Dr. Christopher Johnson Recommended as the Next Ramay Jr. High Principal



FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. – Superintendent Dr. John L Colbert will recommend the hiring of Dr. Christopher Johnson to be the next principal of Ramay Junior High. Dr. Johnson is currently the principal of Kimmons Middle School in Fort Smith, where he has served since 2017.

The Fayetteville Board of Education will vote on the recommendation at the March 17 regular meeting.

"We had a strong field of candidates who applied for this position," said Dr. Colbert. "The interview committee and I were both impressed with Dr. Johnson. His credentials, his experience in the classroom and as an administrator, and his commitment to students make him a great fit for Ramay."

"I am very excited about coming to Fayetteville Public Schools," said Dr. Johnson. "Ramay Junior High has a great tradition of excellence, and I look forward to joining the Ramay and Fayetteville Public Schools family."

A native of El Dorado, Dr. Johnson received his bachelor's degree in Health Sciences with a minor in secondary education from the University of Arkansas at Little Rock. He received his master's degree in Educational Leadership from Arkansas State University. He also received an educational specialist degree in Curriculum and Instruction from Arkansas State University. Dr. Johnson received his doctorate in Educational Leadership from Arkansas Tech University.

in 2021 Dr. Johnson was recognized as the City of Fort Smith Educator of the Year.

In addition to his service in the Fort Smith School District, Dr. Johnson has served as an assistant principal in the Little Rock, Pulaski County, and Jacksonville North Pulaski School Districts. He also served as a physical education and health education teacher and an assistant coach in football and track and field.

Dr. Johnson will begin his duties at Ramay Junior High on July 1, 2022.
