District Updates

Spotlight on Women's History Month

Madison Public Schools is celebrating Women's History Month throughout March. Here is a sampling of the many activities taking place in recognition of the contributions and achievements of women throughout history.

- At MHS, a wide variety of inquiries have been ongoing across all disciplines. For example, in US History II, students completed a project that involved looking at primary sources through document-based questions (DBQ's) that highlight the contributions of women during WWII and the impact the war had on the modern women's rights movement. In World History, students are researching impactful women and are composing a tweet from that person's perspective reflecting on her contributions in history. English classes are spotlighting female authors and English 10 students are working on a women's reading unit and examining texts through the lens of gender.
- At MJS, science classes are exploring the Smithsonian "Picturing Women Inventors Poster Exhibition," which is a series of eight posters that examines the inventions of 19 highly-accomplished American women. Astronauts, computer pioneers, and business women join athletes, engineers, and even teenagers in this remarkable group of inventors. ESL students investigated the incredible story of Bessie Coleman, America's first Black and Native American female pilot. Throughout the other disciplines, the lives and work of many female mathematicians, writers, and other prominent historical figures are being examined.
- In grades K-5, the stories of famous women throughout history have been shared through morning announcements, meaningful readalouds, student exploration during the biography units, art, music, and other subjects. A wide range of sources has been examined in order to provide students with background on women's contributions in the fields of science, literature, history, and the arts.

Members of each school's "Green Team" will present on the school-based project along with members of environmental clubs from Drew University and Fairleigh Dickinson University. Madison High School

The selection of 7500 Merit Scholarship winners from the group of approximately 15,000 Finalists (less than 1% of US high school seniors) is now in progress. Good luck Artha and Skylar!

Skylar is 1 of 150 seniors across the country who earned the award and was selected from over 68,000 applicants. Skylar was selected for her academic excellence, leadership, and service demonstrated in school and community activities. She has earned a \$20,000 scholarship and will participate in the Coca-Cola Scholars Leadership Development Institute facilitated by program alumni.
- Elise Hart (11th grade) has been selected as a Finalist for the 2022 New Jersey Scholars Program (NJSP), *Into the Borderlands Exploring the Space Between Big Ideas*. This five-week summer program provides rising seniors of extraordinary academic potential with a free, ungraded, diverse, inclusive, and residential interdisciplinary learning environment that sharpens critical thinking, writing, and research skills, stimulates a desire for life-long learning, and fosters lasting interpersonal connections.
- On February 24th, 32 MHS students departed for Boston to take part in Harvard Model Congress, a premier government simulation. This new assessment for 11th grade students is part of the updated graduation assessment requirements for students in the classes of 2023-2025. The assessment is aligned to New Jersey State Learning Standards from tenth grade English, Algebra I and Geometry. This test was mandatory and students could not opt out. Testing consisted of four, 90-minute units (2 English/2 Math) with one unit completed each day.
