George A. Swagel

George Swagel graduated from the Kewaunee High School in 1948. While in high school, George participated in FFA, boxing, and photography for the Kewaunatolian newspaper.

Growing up on his family farm, George was fascinated with aircraft and flying. Not long after graduation, he obtained his private pilot's license from the SAC Aero Club. Being in the Air Force and having his pilot's license, he then applied for the Air Force Pilot Training Program. After completing the necessary testing and training, George earned his wings to fly in Class 53-G and graduated in December, 1953. Next, he completed the Advanced All-Weather Interceptor Pilot Program which brought him to his first assignment at Goose Bay, Labrador.

Over the course of his military service, George became qualified to fly 14 different types of aircraft, from fighters, trainers, transporters and bombers that included the F-94, F-89, RF-101, B-66, B-52, and C-123. He also was an Instructor Pilot in four of the aircraft types. He also qualified to fly a variety of civilian aircraft as well and earned his Command Pilot Wings. It is not surprising that George accumulated over 5,000 flying hours during this time!

While in the Air Force, George earned a BGS degree from the University of Nebraska, Omaha. He also completed courses in Jet Engine Accident Investigation, Missile Safety Accident Prevention, Explosives Safety Officer Training, and Squadron Officer School along with an Accident Prevention and Aircraft Accident Investigation Course and the Advanced Safety Management Course from USC, Los Angeles. George was also a military aircraft investigator and investigated 20 major aircraft accidents whereby the aircraft was destroyed and/or fatalities experienced.

After 22 years of outstanding service, George retired from the United States Air Force as Lieutenant Colonel with an Air Medal with four Oak Leaf Clusters, the Good Conduct Medal, the USAF Commendation medal with one Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Vietnam Service Medal.

As a civilian, George received his MBA degree from Gonzaga University of Spokane, Washington. He also studied Photography and received a degree from Spokane Falls Community College, Spokane, Washington and Ground Safety Accident Prevention from New York City University, New York.

George has served as President of his Parish Church Council, President of the Home and School Board, President of his local chapter of the American Society of Safety Engineers, and is a 4th degree member of the Knights of Columbus.

George and his wife Mae will be married for 60 years this June. They have three daughters, and one son who is deceased.
