Preparing for Life after High School while in High School (Part 1)

Part of the goal of the school district's Academic and Career Plan is to get students and their parents and their teachers talking *early* about plans after high school. Whether the student wants to go directly into the workforce, attend a two year college or four year college, the military or a combination of any of those options, it is important to start working toward this goal early. We get it, plans change. Sometimes along the way a student discovers they have a passion or talent for something that they never knew existed before.

The critical component in finding and pursuing your passion, interests, and talents is flexibility and exposure. We encourage all grade 6-12 parents to access their child's Career Cruising Account. Ask your child for this login information.

While in High School

- Select Courses Carefully. We are a small school but we have a lot of options in each subject area. If you're not sure something is offered by our school, ask. We have access to a lot of courses that are not physically taught at Pecatonica High School.
- Get the Info. It's not too early to start exploring colleges, admissions requirements, or touring a future place of employment. If there is a job that you think you'd like to do, see if there are any internships, part-time jobs, or volunteer opportunities. One way I found out I did not want to be a doctor was by volunteering at the local hospital.
- Plan to take the Tests. In February, the school district requires every junior to take the ACT. We even offer "ACT Prep" that students can start in the fall at no charge to the student. If you are interested in an apprenticeship or military, there are tests for those too. <u>ACT.org</u> also has a test "question of the day," and sample tests.
- Gather letters of recommendation. You may need letters of recommendation for scholarships, college applications, and job applications. Ask early, and ask those teachers who you have a good relationship with, or ask current employer.
- Make the Summers Count. We know you're busy.
 We get it. Employers and colleges and many
 scholarships want to see that you put your
 summers to good use. Start documenting your
 experiences: work, volunteering, committees,
 summer extended learning, athletic camps, and 4H
 are all great ways to reflect how motivated you are
 and also show how you are developing your
 passions or your interests.

PECATONICA'S COMPUTER SCIENCE FACTS

There is a lot of press about how Wisconsin schools are now adopting computer science since the State of Wisconsin recently adopted learning standards.

Did you know that...

- Pecatonica High School is among only 60 schools in Wisconsin (STATEWIDE!) that offers AP Computer Science. We are the only high school in the Southwestern part of the state that offers any computer science classes.
- Beginning in 2017-18, our middle school students, in addition to desktop publishing, also receive a robotics curriculum as part of business education and computer science. They also become beginning coders!
- Our elementary students are learning keyboarding as a part of the curriculum beginning in Kindergarten. The goal is that they will know how to type when they enter middle school and middle school can explore more opportunities in robotics, coding, 3D printing, and applications development.
- Each year our computer sciences program grows!

To Communities ... The only impressions visitors may have of a community may be those formed when they travel to venues and events where school sports and other activities take place. When athletes and fans display sportsmanship at school-based activities, it creates a positive perception of one's community — and can impact family and employee decisions on where to live and enroll their children.
