Meet Stacy Alley, she teaches secondary math and has been a fully online teacher for LCPS for the past ten years. Stacy teaches high school probability, statistics, and credit recovery classes. Switching hats, Stacy is deep rooted in Canvas management to support teachers, administrators, students and parents, ensuring Canvas runs smoothly. Stacy also works hand in hand with Canvas Development Teams providing helpful feedback on products coming out.

Stacy Alley works with Canvas Manager and Advanced Science teacher, Amy Ewing at LCPS. They are both known in the district as the LCPS Canvas Managers who help train Canvas Captains at each school on how to best help their individual campus with Canvas needs. More than ten years ago, they helped start up the VLA program after online classes became part of a graduation requirement with Honors, Dual Credit and Advanced Placement courses.

"Something that has been going on throughout these years, is that Canvas and online learning, because of that graduation requirement, had already been in place at all of our comprehensive high schools before COVID even hit," said Ewing. "So that was helpful too. Not just the group of VLA teachers and adjunct teachers who knew what they were doing in Canvas, but kids as well." It can be said that Stacy and Amy are somewhat pioneers in the world of education for New Mexico. Together they created the roadmap for virtual learning, navigating through the times where the district faced a technology crisis, and what would soon to become their greatest challenge yet, steering the ship of virtual learning during an unforeseen global pandemic. *(continued)*

The challenges of the pandemic caused the abrupt switch to remote learning, and with nearly 30 teachers in the district who taught online classes, the greater challenge became the mission to find a way to teach more than 2,500 staff members and over 24,000 public students how to use Canvas. Numbers for the Virtual Learning Academy saw an increase from about 35 fully online students to more than 900 signed on for VLA.

With teamwork and resiliency, Stacy and Amy took on the challenge training Canvas Captains at each school in the district, leading their team through the uncertain times under the Leadership of Josh Silver; LCPS Chief Technology Officer, Stephanie Hanway; Virtual Learning Academy Principal, and Dr. Wendi Miller-Tomlinson; Deputy Superintendent for Division of Teaching, Learning, Leadership & Research at LCPS.

"We were already using the Canvas Learning platform before the state decided to adopt it," said Alley. "So, we were ahead of the game. As rough as times have seemed over these last couple of years, we're leading the way in the state."

It was an adjustment for the entire district, students and teachers alike embracing Canvas during remote learning. It was an assembly of knowledge and teamwork that made it all possible. Just before the pandemic hit, Josh Silver and Matt Dawkins from the districts IT team worked to make sure every student in the district had a laptop and access to internet connection at home to get their schoolwork done.

"None of this would be possible without Jim Schapekahm," said Kent Thurston, looking around the house on Mesa Moreno Drive that was built, in part, by LCPS students. According to Thurston, who attended Las Cruces Public Schools, Shapekahm allocated part of his own budget at Organ Mountain High School to make sure students in Mr. John Arguello's class had the tools they needed. According to Arguello, students in the residential construction class learn concepts in the first year and move on to basic framing. In their third year, they got the opportunity to be part of Education House, a project spearheaded by the Las Cruces Home Builders Association.

"There's a stage when we have to step back," said Arguello. "We bring in professionals when it's out of the scope of work students can do, but for the most part, they have had a hand in every stage of construction."

Nicole Black, Executive Director for LCHBA, said Education House is a project her organization hopes to continue. Thurston, whose company, KT Homes, sponsored Education House, says he's ready to start planning the next one.

"All proceeds from the sale of this house will go toward the program. The kids need additional supplies and tools, and this is a valuable opportunity for them to learn real-world applications of the concepts they can't get inside a classroom."

A statewide virtual connection: How LCPS offers online education statewide

If necessity is the mother of invention, the pandemic of our generation has created several innovative avenues in the way of education. None has had more of an impact than the evolution of virtual school, and a new consortium that includes Las Cruces Public Schools is creating a hub for learning that is accessible to more than just students in Las Cruces.

The New Mexico Virtual Course Consortium (NMVC²) is a network of public school districts and charter schools under the guidance of the New Mexico Public Education Department to provide high quality, standards-aligned supplemental online courses for subject areas that might be difficult to staff locally. For example, a student in Sierra County who would like to take an AP English class can enroll with LCPS and get that instruction online while staying enrolled in their home district.

Opportunities like that are currently made possible because districts across the state have made themselves available to host any student whose circumstances cannot be accommodated by their district school. In LCPS, we offer K-12 courses through our OWL (Online With LCPS) program, an extension of the Virtual Learning Academy (VLA) under my direction along with Stephanie Hanway, who is the principal of VLA. In all, LCPS joins six other districts in the NMVC²: the Pecos Cyber Academy, Cuba Public schools, TriStar Academy in Santa Rosa, Fort Sumner, and Vaughn, the School of Dreams Academy in Los Lunas, Taos Municipal Schools, and the Taos Academy Charter School. The consortium can provide up to four virtual courses per student, either as a supplement to their current course of study, or as an online substitute for classes that their home school currently does not offer. Right now, students cannot enroll full-time with the consortium, but it is open to homeschooled students looking for enriched learning opportunities outside of their homeschool curriculum.

As a parent, taxpayer, or educator, an obvious question after learning about the consortium is how can all this be possible if the state funds a district according to enrollment? If you look at education as a business and districts as providers of a service, then the service is instruction, and the cost is a pass-through between districts under a memorandum of understanding. Using the previous example, our student in Sierra County is funded by the state and those monies are paid to the home district where the student resides. The home district would then reimburse LCPS using set rates. Consortium fees are \$375 per semester, per course in middle school and high school. For elementary students, those fees are \$700 per year or \$375 per semester. Fees are set by the consortium and help to cover administrative costs.

As the consortium continues to gain traction, we hope additional districts will find value in offering this unique opportunity to provide additional course resources to their students. Any state authorized district that can offer standards-based curriculum can become a member.

As we continue to redefine education in a virtual setting, the consortium, and the opportunities it provides, is creating a foundation for student success no matter students live.
