hall and the school gymnasium. Both times, fliers we sent home and emails were sent out to the community for the events. These events were designed to collect and collaborate with our community and gather input and ideas on how we should

spend some of our grant/relief funds. We made posters with the description of the funding sources and the parameters/restrictions on how it can be spent. We also have a few volunteers prepare a spaghetti dinner in April and a taco night in September for our community members. We were very fortunate to have Mr. Lynn Cowdrey from the North Central Educational Service District there to help explain the process and what we were trying to accomplish. After we had finished our dinners, on both occasions, the community members were able to socialize, walk around and write some ideas on the posters and place sticky dots on those ideas that they liked. When these events ended the community was asked to discuss and collect community input on the DC trip for our high school students that is planned for next May. We had 22 parents and 20 students participate in April and 40 parents and 15 students participate in September for this community event. The collaboration of ideas and input will be helpful in future programs and purchasing for our school district. I would personally like to thank you all that worked and attended these events.

## School Board Meeting

One new element of this year's Eagle Update is that we will be reporting on the monthly School Board Meetings. Going to a board meeting as a student was interesting and I learned a lot about the process. At the meeting on Sept 12 there were a lot of interesting items on the agenda. One major point of discussion was about getting a new game bus. The cost will be between \$130,000 and \$150,000 plus up to \$10,000 for add ons. The funding for the Washington DC trip was discussed. There was talk about putting in a new stop sign or bus stop sign next to Second Street but nothing was confirmed. A lot of discussion centered around updates to documents that the Oregon School Board Association maintains. School board members Trish Denney, Cy Miller, Jon Asher, Becky Clark and David Newton were all in attendance. Board secretary Jennifer Boise was present as well as superintendent/principal Butler, Mr. Starr, Mr. Marcantonio, Mr. Neuburger and Mrs. Sweeney. The next meeting is planned for Monday October 11.


