

Parents of 6th and 11th Grade Students

Get ready for 2018-19. Students entering the 7th and 12th grades are required to have immunizations to start school. There is no grace period for these boosters; they must be completed before the 1st day of attendance for the '18-'19 school year.

- Students entering 7th grade and above must have a I time dose of tetanus/diphtheria/acellular pertussiscontaining vaccine (Tdap), if born after September 15, 2000; regardless of the interval since the last tetanus/diphtheria-containing vaccine.
- Students entering 7th grade and above must have I dose of meningococcal if born after September 15, 2004; and 2 doses of meningococcal vaccines for the applicant in 12th grade, if born after September 15, 1999; or I dose if received when the applicant is 16 years of age or older.

Interpretation: Incoming 7th graders need a Tdap and a meningitis shot. Incoming 12th graders need a meningitis shot, if they had the meningitis vaccine before 16 years of age they need a booster!

We request these be completed and to Mrs. Palmer by May 22, 2018 for records to be updated and no interruption to a student's education. If you have any questions contact Vicki Palmer RN at one of the schools or by email vpalmer@riverside.k12.ia.us

On occasion, weather may be so extreme the District will close schools or implement a late start or early dismissal. The following information outlines the communication procedures that will be followed if such school closures or delays become necessary.

I. Media Announcements

Parents and employees should listen to these designated radio or television stations for school closure information between the hours of 5:30-8:00 AM (If schools dismiss early, the media will air the announcement as soon as possible.)

2. Listen for One of These Messages

One of the following messages will be aired by the media:

- "Schools Will Dismiss Early" (day and date)

3. Keep Phones Accessible

Phones will be used for emergencies; therefore, parents are asked not to call the schools or the District.

4. Closures Posted on the Web and Social Media

School closure information will be posted by 6 a.m. on Riverside Community School District website at <u>riversideschools.org</u>, District Facebook Page, District Twitter account, Superintendent Facebook Page and Superintendent Twitter account.

5. Phone, E-mail and Text Notification

Parents will also receive a text, e-mail, phone call from our automated Student Information System (JMC). It is important that parent contact information is updated on a regular basis to make sure you receive this notification.

6. Authorized Statements

The media will only announce school closures when authorized by the Superintendent or his designee after he has consulted with the Transportation Coordinator the National Weather Service, other area schools and other state, county and city agencies.

7. Closures for One Day Only

All announcements are for one day only.

8. Normal Operation

No announcement means normal operation.

9. Parents Need an Emergency Plan

Parents are encouraged to establish an emergency plan for their children in the event that schools are closed, start late or are dismissed early. Parents should instruct their children where to go or what to do if a parent is not at home.

10. Bus Stops

On severe weather days, understand that buses may be running late due to road conditions and/or traffic delays. Please watch for email, phone or text messages regarding delayed bus routes. Parents are asked to wait with and/or meet their students at bus stops when buses are running on delayed or emergency schedules.

11. Make-up Days

Whether or not the day will be made-up once canceled will be determined by the Superintendent.

12. Late Start

When the District has designated a school day as "Schools Will Start Late," the expectation is that employees will arrive at their schools/departments based upon the amount of time the delay has been announced, or as soon as they can arrive safely.

Building Progress-Safe Room Addition

Anderson Construction has been onsite completing the Punch List. Final inspections and Substantial Completion will be completed by the end of the year. By the printing of this newsletter we hope to have Substantial Completion documented and the ability to start utilizing the space.

<u>Transition Planning for the 2018-2019 School year</u>
We have been working on the initial parts of the Transition Plan for the 2018-2019 school year. This includes moving 6th Grade to the new Safe Room Addition at the JHSH and moving 3rd Grade to the Intermediate School in Carson. We will be working to get more information to the staff and the public as we move forward after the first of the year. Watch for the scheduling of a Public Meeting this spring.

Update on the Selection of a lowa State Assessment

The selection of a new statewide assessment will most likely not be moving forward in the upcoming months. When the initial decision by the state was appealed and the appeal was granted, it also required a "stay" on the Department of Education which will not allow them to move forward until the final decision on the initial appeal is heard by the courts. After some discussion with the Department, the biggest realization is that there is no back up plan (unless the legislature changes the law). Things could get interesting before we move ahead with any new State Assessment.

Preparing for the Iowa State Assessment

Each year the district is held publically accountable by taking the state assessment. That assessment will take place on March 19-March 23, 2018. The district will start planning classroom activities to help our students be successful by reducing student stress and integrating preparation into our daily instruction.

Elementary and Intermediate News (Jamie Meek, PK-6 Principal)

We have made it! We are half-way through the school year and are headed toward the finish line. Hopefully you are enjoying the last few days with your family before the craziness starts again.

You may have heard your student talking about Bulldog POWER at that elementary or intermediate school and wondered, well of course my child has Bulldog POWER, but what is it exactly that they have **POWER** about?

Well Bulldog POWER is our acronym for our new PBIS system. PBIS stands for Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports. It is a system that we use to help teach students behavioral, social, and social skills that are used primarily in our schools, but will transfer to everyday life. PBIS takes various elements and breaks them down into expected behaviors in different areas of school and breaks them down into simple things to help remember what a positive behavior looks like. It also has a consequence portion to it that has to do with re-teaching behaviors and expectations that may lead into other forms of discipline if the expectations are not met.

So most PBIS systems have some sort of short acronym or phrase to help students be reminded of the expected behaviors. We have chosen Bulldog POWER as ours. POWER stands for Pride, Ownership, We Take Action, Empathy, and Respect. PBIS systems ask that you break your school down into a variety of zones or areas to teach the expected behaviors in smaller setting. We identified the areas of Restrooms, Lunchrooms, Hallways, Buses, Playground, Classroom, and Special Events as places where we would need to teach expectations to students around the building.

Over the previous school year a team of staff members got together and put together our Bulldog POW-ER materials which included lesson plans, expectations, matrices, and other things to create the Bulldog POWER for the elementary and intermediate schools. Some of the things that we are currently working on are videos to share showing the expectations from POWER, school wide rewards for meeting expectations, and other little pieces to help make it an all-inclusive program.

One of the pieces that the students have really taken to is our Bulldog POWER tickets. Students can earn a POWER ticket for showing Pride, Ownership, We Take Action, Empathy, or Respect, from any staff member, anywhere on campus. Once a ticket is earned it goes to the office to be tracked and then once a week, names are drawn from each class and a short video is made thanking them for showing Bulldog POWER. We also have a drawing once a month for students to be the Pick of the Litter at the elementary school or the Power Pup at the intermediate school. Those students are brought up at an assembly and we celebrate them showing Bulldog POWER with a certificate and small gift. It would be something like a student of the month in each school. Next semester we will be working toward a school wide reward for accruing tickets as a school and have a small school wide reward.

Don't forget that the best way to stay up to date on your child's grades and progress in school is to talk to your child's teacher(s) directly, via email or phone calls. For 4th-6th grade students you can see grades as they are entered into our system via the JMC Parent Access portal at, https://

riversideschools.onlinejmc.com/, click on the Parent icon, enter your username and password and you can see grades. The more staff and families that are on the same page, the more successful a student will be.

5 Ways to Make College a Success

The best source of advice about college may be those who have actually experienced it -- students and alumni. Gallup's comprehensive research on higher education over the years has focused on the outcomes for those who attended institutions of higher education -- their experiences with college and their success in work and life afterward. What follows is the best advice from our research -- some of it counterintuitive -- for making the most of college.

- 1. Get a postsecondary credential or degree. But don't feel like you need to do this until you have a clear -- or somewhat clear -- idea of your goals. People who graduated from college at a later age were less likely to regret their education paths. In fact, think about career and life goals first. Then think about where you want to go and the majors and fields of study that align with those. Then decide how much you are willing to spend -- or take out in loans -- on your education. Many Americans do all of this backward today.
- 2. Don't pursue a bachelor's degree by default. There are many paths to a great career and fulfilling life, including earning technical and career certificates, associate degrees, etc. And you can always stack credentials and degrees over time. Associate degree holders, for example, are more likely than bachelor's degree holders to strongly agree that they have the ideal job for them and that they are deeply interested in their work.
- Don't take on more than \$25,000 in total student loan debt. Graduates with student loan debt over \$25,000 have <u>lower overall well-being</u> and are more likely to regret their education decisions.
- 4. Question the value of attending prestigious, highly selective and high-priced colleges and universities. They actually provide little (at best) to no (at worst) advantage in being engaged in your job and in your <u>life outcomes</u> (thriving in your well-being). Nor do they reduce the chances of feeling education regret. College is *much more* about what you make of it -- how you take advantage of your education -- than the type of institution you attend.
- 5. When you actually attend college, make sure you do the things listed below. Grads who hit the marks on these double their odds of <u>being engaged at work</u> and having thriving wellbeing later in life:
- As best you can, pick professors, not courses. Seek professors who have reputations for being amazing teachers and mentors.
- Invest in a mentor. This goes both ways -- someone who agrees to or offers to mentor you, as well as someone you feel is worth the investment of your time.
- Find a job or internship where you can apply what you're learning, or work to connect what
 you're learning to your current job.
- Take at least a couple of courses that involve long-term projects requiring a semester or more
 of work to complete.
- Don't try to "pad your resume" with a long list of extracurricular activities; get deeply, lastingly
 engaged in at least one.


Postsecondary education is a powerful pathway to a great job and a great life -- but only if you make the most of it. Spread this advice to everyone you know. After all, it comes from the wisdom of hundreds of thousands of students and alumni.



We continued to work toward improving our school system this last semester. Several junior high teachers spent time one afternoon creating consistent expectations for Riverside Jr. High students while they are in the building. These expectations align with our six pillars of Bulldog Pride (trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and citizenship). All teachers were given the information, which clearly defines expectations in different areas of the building (classrooms, auditorium, gym, etc.), as well as for different activities and events. 7th and 8th grade students were all given a handout of these expectations, and they keep them in their Chromebook cases.

The expectations are not significantly different than what we've expected all school year, but there is more detailed information with examples for students. We want to ensure that there is consistency for students throughout the day. We know that increased communication and consistency will lead to more success for teachers and students. RIVERSIDE FOOD DRIVE IS A SUCCESS (Callie Kallsen)






















More Elementary News (Julie Ravlin)


