



The Class of 2018 included: Marion Coons, Clark Christensen, Wm (Rich) Livengood, Dr. Trevor Richardson, Dr. Corey Vorthmann, 1996 Riverside Wrestling Team, 2001 Riverside Football Team, John McCowen and Carmella Pigneri.

The Class of 2019 induction ceremony will be held on Thursday October 3, 2019 at 2:30 PM in The Riverside Middle/High School Gym at 18997 Hwy 59 Oakland, IA and our 2019 inductees will also be featured in our Homecoming Parade on Friday October 4, 2019 at 2:00 PM in Oakland. The final recognition will take place prior to our Homecoming Football Game on Friday October 4, 2019 at the Charles E Pigneri Athletic Complex at 6:45 PM. The Selection Committee would like to announce the following members of the Class of 2019:

Nicole Allen Osborn-Distinguished Graduate-Riverside Class of 1994

Nicole founded Meridian Clinical Research in 1999 in Omaha, NE. Under her guidance, Meridian grew from a single dedicated research center in Omaha, NE, to a network that includes more than 20 research sites and 60 principal investigators across North America. Under Osborn's direction, research at Meridian is frequently published and presented at major scientific and academic events worldwide.

Donell Hotze Kvaal-Distinguished Graduate-Riverside Class of 1996

Donell has distinguished herself in the Riverside community as a community leader volunteering her time for numerous community organizations. She helped her softball teams to the state tournament in her 8th grade year (Carson-Macedonia) and again her senior year (Riverside). She went on to play at Central College where she was the 2000 NFCA Division II Softball Player of the Year. She already has been inducted into the Central College Hall of Honor and the Iowa High School Softball Hall of Fame.

John W Hamilton-Friend of Riverside

John was a Civil War Veteran who served with Company A 134th Indiana Infantry. He settled near Macedonia and was a farmer and raised livestock. As a noted philanthropist, he donated the money for a new Church and Parsonage in Macedonia (Macedonia United Methodist Church) in 1929. He also donated land to the Macedonia School for the Hamilton Athletic Field and to build the Softball Field Grandstand. The historic grandstand is said to be one of two remaining in the state of lowa. He dedicated the field to the children of Macedonia in memory of John G Hamilton, his son who died at the age of 22.

Marilyn Mickey-Distinguished Graduate-Carson-Macedonia Class of 1964, Friend of Riverside, Riverside Board Member and Riverside Employee

Marilyn has distinguished herself in many ways and has shown a tremendous commitment to the community and the school district in her lifetime. Marilyn is a member of the Riverside Optimists Club, Riverside Links, PEO, Carson Park Board, Macedonia United Methodist Church, and the Riverside Booster Club, to name just a few. She volunteers time for Quilts of Valor, Honor Flight, Dreamland Theatre, 4-H Leader, Sunday School Teacher, Metro Area Youth Foundation, and is a Promise Scholarship Mentor. She served on the Riverside School Board, was employed as the Board Secretary and has already been inducted into the 4-H Hall of Fame.

1973-1974 Carson-Macedonia Football Team-Team/Group-Coaches Larry Wax and Terry Statton

This team has the distinction of being only one of 15 teams in Iowa High School Football history and the most recent to be undefeated, untied, and unscored upon, and the only team to accomplish it in the playoff era. They were 7-0 and Western Iowa Conference Co-Champions with Avoca who they did not play that year. They were 8-0 overall with a strong defense that had 33 takeaways (20 interceptions, 13 fumbles and blocked 2 punts). Several opponents threatened to score, but non succeeded, stopped by turnovers, strong defensive stands, timely tackles, and missed field goal attempts. Lead by Coaches Larry Wax and Terry Statton with Duane Laughlin being named a National Football All-American by Who's Who in National High School Football.



J Elementary Music Notes J

Preschool through second-grade students have been enjoying a variety of musical activities to begin the year. Classes begin with pitch exploration to help find their singing voices, which should be high and light, then move on to echo songs where they sing the same pitches, words, and volume as the teacher. We follow this with simple songs they may already know, work on the school song, and songs with actions. Some of the favorites so far are "All Around the Kitchen," "Kye Kye Kule" (pronounced 'chay chay cool-aye'), "John Kanaka, and "A Ram Sam Sam."





Ariosoland is new to the classes this year. In Ariosoland, everything is sung instead of spoken, so the teacher will sing a question such as "What is your favorite food?" and the students take turns singing their answers. One day we used funny pens with faces and hair for two students to have a sung conversation. Laughter ensued, as the pen names were BaBa and WaWa, so that was all they could sing for their questions and answers.

The students are also glad that Freddie the Frog and his friend Eli the Elephant have returned from Treble Clef Island to help them on their journey to learn more about the written language of music. We just finished reading Freddie the Frog and the Thump in the Night by Sharon Burch, about how Freddie first met Eli. The map of Treble Clef Island is the music staff. Freddie lives on the top line and Eli lives on the bottom line, giving students an introduction to note names on the staff. One final note: The elementary winter program will be December 9 in the Middle School/
High School gym. PK-2 will begin at 6:30, followed by 3-5 at 7:15. Mark your calendars for a fun night to kick off your holiday season!



Extended Learning Program News (Bonnie Kramer)

What is an extended learning program? After many concerns and misconceptions about our talented and gifted program, this name may be easier to explain and understand. Generally, to be identified as gifted, a student needs to be capable of doing work two grades above current grade level with 80% accuracy. In early grades, this can be difficult to measure, and other identification relies on standardized test scores, classroom assessments, and behavioral data gathered over time.

Many elementary students can benefit from extensions to the classroom curriculum because they may have already mastered the content, or learn at a quicker pace. This ability can vary from subject to subject, or even with different units. Because of this, the groups in the elementary buildings are somewhat fluid, or flexible. This means that a student may be in a pull-out group for a while, then not be pulled out the next quarter or learning unit.

By calling this program extended learning, rather than talented and gifted (TAG), I hope to avoid confusion. This type of intervention should happen whenever it is needed, rather than based on a label that may or may not be accurate in early elementary years. Exceptions almost always occur, and some students may be truly gifted, which we can confirm with more testing, such as the Cognitive Abilities Test, intelligence testing performed by the school psychologist, or other above-level testing.

With this extended learning program, we can cast a wider net, challenging more students, while continuing to observe and determine the best course of services for the future. Emphasis is placed upon communicating ideas, creating ways to demonstrate learning, and problem-solving. Once a student enters middle school, advanced learning interventions are more specific, and will include more of the affective skills a highability student sometimes lacks, such as time-management and organizational skills, advocating for needs without being disrespectful, and the struggles of perfectionism. High school gifted students generally have needs met with higher-level class choices, but some will need mentoring with online classes, help with job-shadowing opportunities, or assistance with scholarships, as well as encouragement to pursue interests through competitions.

We are very excited to get this next phase done for the Carson Elementary. If everything works out, on September 30, 2019 we will have a new playground to play on and then we can move to installing a basketball court.

Elementary News (Jamie Meek, PreK-5 Principal)

Well, we are officially 6 weeks into school! It is hard to believe that it has gone by so fast. The end of the first quarter is right around the corner and Parent Teacher Conferences are soon. If you have questions or concerns about what is going on in your child's classroom don't wait until Monday, October 28 or Wednesday, October 30, this year's conference nights, to have conversations with your child's teacher. Please note that the conference nights are a little different than in the past due to Halloween being on a Thursday this year.

At both elementary schools, we are in full swing of the state-mandated reading assessments. As a grade level finishes its assessment, they meet to look at that data and help decide which students need a little extra help in reading until the next screening period in January. Both schools have been working hard and went to some trainings over the summer and will take some during this school year to provide more targeted reading instruction for struggling readers. Teachers have put in extra work to make sure that a struggling reader gets what they need to be successful. We are also working hard this year in our third year of our new math curriculum, Investigations Math, in grades K-5th grade. We will be trial-testing the state suggested math screener this fall to see what kind of information it can give us on our students.

Second through fifth grade have jumped into using their Chromebooks. Students are using them a lot during the day for a variety of reasons. As I walk around I am seeing some great things being created, researched, and read about using this great technology. Take some time and ask your child how they use their Chromebook, most of them, on a daily basis.

I cannot stress enough that having open and honest communication is vital to the success of your child in school. Teachers, paraeducators, and I want both you and your child's experience to be a positive and successful one. It is important to talk with any member of our school when an issue comes up. Be open with problems that your child is having at school, even if your child asks you not to talk to the school. Send emails or make phone calls so that everyone who is in contact with your child is on the same page. We want everyone in the community including families, students, and staff to have the best Riverside experience that they can!





October 2019 Topic: Influenza

The annual Riverside flu vaccine clinic will be on Wednesday, October 9th.

We will start administering them at 9am at the Oakland Elementary; once we are done we will go to the IH/HS, followed by Carson Elementary.

We will need a consent form filled out and signed. Also, new this year is that we will need a copy of the insurance card of any person receiving the vaccine.

The consent form for the flu shot clinic will be sent home with the Carson and Oakland elementary students and that the MS/HS students need to pick up the consent from the office.

Influenza Facts: Influenza (the flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by a virus. It can range in severity from mild to severe, even death. Symptoms usually come on abruptly and can include fever, chills, cough, sore throat, runny/stuffy nose, muscle and body aches, headache, and fatigue.

People with the flu are most contagious in the first 3-4 days after their illness begins. You can actually infect others I day BEFORE symptoms develop and up to 5-7 days after becoming sick.

Once you are exposed and infected with the flu virus, symptoms usually begin about 2 days later (average I-4 days).

Influenza is spread by tiny droplets from coughing, sneezing, and even talking. You can also get the flu by touching a surface that has the flu virus on it and then touching your own mouth, nose, or eyes.

Prevention and hand washing are a few of the most important steps in preventing the flu. The flu vaccine reduces flu related illness and possible complications from the flu.

Public Hearing-Continuation of the Instructional Support Levy

A school district may establish an Instructional Support Program to provide additional funding in the General Fund. The Program may be established by a board resolution up to five years or approved by the voters up to 10 years. The Program may be funded by all property tax or a combination of property tax and income surtax. The total Program may not exceed 10% of the district's regular program district cost. The revenues from the Instructional Support Program may be expended for any purpose allowed from the General Fund but may not be used to supplant funding authorized to be received for returning dropout and dropout prevention programs, gifted and talented programs, PPEL levy, Management levy, or special education deficits. Iowa Code section 257.18. This is a continuation for another five years (has been in place the last five budget years) and not a Tax Increase for the Riverside Community School District. It is funded by a combination on property tax and Income Surtax.

Educational Game Plan-Focus on Early Learning

What: The weight of a sizable body of evidence indicates that high quality child care and preschool programs make a substantial difference in preparing children for school. So child care and preschool programs can generate meaningful impacts, early learning experiences need to be rich and engaging. Implementing a high-quality child care and preschool program well requires a program day that provides adequate, productive learning time and activities; and child assessments used to individualize learning. The need for high-quality early childhood education has never been greater. Increasingly, children are growing up in families where all available parents are working—out of necessity as well as choice. Furthermore, research continues to affirm the short- and long-term benefits for children who participate in high-quality early learning programs.

Why: Child Care and Preschool programs are often held up as savvy investments, in large part due to economic analyses signaling large returns on investment. Estimates of returns on investment in preschool range from the modest—\$2 for every \$1 invested when examined just a few years after preschool—to the substantial—\$17 for every \$1 invested when tracked through adulthood. The largest returns have been observed among high-intensity programs that have documented long-term benefits such as lower rates of incarceration and higher earnings well into adulthood. More modest returns from contemporary programs, on the other hand, are usually based on short-term benefits such as reductions in special education placements and grade retention in elementary and middle school. These can be expected to predict longer term benefits as children grow into adulthood and are more likely to graduate and gain productive employment. Importantly, however, no cost-benefit analysis of a high-quality child care or preschool program has ever found zero return, and any return that exceeds \$1 for every \$1 spent means the program more than pays for itself.

Know the Facts

Instructional Support Levy

A school district may establish an Instructional Support Program to provide additional funding in the General Fund. The Program may be established by a board resolution up to five years or approved by the voters up to 10 years. The Program may be funded by all property tax or a combination of property tax and income surtax. The total Program may not exceed 10% of the district's regular program district cost. The revenues from the Instructional Support Program may be expended for any purpose allowed from the General Fund but may not be used to supplant funding authorized to be received for returning dropout and dropout prevention programs, gifted and talented programs, PPEL levy, Management levy, or special education deficits, lowa Code section 257.18.

The board must follow these steps:

- Put the proposal to implement the instructional support program including the funding method in the form of a board resolution.
- Publish the notice of the time and place for a public hearing on the resolution not less than ten days nor more than twenty days before the hearing in a newspaper of general circulation in the district.
- Act at the public hearing or later, but no later than thirty days after the date of the hearing
 - To adopt a resolution to participate in the instructional support program for a period not exceeding five years
 - Direct the county commissioner of elections to submit the question of participation in the program for a
 period not exceeding ten years to the registered voters of the district at an election on a date specified in Iowa
 Code 39.2(4)(c).
- If the question is submitted to the voters and a majority favor participation in the program, the board shall adopt a resolution to participate and shall certify the results of the election to the Department of Management.
- If the question was not submitted to the voters, but the resolution was adopted by the board, the board shall participate in the program unless within 28 days after the board takes action on the resolution a petition is submitted to the board secretary with the required number of signatures requesting that the question be submitted to the voters. At the expiration of the 28-day period, if no petition is received, the board shall certify its action to the Department of Management.

Instructional Support Levy-Riverside

- The Instructional Support Program was approved by the Board and included in the FY16, FY17, FY 18, FY 19 & FY 20 Budgets
- This proposal is for the continuation for another five years starting in FY21 and is not a tax increase for the Riverside Community School District. It will be continued to be funded by a combination on property tax and Income Surtax.
- Monday August 19, 2019-The Board passed a resolution to "Consider Continued Participation in the Instructional Support Program and to Schedule a Board Hearing". Setting the Public Hearing for Monday September 16, 2019 at 7:00 PM
- A Public Hearing Notice entitled "Notice of Consideration of Proposal to Continue Participation in the Instructional Support Program" was posted in The Herald per Iowa Code.
- A Public Hearting was held on Monday September 16, 2019 at 7:00 PM as posted and no public comments were received.
- September 16, 2019- The Board passed a resolution to "Consider Continued Participation in the Instructional Support Program".
- If no petition is filed within 28 days, the district will certify its intent to participate in the Instructional Support Program with the Department of Management for the next five years.

For FY20 the Property Tax Rate is 0.3207 raising \$121,316.00 in revenue and the Income Surtax percentage is 9% raising \$276,006.00 for a total of \$397,322.00 for the General Fund.
