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Eastern Oregon University	\$350,000	The Oregon Teacher Pathway Program	The Oregon Teacher Pathway is a grow your own teacher program that supports future teachers from high school through college. The program begins in high school with a dual credit course that offers juniors and seniors the opportunity to explore the field of teaching and investigate educational inequalities through a culturally responsive lens. Participants critically examine topics related to schools and communities at the local, state, and national levels through the analysis of current issues affecting the academic performance of cultural, ethnic, and linguistically diverse students. The exploration of multiple perspectives will provide students with the opportunity to study ethnic and cultural diversity in U.S. schools and increase self-awareness regarding the impact of teachers on student success. Upon conclusion of the course students have the opportunity to attend Eastern Oregon University and pursue teacher preparation at a discounted rate and participate in mentoring and professional development while pursuing their teaching degree. The program is grounded in a cycle of mentorship that offers constant support from high school through university graduation and into the first years of teaching. Working together with the Greater Albany Association of Classified Employees (GAA-CE) and the Albany Public School Foundation (APSF), we were able to recruit from the ranks of our classified staff who met our criteria for diversity. Both the Linn-Benton Hispanic Advisory Committee and the Linn-Benton NAACP have been valuable partners in the recruiting and networking of local talent not necessarily connected with our district. We've also worked closely with Linn Benton Community College and Western Oregon University to identify and support our scholarship recipients. Ten of our 15 scholarship recipients have been from within our classified employee ranks. The others have come from our community and higher education partnerships.
