Full STEAM Ahead for DE and LP

It was one of those moments a teacher will always remember. Katie Van Eps, who heads the STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts and math) classes at Durand-Eastman, had just doused herself with some water she was carrying to her classroom.

"One of my students said, oh Mrs. Van Eps, that's an unbalanced force there, and he laughed about it, but that was exactly what we had been learning about in class the week before."

For Van Eps and Jason DeJohn, who runs the program at Laurelton Pardee, things like this happen all the time. Students are taking what they learn in class and applying it in the real world.

"When I show them something they tell me they went home and spent time doing it. Or I make something and they show me what they made at home, that's a new one for me and I get to celebrate it with the kids," said DeJohn.

The STEAM curriculum is relatively new but it has definitely struck a chord with a number of students. Kids who might not feel like they are the best when it comes to math or English have been able to apply themselves to this work, and sometimes are surprised by what they are

actually doing.

"They come in here and they can do the activities, and they're not easy," DeJohn says. "Then you sayyou just did math, and you had to be creative with it."



The projects being done cover a wide range of skills and subjects, including coding robots, graphic design and 3D printing. The work they do isn't just limited to the classroom either.

"If they show a talent or an interest in it, we have challenges for kids to tap into so there's an opportunity for them that they might not have

realized was a talent or a strength of theirs prior to this program," explained Van Eps.

She says the kids are learning plenty, but at the same time they are having plenty of fun.

"You really see the kids' ownership, passion, excitement and energy come out. That is so neat for us to see, their classroom teachers and their parents."

She really sees that energy come out in an unlikely place, when one of their projects fails.

It's not just the end results that excite these teachers, it's the process and the way the kids have embraced it.

"They have to be creative and come up with an idea, they have to make a plan and then create something, test it and go back and fix it if it didn't work out. We get to give that to the kids with every project we do with them," said DeJohn.

In fact, according to Van Eps, some of the best moments come out of things gone wrong.

"In the classroom if they fail on a multiplication problem it isn't so exciting that they want to go back and correct it, but in the STEM lab if you're building something and there's a fail, you really want to go and fix it."

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
New Principal Ready to Take EIMS to the Max

Max has served as assistant principal for the last three years and has been with the district for 12. He knows that middle school can be a tough time to navigate, but likes to look at things through a more positive lens.

"Challenges are more opportunities. I think our biggest goal here is to just build the skills of our students so they are ready for the high school."

The season will conclude with the State Championships in Syracuse on April $3^{\rm rd.}$








LP Puts Spotlight on Reading
