Lindsey,

I am attaching my attempt to respond to the FOIA request based on my search of my district email. I have to say this whole situation has me perplexed. If we do not have systems in place that can efficiently and effectively accommodate fulfilling our legal requirements, we'd better take a look at that. However, given my search this morning, I am having trouble understanding that to be the case.

I cannot understand why the first response appears to be curtailed. I was able to easily search my emails and a small number (63 of the 4,045 total emails I have) pulled quickly as containing the key words on the FOIA. It took me perhaps 30 minutes to search and then print the emails that were responsive.

If there are other reasons that we are having trouble delivering what the district should to ensure transparency, we need to address them. It puts the district at risk to not fulfill our legal requirements and that risk burden is then transferred to our community and taxpayers.

I want to say very clearly here that I am not the FOIA officer and am not technically trained and employed by the district, This search was my attempt to responsibly participate in the fulfillment of our FOIA obligations. There are other emails that may need to be reviewed and pulled and perhaps additional searches may be needed. Certainly this is a good start for that, but I will not assume the responsibility for ensuring this is complete and

accurate and all of the typical steps for this process should still be followed. However, it seems clear that our first response to this request was incomplete.

I am happy to take any additional steps that can help this process. Please let me know if there is anything I can do.



I don't know how many of the other board members received a letter in the mail from the MPE Teachers, so I am including it as an attachment here.

I received this letter and am very concerned with the content. I am asking you to add items to the agenda for Monday's meeting and republish. We have time to get that done today and still meet OMA requirements. This information in this letter is very concerning and important. In speaking with staff members, I understand that the situation is so dire that some are considering resigning over the conditions.

I am requesting the following items be added for Monday:

- 1. Staffing at MPE and concerns regarding the letter sent to Board
- Members

 2. Discussion about the negotiating team for upcoming negotiations
- 3. Close session for discussion of specific employees

With respect to item 2 above, I feel that with the situation this complex and issues that need board level attention, the board should negotiate as a whole for the upcoming contract. There is no reason that all of us cannot participate. To allow only a subset of board members to participate serves to further the divide of information flow that currently exists. I believe the

board needs to discuss this process, especially since the rumor mill is suggesting that a committee has already been chosen and there has been no discussion whatsoever by the board about this decision.

If we cannot amend Monday's agenda, I believe we need to call a special meeting for later this week to address this important and time sensitive situation. For us to receive a letter like this via the US mail indicates to me the fear of retribution I hear so often from our staff is in full force and in my opinion cannot be ignored any longer.

For us to receive a letter like this via the US mail indicates to me the fear of retribution I hear so often from our staff is in full force and in my opinion cannot be ignored any longer.

The debate over school discipline policies

In recent years, debate has taken place among school board members, scholars, and advocacy groups about school discipline policies.

Below, Heather Cunningham, an Assistant Professor of Education at Chatham University, writes that schools should move away from systems of discipline that tend to punish students for mistakes. Cunningham says systems that often suspend or expel students for misbehavior are systemically racist. She says new systems of discipline should pull students closer to helpful resources instead of pushing them out of schools.

Max Eden, a senior fellow at the Manhattan Institute, writes that more attention should be paid to student experiences under less-punitive discipline systems. Eden says less-punitive discipline systems in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, did not reduce student arrests and contributed to lower math achievement in middle schools and predominantly Black schools.

Restorative Discipline: Classroom Management for Equity and Justice | Heather Cunningham, writing at Green Schools National Network

"Educators who want to work against the systemic racism found in their school's punitive discipline system can consider a different framework for classroom management and building school culture. Using practices rooted in restorative discipline is a promising way to do this. Restorative discipline is an approach to classroom management rooted in restorative justice philosophy. This philosophy advocates that schools should be places where young people are able to make mistakes, reflect upon and learn from these mistakes, and correct them as they continue to learn and grow. In terms of academics, U.S. schools have embraced to learn and grow. In terms of academics, U.S. schools have embraced assignments, receive feedback from their teachers, learn from their errors, and continue to grow."

"Last week, the first randomized control trial study of 'restorative justice' in a major urban district, Pittsburgh Public Schools, was published by the RAND Corporation.

The results were curiously mixed. Suspensions went down in elementary but not middle schools. Teachers reported improved school safety, professional environment, and classroom management ability. But students disagreed. They thought their teachers' classroom management deteriorated, and that students in class were less respectful and supportive of each other, at a lower confidence interval, they reported bullying and more instructional time lost to disruption. And although restorative justice is billed as a way to fight the 'school-to-prison pipeline,' it had no impact on student arrests. The most troubling prison pipeline,' it had no impact on student arrests. The most troubling achieve were significant and substantial negative effects on math achievement for middle school students, black students, and students in schools that are predominantly black."




School board candidates per seat up for election, $2018-2022^{1}$

Primary preview: Nebraska's State Board of Education May 10 primaries

On May 10, voters will decide primaries for four of the <u>State Board of Education</u>'s eight nonpartisan seats. The Board's statewide health education standards, first proposed in March 2021, have figured prominently in the runup to the primaries.

In March 2021, the Board released a draft of proposed statewide health education standards that, <u>according</u> to the *Scottsbluff Star-Herald*, "would have in elementary school." A number of parents, and Gov. <u>Pete Ricketts</u> (R), have criticized the non-binding standards.

The Board released a <u>revised draft</u> in July that $\overline{\text{removed}}$ "many references to sexual identity, sexual orientation, gender identity, roles and stereotypes." OutNebraska, an organization whose mission is to "empower, celebrate and grow LGBTQ+ communities in Nebraska," said "This erasure does nothing to protect LGBTQ+ students. The fact that LGBTQ+ people exist should not be controversial." Ricketts $\overline{\text{said}}$ that although the revised draft was an improvement over the first, the standards "still need improvement."

In September, the Board $\frac{\sqrt{\cot d}}{\sqrt{\cot d}}$ to shelve the proposed standards.

Board member <u>Robin Stevens</u>, who is running in the Seat 7 primary on May 10, was one of the five who voted to stop development of the standards.

Stevens, who assumed office in 2019, <u>said</u>. "I want people to know that there has never been a vote by the state board to either approve or disapprove the proposed health standards ... I felt like the language that was used in parts of the health standards was too raw and therefore inappropriate."

Stevens faces two challengers: Pat Moore and Elizabeth Tegtmeier.

Moore is a pastor who has emphasized local control of education decisions. In

response to a question on <u>Ballotpedia's</u> Candidate Connection survey Moore said, "Comprehensive sex education and Critical Race Theory concepts need to be removed from education in Nebraska."

Tegtmeier, a former public school teacher, <u>said</u>. "The board became so wrapped up in activist causes that attempted to indoctrinate our children that they neglected their duty to our local school districts." Tegtmeier <u>said</u> she "promises to protect Nebraska's children from harmful ideologies that promote racially divisive ideas and inappropriate sexual content."

Gov. Pete Ricketts (R), Lt. Gov. Mike Foley (R), several Republican state senators, and several county Republican parties <u>endorsed</u> Tegtmeier.

All three Seat 7 candidates are <u>Republicans</u>.

Members are elected to four-year terms in nonpartisan elections. Four of eight seats are up for election this year. Three incumbents are running in 2022. One other incumbent, <u>Democrat</u> Deborah Meary, faces a primary with two challengers for the District 8 seat. The District 5 and District 6 seats saw two candidates file a piece, meaning the candidates will skip a primary and face off in the November general election.

The State Board of Education's responsibilities include oversight and supervision of the state's K-12 public schools.

San Francisco Mayor appoints new school board members

On March 11, San Francisco Mayor London Breed <u>appointed</u> Ann Hsu, Lainie Motamedi, and Lisa Weissman-Ward to the San Francisco Unified School District school board, filling vacancies caused by a Feb. 15 recall election.

San Francisco voters recalled Gabriela López, Alison Collins, and Faauuga Moliga. Recall supporters said they were frustrated that schools in the district remained closed for nearly a year in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and upset the board spent time voting to rename 44 buildings in the district rather than trying to reopen schools.

In the aftermath of the election, López <u>said</u>. "None of this is a surprise. We've been threatened of a recall, maybe even six months into our term because of what we were highlighting. What we were bringing up. What we were challenging. The issue that I am pointing to is when that comes from people of color, primarily women of color, that is enough of a problem to silence us. How they achieved that was through a recall."

The group behind the recall effort published a list of 21 potential candidates.

Hsu and Motamedi were on that list. Siva Raj, who co-led the recall effort, said, "I think the next year is going to be critical for the school district. We have so many issues to deal with firstly a new superintendent to hire, there's a learning loss, there's also the budget crisis that we need to solve."

The new board members will stand for election in November 2022.

The debate over how teachers unions affect schools and policies

School districts throughout the country negotiate contracts with teachers unions. Debates about the impact of unions in school districts are a perennial feature of the policy landscape surrounding school governance.

Below, Glenn Sacks, a social studies teacher at a Los Angeles Unified School District high school, writes that public teachers unions advocate for policies that protect teachers' time from activities like yard duty and supervising school events. Sacks says this gives teachers more time to focus on students.

Edward Ring, a contributing editor and senior fellow with the California Policy Center, writes that public teachers unions tend to advocate for inefficient work rules, negotiate unsustainable pay and benefits with politicians they help elect, and protect bad teachers. 

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
Twenty states end participation in National School Board Association

Since October 2021, 20 state school board associations have terminated or suspended their membership in the <u>National School Boards Association</u> (NSBA). Founded in 1940, the NSBA <u>states</u> that it uses federal advocacy, legal advocacy, and public engagement to shape "federal education policy, raises public awareness of critical issues such as school safety and champions the mission of public education to prepare our nation's youth for the future."

The boards' actions followed the NSBA's Sept. 29, 2021, letter to President <u>loe Biden</u> (D) in which the organization described "threats and acts of violence against public school children, public school board members, and other public school district officials and educators" and called for "federal law enforcement and other assistance to deal with the growing number of threats of violence and other assistance to deal with the growing number of threats of violence and acts of intimidation occurring across the nation."

On Oct. 22, the NSBA retracted the letter, <u>writing</u>: "As you all know, there has been extensive media and other attention recently around our letter to President Biden regarding threats and acts of violence against school board members. ... On behalf of NSBA, we regret and apologize for the letter. To be clear, the safety of school board members, other public school officials and educators, and students is our top priority, and there remains important work to be done on this issue. However, there was no justification for some of the language included in the letter."

National School Boards Association state affiliates



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Several boards of directors have cited the NSBA's letter to Biden directly as a reason for withdrawing from the NSBA. For example, in a letter to members, the Pennsylvania School Boards Association wrote, "The most recent national controversy surrounding a letter to President Biden suggesting that some parents should be considered domestic terrorists was the final straw".

Others cited governance issues more generally, such as the Louisiana School Boards Association, whose Board of Directors <u>said</u> they had considered withdrawing from the NSBA before the letter because of "ongoing concerns over management, leadership and the general direction of their organization."

On February 7, the NSBA announced it was "launching an independent comprehensive review to fully understand the circumstances around the letter sent to the Biden administration." To read the related memo, click $\overline{\text{here}}$.

Subject: Threat of Russian Cyber Attacks

Good Evening,

This is a friendly email reminder to be extra vigilant for possible cyberattacks or phishing attempts on both Mahomet-Seymour and your personal accounts.

The Short Version: the Federal Government is warning all public and private sectors of highly likely and imminent Russian Cyberattacks due to the ongoing war.

The Long Version:

Yesterday a joint statement was released from the White House, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), National Security Agency (NSA), and Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) regarding an expected and imminent increase of cyberattacks due to the ongoing Russian war and increased US Sanctions. They had classified internal briefings last week, and are now beginning to release unclassified information to the public. This email is for informational purposes and is not any form of political stance.

The Federal Government is urging all public and private sectors to take immediate action to shore up their defenses against potential cyberattacks. It's possible in the upcoming weeks you'll see additional security and alerts from your financial institution, social media, personal email accounts, and any cloud access accounts (Google, Microsoft, DropBox, etc). At this time

Mahomet-Seymour has not identified nor been notified of any issues. I am sharing this out of an abundance of caution.

While a direct and targeted cyberattack to Mahomet-Seymour is unlikely, there is potential fallout from collateral damage. For example: if our Internet Provider as a whole was targeted, then Mahomet-Seymour would see interruptions to our internet, email, and phone connections. Likewise, companies like Amazon Web Services and Google Data Centers touch approximately 50% of daily internet traffic. There are other major companies hosted overseas that also touch a large amount of daily internet traffic. Any outage to a major provider would have fallout across multiple web services.

At a district-wide level we will be double checking all of our cybersecurity policies and settings to ensure we're as secure as possible. This email is not intended as a scare tactic, but just a friendly reminder to be extra vigilant in the near future on both Mahomet-Seymour and personal accounts.

Given this back and forth exchange, I have taken time this morning to search my email for the terms in the FOIA. I have 63 emails that fulfill the search search of my district email took me 12 minutes this morning and that is only because I ran it twice for each permutation of the FOIA key words. In my cursory review of the emails, of the 63 returns, there are around a dozen that seemingly pulled because of key-words but in my opinion are not appropriately responsive to the request. The rest, around opinion are not appropriately responsive to the request. The rest, around some form of redaction prior to being sent as some responses were emails sent to district staff or board members and in some cases contained names of staff. I am not the FOIA officer and so I will be sending the emails I have gathered in a separate email to you for review. 

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

Bills Passed the Senate

SB 2803 (Holmes, D-Aurora) appropriates \$2,000,000,000 from the State Coronavirus Urgent Remediation Emergency Fund to the Department of Employment Security for payment to the Illinois Unemployment Insurance Trust Fund for partial repayment.

<u>SB 3663</u> (Rezin, R-Morris) Provides that the number of professional development hours required is reduced by 20% for any renewal cycle that includes the 2021-2022 school year.

Bills in House Committees

House Elem. & Secondary Edycation: School Curriculum & Policies Committee, Wednesday, March 16, 9 a.m., Virtual Room 1

SB 3845 (Johnson, D-Waukegan) requires the Gender Equity Advisory Committee to submit recommendations on how school districts can better support historically disadvantaged males, including African American students and other students of color, to ensure educational equity.

SB 3914 (Loughran Cappel, D-Plainfield) would have given an additional five days of paid mental health leave for all full-time school employees. However, an amendment was adopted in the Senate that will allow full-time school district employees to take mental health days as part of sick days. A school board would be allowed to ask for a "doctor's note" just as they would for any other usage of a sick day. SB 3914 passed the Senate on February 25.

<u>SB 4028</u> (Simmons, D-Chicago) with respect to the Comprehensive Health Education Program, requires that the instruction on mental health and illness include how and where to find mental health resources in this state.

<u>SB 3867</u> (Johnson) provides that all school boards shall waive fees assessed by the district for each student with a parent who is a veteran or active-duty military with an income at or below 200% of the federal poverty level.



<u>SB 3986</u> (Pacione-Zayas, D-Chicago) prohibits the State Board of Education from requiring a school district to administer, develop, or purchase a standardized assessment for students enrolled in

prekindergarten through grade 2, other than for diagnostic purposes.

SB 3988 (Pacione-Zayas, D-Chicago) allows a paraprofessional educator endorsement on an Educator License with Stipulations to be issued to an applicant who is at least 18 years of age only until the individual reaches the age of 19 years and otherwise meets the criteria for a paraprofessional educator endorsement.

However, an amendment was adopted in the Senate that will allow full-time school district employees to take mental health days as part of sick days. A school board would be allowed to ask for a "doctor's note" just as they would for any other usage of a sick day. SB 3914 passed the Senate on February 25.

SB 4028 (Simmons, D-Chicago) with respect to the Comprehensive Health Education Program, requires that the instruction on mental health and illness include how and where to find mental health resources in this state.

President Signs FY2022 Budget


After passing three continuing resolutions, Congress was finally able to come to an agreement on a \$1.5 trillion FY 2022 budget to fund the federal government for the next six months until October. The omnibus Consolidated Appropriations Act, signed by President Biden on Tuesday, March 15, includes \$76.4 billion for the U.S. Department of Education, an increase of \$2.9 billion. This includes \$17.5 billion for Title 1 Grants to Local Education Agencies, a \$1 billion increase which is the largest in over a decade. It also includes \$400 million more in funding for the Individual with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) State Grants. IASB has advocated in the past and continues to advocate for full funding of IDEA). The \$400 million increase is appreciated but still nowhere near full funding of the program.

I don't know how many of the other board members received a letter in the mail from the MPE Teachers, so I am including it as an attachment here.

I received this letter and am very concerned with the content. I am asking you to add items to the agenda for Monday's meeting and republish. We have time to get that done today and still meet OMA requirements. This information in this letter is very concerning and important. In speaking with staff members, I understand that the situation is so dire that some are considering resigning over the conditions.

I am requesting the following items be added for Monday:

- Staffing at MPE and concerns regarding the letter sent to Board Members
- 2. Discussion about the negotiating team for upcoming negotiations
- 3. Close session for discussion of specific employees

With respect to item 2 above, I feel that with the situation this complex and issues that need board level attention, the board should negotiate as a whole for the upcoming contract. There is no reason that all of us cannot participate. To allow only a subset of board members to participate serves to further the divide of information flow that currently exists. I believe the board needs to discuss this process, especially since the rumor mill is suggesting that a committee has already been chosen and there has been no discussion whatsoever by the board about this decision.

If we cannot amend Monday's agenda, I believe we need to call a special meeting for later this week to address this important and time sensitive situation. For us to receive a letter like this via the US mail indicates to me the fear of retribution I hear so often from our staff is in full force and in my opinion cannot be ignored any longer.

FOIA Clarification

Lindsey,

After sleeping on this subject, I wanted to take a few minutes to be crystal clear about what I want and what I have always been asking for in respect to this FOIA request. I have this nagging belief that I am going to end up not getting the appropriate response because I have strung together my words in a way that makes this process easy for you to reject because you want to reject it.

Going into this FOIA request, I knew that people oftentimes email board@ms.k12.il.us. If I had asked for all emails with the search terms Bulldog Blueprint, Bull dog Blueprint and Bulldog Blue print, I would get multiples, one email times seven, and that you would say that the results were overly burdensome. So, I tried to dwindle that down by just asking for those emails sent to board@ms.k12.il.us that were in Meghan Hennesy's email inbox.

I also knew that sometimes people may email meghan@ms.k12.il.us without emailing the rest of the board. And so, because I have asked for only board@ms.k12.il.us and only got those results before, I decided to throw in her board email address.

My intent in only asking for one person is that I would eliminate the duplicates so that the response could not be said to be burdensome. Asking for "to" or "received by" would eliminate the chain of emails that are created from "to and from". I knew that Meghan had not been included in any other committee or discussion about Bulldog Blueprint from some of the other

emails I've read, so I thought it'd be safe to assume that what would be in her inbox would be general information, either sent by you or Damien, and emails from constituents, whether they like what the district is pursuing or not.

When I received the first response that the results were burdensome, I assumed that it was because those emails had been sent to board@ms.k12.il.us. Now, I do not know how your email system works. My assumption was that when an email is sent to board@ms.k12.il.us, it goes into the inbox of mhennesy@ms.k12.il.us. And so, my vision was that by asking for just that, you would not be pulling from the seven board members' emails, but just the one, mhennesy@ms.k12.il.us. Again, I was trying to eliminate the duplication of emails and responses.

My assumption at this point, having asked for all emails received by Meghan Hennesy is that no matter how the email got to the inbox of board member Meghan Hennesy, I will receive it if it includes the terms Bulldog Blueprint, Bull dog Blueprint and Bulldog Blue print within the dates of April 2021 to March 8, 2022.

FOIA is not meant to be a game. It is meant to give the public information that belongs to them. It is meant to help provide perspective while also holding our elected officials accountable for the job that they do with our tax money. Of course, there are loopholes everywhere. And part of our overall problem is that those in power have the know-how and resources (resources provided by the taxpayer) to ensure that the loopholes are used for the benefit of the taxing body. It is my belief that in my first submission of the FOIA I laid out in detail what I was looking for appropriately. I wanted to provide a summary of the Administrative Contracts which will be on the BOE meeting agenda for 3/21. A 3% pay increase is recommended for all with a few exceptions noted at bottom of email. This is a 1.84% increase in costs for these contracts over last year.

**Note: In April, I will be bringing a new 5 year contract for approval for Christine Northrup. It is Christine's intent to retire in 2027. She would receive 3% in 22-23, then the 5.5% retirement incentive for her last four years upon providing the board a letter of intent to retire in 2027. This is the same incentive we provide for teachers.

The following people are in a 3 year contract until 2024 and a 3% pay increase is being recommended:

All assistant principals will be recommended to receive a new 10 month 1 year contract with a 3% increase.

All other district level administrative staff will receive a 3% increase.

Exceptions to the 3% are: those receiving IMRF retirement incentive (4%, Cheryl Dixon and Julie Banta)

And Dawn Quinley and Shantille Heinold.

- --Dawn will receive a 9.1% increase that reflects that she is a CPA and using that credential in her new position.
- --Shantille Heinold will receive a 10.83% increase that reflects the comps in her field as payroll coordinator. In hindsight, when Shantille moved from Lincoln Trail EOP to the payroll position, she probably should've started at a higher rate than she did--she transitioned from a 10 month to 12 month position and this often requires a pay adjustment.

I am happy to answer any questions you might have about this. In terms of job performance, there are no major concerns with anyone. All of us have areas where we can grow and improve, those have been noted and suggested during the evaluation process with the employee.





As I've explained before, we take the terms that are provided in any FOIA request for emails and do an email search for those terms. In this case the terms were Meghan Hennesy (her school provided emails address for board of education business) and Bulldog Blueprint. Upon returning about 1000 pages of emails, the vast majority of those being duplicate emails as

well as emails to the entire board (which you did NOT request), what you got in your response was what our search elicited. You asked specifically for emails for Meghan Hennesy, not the board. If, as you believe, I am so focused on not providing all records that are available, how do you explain the fact that several weeks ago I was assisting you in making a FOIA request so you could obtain the information you were seeking? Again, search of emails was conducted based on the records you requested, the district's response is what we have based on your search terms and the results of our search.

I made the assumption, and perhaps it's incorrect--that Mrs. Hennesy conducts board business with her district provided, board of education email address, which is what was searched for in this FOIA request. If you submit another FOIA request for this same information, I'll specifically ask Mrs. Hennesy to provide any and all email she could have possibly going to a different email based upon whatever your FOIA request contains. 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

Good afternoon Superintendents and Board Members,

I'm contacting you today at Senator Rose's request to address an issue that has been raised by several elected officeholders from around our district with questions and concerns related to changes in the Statement of Economic Interest (SOEI) that elected officials are required to complete in Illinois. In some cases, the new SOEI forms have been distributed without a complete listing of the exclusions, which has caused some confusion around the district.


From Senator Rose:

"While, we cannot provide legal advice, the attached memo has a nice summary of what is statutorily excluded (and I think will relieve a lot of the stress). Also, the excel chart attached – shows how the previous SOEI statutory questions were consolidated to make them easier to understand (assuming, of course, that someone had also sent the context of the "exclusions" up front and you didn't get one without the other)! Importantly, it also raised many of the limits and we got rid of many of the reporting requirements like retirement accounts, for example (these were previously required to be reported, and are now, under the new law, no longer reportable).

What is new is (i) the "debt" question (but again, looking at the exclusions to determine what is not reportable is very important) ... the inclusion of this question was to make sure that people weren't getting off-market "loans" from people seeking business with the unit of government they are elected to, and (ii) the question of utility companies, which I will admit has really very little applicability to local governments – but could.

Again, we can't give legal advice, but I'd suggest you reach out to your school attorney, or local State's Attorney, if you have questions of interpretations on what is/isn't reportable."

Subject: Threat of Russian Cyber Attacks

Good Evening,

This is a friendly email reminder to be extra vigilant for possible cyberattacks or phishing attempts on both Mahomet-Seymour and your personal accounts.

<u>The Short Version:</u> the Federal Government is warning all public and private sectors of highly likely and imminent Russian Cyberattacks due to the ongoing war.

The Long Version:

Yesterday a joint statement was released from the White House, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), National Security Agency (NSA), and Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) regarding an expected and imminent increase of cyberattacks due to the ongoing Russian war and increased US Sanctions. They had classified internal briefings last week, and are now beginning to release unclassified information to the public. This email is for informational purposes and is not any form of political stance.

The Federal Government is urging all public and private sectors to take immediate action to shore up their defenses against potential cyberattacks. It's possible in the upcoming weeks you'll see additional security and alerts from your financial institution, social media, personal email accounts, and any cloud access accounts (Google, Microsoft, DropBox, etc). At this time

Mahomet-Seymour has not identified nor been notified of any issues. I am sharing this out of an abundance of caution.

While a direct and targeted cyberattack to Mahomet-Seymour is unlikely, there is potential fallout from collateral damage. For example: if our Internet Provider as a whole was targeted, then Mahomet-Seymour would see interruptions to our internet, email, and phone connections. Likewise, companies like Amazon Web Services and Google Data Centers touch approximately 50% of daily internet traffic. There are other major companies hosted overseas that also touch a large amount of daily internet traffic. Any outage to a major provider would have fallout across multiple web services.

At a district-wide level we will be double checking all of our cybersecurity policies and settings to ensure we're as secure as possible. This email is not intended as a scare tactic, but just a friendly reminder to be extra vigilant in the near future on both Mahomet-Seymour and personal accounts.

On the Issues

In this section, we curate reporting, analysis, and commentary on the issues school board members deliberate when they set out to offer the best education possible in their district.

The debate over parental access to teaching materials

One debate currently playing out in legislatures and school districts is whether schools should have to post curriculum and teacher training materials online. For example, on March 14, the Arizona State Senate <u>passed</u> SB 1211, a bill that would require schools to post curriculum and classroom activities online. The bill now goes to the House for consideration.

Below, Christopher Rufo, a senior fellow at the Manhattan Institute and director of the Institute's initiative on critical race theory, writes that parents should be able to see what public schools teach their children. Rufo says parental access to curricular materials is especially important on issues like race, gender and sex, and political ideology.

Natalie Wexler, a senior contributor at Forbes, writes that the lack of published curriculum online does not indicate schools and school districts are hiding politically charged teaching materials. Wexler says teachers rarely rely on a set curriculum, so it is difficult to share their materials with parents. Wexler says greater reliance on curriculum could improve learning outcomes, but transparency bills on controversial topics could disincentivize the use of curriculum.

"The case for curriculum transparency rests on an irrefutable moral argument: parents have the right to know what the government is teaching their children. Parents are not only taxpayers but also the primary stakeholders in the public education system. Approximately 90 percent of American families entrust their children's education to public schools. That system's minimum responsibility is to provide accurate, timely, and comprehensive information about the curriculum—especially as it relates to sensitive and controversial topics such as race, gender, identity, and political ideology. The recent parent backlash underscores the importance of transparency. Millions of American families feel that the public schools are working against their values.

Transparency legislation is the bare minimum for public schools to start rebuilding trust with these families."

We Need 'Curriculum Transparency,' But Not The Kind Some State Bills Would Require | Natalie Wexler, *Forbes*

"[M]ost state education officials are clueless about what materials are actually being used in school districts. Local district officials often don't know what materials are being used in school buildings. Even principals may be unclear about what teachers are using in the classroom down the hall. And teachers themselves may not know what materials they'll be using in class until the night before. Clearly that would make it difficult, if not impossible, to post 'curriculum' online. ... If curriculum transparency is reduced to a vehicle for challenges to supposedly offensive or divisive texts, schools may shy away from including any content in their curricula. They'll stick with or return to an ELA [English language arts] curriculum that consists of the usual round of 'comprehension skills' and doesn't specify any content whatsoever."

School board update: filing deadlines, election results, and recall certifications

We're covering one school board recall election in the next 30 days. The March 29 recall is against <u>Tim Stentiford</u>, one of the 12 members of the Regional School Unit 21 school board in Maine.

Recall supporters listed a loss of teachers in the district, increased spending on human resources, and the lack of a school board curriculum committee as reasons for the recall. The affidavit to recall LeBlanc <u>said</u> his "role in negotiating the most recent teachers contract and its impact on staff attrition, the failure to seat a curriculum committee and a failure in executive leadership by allowing teachers, parents and community members to be bullied and admonished in public meetings, has caused a loss of confidence in his ability to perform the duties and responsibilities of the office."

Stentiford had not responded to the recall effort. However, board Chair Art LeBlanc, whom recall supporters tried unsuccessfully to include in the recall effort, <u>said</u> on Nov. 23, 2021:

"The Board's goals are to provide a high quality public education, to be leaders in our state and nation academically, and to ensure that our staff receive competitive salaries and benefits. We are proud of the concrete and undeniable steps that the district has taken in the past two years to support our employees during the pandemic, to move our salary scales in a meaningful manner, and provide for the health and safety of our students and employees. Members of the Board are aware that there is a well-organized group that meet regularly and seem focused on discrediting the work of the Board and the administration for political gain. Despite the efforts of this group to cast doubt on the Board's commitment to our motives, the Board will remain steadfast in its commitment to support our students and employees."



For the 204 school board races we are covering whose filing deadlines have passed, an average of 2.19 candidates are running for each seat.



This year's school board recall elections so far

According to our <u>year-end recall analysis</u>, we tracked more recall efforts in 2021 than any other year since we began compiling recall data in 2012. Notably, for the first time since we began tracking recalls, school board members faced more recalls than any other office type.

So far this year, we've tracked 28 recall efforts against 69 school board officials—the highest number of recalls across all officials (city council members were next, with 57 officials named in recalls).

Six school board recalls have gone to a vote this year against 11 officials. Of


those eleven officials, four were successfully recalled from office.

- Jan. 11: <u>Suzy Ernest and Roland Rushman recall, Leyton Public Schools,</u> <u>Nebraska</u> (failed)
- Jan. 18: <u>Dave Brown and Brian Shannon recall, Newberg School District</u>, Oregon (failed)
- Jan. 24: <u>Diane Brown and Michael Knapp recall</u>, <u>Belchertown Public Schools</u>, <u>Massachusetts</u> (failed)
- Feb. 15: <u>San Francisco Unified School District recall, California</u> (successful)
- Feb. 15: <u>Chris Waddle recall, Giltner Public Schools, Nebraska</u> (successful)

Looking ahead, Tim Stentiford, discussed above, will face a recall on March 29. Recall efforts in Nevada, California, Michigan, New Jersey, and elsewhere are currently underway, meaning that recall supporters have filed with the relevant election office but are waiting for petitions to be approved, circulating petitions, or waiting for signatures to be verified. We'll keep you updated on those efforts, and any new efforts that come up each week.

Here's where we've tracked recall efforts this year:

Number of recall efforts covered by Ballotpedia in 2022



In 2021, California <u>accounted for almost 30%</u> of the country's school board recall elections.

Twenty-three states allow for the recall of school board members.

Six of the states that allow school board recalls require specific grounds to be met in order for a recall effort to move forward, such as malfeasance or misfeasance in office. The number of signatures required to get a school board recall on the ballot varies by state. Common factors for calculating the signature requirement include the size of the board member's jurisdiction and the number of votes cast in a previous election. In all but one of the states, recall elections are held if enough signatures are collected. Virginia is the exception. If enough signatures are collected in that state, a trial is held at the circuit court level.

The amount of time recall petitions are allowed to be circulated also varies by state. Georgia, Nebraska, and North Carolina have the shortest petition circulation time with 30 days. Out of the states that have a time limit for circulating petitions, Washington has the longest with 180 days. New Mexico, North Dakota, Tennessee, and Virginia do not have a time limit for petition circulation.

Good afternoon,

As you are aware, we are limited in issuing debt to 13% of our EAV. Because of bonds that are already outstanding, we have \$30 million in available debt, and we are obviously asking our voters for much more than that.

The mechanism to raise our debt limit is a request that must go through the state legislature. This legislation, which has been written by Chapman and Cutler, must get attached to a "vehicle bill"--that is going through the house and senate. I have been communicating with Kevin Heid at Stifel and Senator Rose to very hopefully get this to happen during this spring legislative session.

It is unusual, but not unheard of, to make this debt limit extension request prior to the referendum. It often occurs after the referendum has been passed by voters in a school district. However, we are facing some unique circumstances with this election and the timeline of the spring legislative session.

One of these factors is that, as we know, the election got pushed forward into June. Normally the primary election for the midterms is in February or March. This then leaves time after the election, and before the adjournment of the spring legislative session, to make the debt limit

extension request. However, the legislature will be adjourned by June 28, and in fact, according to Senator Rose, is only going to be in session until Friday, April 8. So, time is of the essence here.

If this doesn't get done now, then according to Kevin Heid, it's not likely to get taken care of in the fall veto session, and the district will need to wait until Spring of 2023. The issue here is the likely scenario of passing along increased costs (thousands of dollars) to our taxpayers due to rising interest rates by having to wait to issue bonds.

While Kevin Heid is the expert with this type of thing and we'll look to his expertise and experience with this, it could be best, after the passage of the referendum, and assuming we get our debt limit extension this spring, to issue a significant amount of the debt in order to save our taxpayers the increased costs related to rising interest rates. All of that remains to be seen.

Senator Rose has been extremely helpful with this situation and worked hard to identify several vehicle bills that could be utilized. He is also working on behalf of at least one other school district in his district that also needs the debt limit extension, and Stifel has several districts who need it as well. So, we are not alone in pursuing/needing this and it is a common ask--as stated above, just some unique timing during this particular election year.



NEW STATEMENT OF ECONOMIC INTERESTS FORM FOR 2022. STAY TUNED FOR CRITICAL WRITTEN GUIDANCE FROM THE SECRETARY OF STATE'S OFFICE

May 1st is the annual deadline for elected and appointed officials and certain employees to file the Statement of Economic Interests form ("Form") required by the *Illinois Governmental Ethics Act*.

This year, individuals starting the task of completing the Form will note that the Form and its instructions are completely new. The new Form and instructions reflect amendments to the law by *Public Act 102-0664*, *effective January 1, 2022*. Among other things, the amendments of P.A. 102-0664 expand the disclosure of financial interests and indebtedness required to be included in the Form.

For many filers, completing the new Form will unfortunately not be a simple or straightforward endeavor because of the technical nature of the questions asked and the new definitions that have been added.

In particular, the new definitions are critical to understanding the scope of the Form. For example, the term "asset" means an item that is "owned and has monetary value" including: stocks, bonds, mutual funds, exchange-traded funds, commodity futures, investment real estate (which is another definition), beneficial interests in trusts, and business and partnership interests. The definition then specifically lists certain exclusions including: personal residences, personal vehicles, savings or checking accounts, governmental bonds and securities, Medicare benefits, inheritances or bequests, diversified funds, annuities, pensions, retirement accounts, college savings plans, and certain other tax-advantaged savings programs, and tangible personal property. 5 ILCS 420/1-102.5. In addition to the term "asset," there are

13 other definitions that apply because of P.A. 102-0664.

Critically, P.A. 102-0664 requires the Illinois Secretary of State to develop and make publicly available online written guidance relating to the completion and filing of the form. 5 ILCS 420/4A-102(c). This guidance is important because P.A. 102-0664 provides that statements made in the Form that are made in reasonable good faith reliance on the published guidance from the Secretary of State will not constitute a willfully false or incomplete statement and such reliance will therefore be a defense to the Class A misdemeanor penalty that remains unchanged in the Ethics Act.

We have been advised by the Secretary of State's office to expect the written guidance around the first week of March. Given the new and complex form and the reliance that can be placed on the Secretary of State's guidance, filers should strongly consider waiting to file the Form until the guidance has been issued, unless filers are candidates who must obtain and submit a receipt for filing the form to comply with ballot access deadlines. We will update this Law Alert once the Secretary of State's guidance is released.

Good morning,

I have some follow up information from Ryan regarding the letter.

On Monday afternoon, he met with his building leadership team, which is composed of Dustin Day and teachers who represent each grade level, special ed, interventionists and specials (6). He brought up the letter and while the teachers knew that there were discussions about adding an interventionist, they were not aware that they'd been signed on to an anonymous letter that went to the Board of Education. Ryan expressed concern over this type of communication, and the concern was shared. The concern was focused on the content of the letter--I think folks agree that there is validity in some/most of what was said. It was about the method and means of communicating 1) in an anonymous manner and 2) signing others onto it without their express permission and knowledge of what it was and where/to whom it was being sent.

On Tuesday morning, a teacher in the building asked to meet with Ryan. They met and she admitted to having a major role in the letter. Long story short, she ended up profusely apologizing for "her role" and admitted it was a huge misstep. It was an interventionist that wrote it, she says someone else sent it to the board. The other interventionists did even know the letter

was being written. (And, they share an office and work together....)

Ryan handled it beautifully and felt the conversation with the individual teacher was very productive in terms of clear expectations about communication and honoring a chain of communication that is most effective in expressing concerns and ideas as well as respecting the boundary of including others in a letter only with permission.

Understandably, our teachers don't know or think about the big picture with staffing--i.e. other buildings also have needs for staff. They're very busy with their own students, classrooms and their own buildings. Ryan and the other principals work closely and collaboratively to discuss these needs with each other and with central office administration. Our principals have demonstrated that they understand and respect the needs of buildings other than their own--and in the big picture, a 5th interventionist at MPE is not the highest priority in adding staff.

We'll bring our recommendations to the April board meeting, we're in the process of finalizing those now.

I don't know how many of the other board members received a letter in the mail from the MPE Teachers, so I am including it as an attachment here.

I received this letter and am very concerned with the content. I am asking you to add items to the agenda for Monday's meeting and republish. We have time to get that done today and still meet OMA requirements. This information in this letter is very concerning and important. In speaking with staff members, I

understand that the situation is so dire that some are considering resigning over the conditions.

I am requesting the following items be added for Monday:

- 1. Staffing at MPE and concerns regarding the letter sent to Board Members
- Discussion about the negotiating team for upcoming negotiations
- 3. Close session for discussion of specific employees

With respect to item 2 above, I feel that with the situation this complex and issues that need board level attention, the board should negotiate as a whole for the upcoming contract. There is no reason that all of us cannot participate. To allow only a subset of board members to participate serves to further the divide of information flow that currently exists. I believe the board needs to discuss this process, especially since the rumor mill is suggesting that a committee has already been chosen and there has been no discussion whatsoever by the board about this decision.

If we cannot amend Monday's agenda, I believe we need to call a special meeting for later this week to address this important and time sensitive situation. For us to receive a letter like this via the US mail indicates to me the fear of retribution I hear so often from our staff is in full force and in my opinion cannot be ignored any longer.

IPA has been selected as an *Illinois School Leader Pipeline Program* provider. The grant provides tuition support and mentoring for individuals who are committed to earning their Illinois principal endorsement and serving as a school leader upon completion of the principal preparation program. If you know of a candidate that might benefit from this program, please share this important information with them without delay. Details of the program are included below.

Purpose of the Pipeline Program

The purpose of the Illinois School Leader Pipeline Program (ISLPP) is to identify, develop, support and sustain diverse cohorts of aspiring school leaders as they progress through preparation to attainment of school leadership (principal or assistant principal) positions. The Illinois Principals Association (IPA), the Illinois Council of Professors of Educational Administration (ICPEA), and the Black Educational Advocacy Coalition (BEAC) will collaboratively coordinate and deliver the Illinois School Leader Pipeline Program with grant support from the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE).

Program Supports

During this inaugural year, the ISLPP will offer 100 aspiring school leaders entering their first year of principal preparation the following support:

Subject: Debt Limit Extension

Good afternoon,

As you are aware, we are limited in issuing debt to 13% of our EAV. Because of bonds that are already outstanding, we have \$30 million in available debt, and we are obviously asking our voters for much more than that.

The mechanism to raise our debt limit is a request that must go through the state legislature. This legislation, which has been written by Chapman and Cutler, must get attached to a "vehicle bill"--that is going through the house and senate. I have been communicating with Kevin Heid at Stifel and Senator Rose to very hopefully get this to happen during this spring legislative session.

It is unusual, but not unheard of, to make this debt limit extension request <u>prior</u> to the referendum. It often occurs after the referendum has been passed by voters in a school district. However, we are facing some unique circumstances with this election and the timeline of the spring legislative session.

One of these factors is that, as we know, the election got pushed forward into June. Normally the primary election for the midterms is in February or March. This then leaves time after the election, and before the adjournment of the spring legislative session, to make the debt limit extension request. However, the legislature will be adjourned by June 28, and in fact, according to Senator Rose, is only going to be in session until Friday, April 8. So, time

is of the essence here.

If this doesn't get done now, then according to Kevin Heid, it's not likely to

get taken care of in the fall veto session, and the district will need to wait

until Spring of 2023. The issue here is the likely scenario of passing along

increased costs (thousands of dollars) to our taxpayers due to rising interest

rates by having to wait to issue bonds.

While Kevin Heid is the expert with this type of thing and we'll look to his

expertise and experience with this, it could be best, after the passage of the

referendum, and assuming we get our debt limit extension this spring, to

issue a significant amount of the debt in order to save our taxpayers the

increased costs related to rising interest rates. All of that remains to be

seen.

Senator Rose has been extremely helpful with this situation and worked hard

to identify several vehicle bills that could be utilized. He is also working on

behalf of at least one other school district in his district that also needs the

debt limit extension, and Stifel has several districts who need it as well. So,

we are not alone in pursuing/needing this and it is a common ask--as stated

above, just some unique timing during this particular election year.

In the meantime, Heather as always is available for questions, as am I, and if

you want to communicate with Kevin Heid, let us know and we'll reach out.

IASB Legislative Report (102-38)

General Assembly Address Current Fiscal Year Spending

Before crafting the Fiscal Year 2023 budget, the Democratic Majority of the Illinois General Assembly worked with Governor Pritzker to address several outstanding budget issues. The opinion of whether those issues were resolving real problems or just passing on the cost to Illinois employers took a decidedly partisan tone. Democrats supported Senate Bill 2803 (Holmes, D-Aurora) and Republicans voted against the measure.

The spending package in SB 2803 included \$2.7 billion for the underfunded Unemployment Insurance trust fund from Federal American Rescue Plan Act. Democrats argued that \$2.7 billion for the Unemployment Insurance trust fund was a boost to a fund that is underfunded because of historically large claims due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On the other side of the aisle, Republicans argued not fully closing the backlog to the fund was a quasi-tax on employers who will be responsible for closing the gap in the fund.

Senate Bill 2803 also includes Illinois generated General Revenue Funds to pay down \$900 million in state employee health insurance costs, an additional \$300 million payment to the state pension funds,

and \$230 million to cover outstanding liabilities for College Illinois.

With two weeks to go before scheduled adjournment, only a few bills have been sent to the governor's desk. If your school district has questions, concerns, or praise for any outstanding pieces of legislation, now is the time to reach out to members of the Illinois General Assembly. IASB will continue to keep you informed of important legislative action as it unfolds over the next two weeks.

Bills out of Senate Committees week of March 21

<u>HB 3296</u> (Ness, D-Carpentersville) requires a school district to offer a program to prepare students enrolled in grades 6 through 12 for a career and technical education pathway.

<u>HB 3573</u> (Holmes) requires a school district to pay to its employees who provide educational support services to the district their daily, regular rate of pay and benefits rendered for any remote learning day if the remote learning day precludes them from performing their regularly scheduled duties and they would have reported for work but for the remote learning day.

<u>HB 4089</u> (Nichols, D-Burbank) requires a school district to provide a plant-based school lunch option to those students who submit a prior request to the school district requesting a plant-based school lunch option.

<u>HB 4246</u> (Scherer, D-Decatur) provides for the reinstatement of a lapsed Professional Educator License upon the payment by the applicant of a \$50 penalty (rather than a \$500 penalty).

<u>HB 4316</u> (Mussman, D-Schaumburg) requires the superintendent of an employing school to notify the State Superintendent of Education and applicable regional superintendent of schools if they have reasonable cause to believe that a license holder committed an act of sexual misconduct that resulted in the license holder's dismissal or resignation from the school district.

<u>HB 4365</u> (Didech, D-Buffalo Grove) allows a student's Individualized Education Program (IEP) team to determine whether the special education program of a school district is unable to meet the needs of a child with a disability.

<u>HB 4690</u> (Mussman) restarts the process of removal or dismissal of teachers and principals that were paused due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

<u>HB 4994</u> (Crespo, D-Streamwood) provides that each year prior to the start of the school year, a school board shall file its threat assessment procedure and a list identifying the members of the school district's threat assessment team or regional behavior threat assessment and intervention team with a local law enforcement agency and the regional office of education.

<u>HB 5127</u> (Halpin, D-Rock Island) provides that within 40 days (instead of 28) after the consolidated election, the board shall organize by electing its officers and fixing a time and place for the regular meetings.

HB 5214 (Villa, D-West Chicago) requires school districts to provide interpreters for parents in IEP

and 504 plan meetings.

<u>HB 5265</u> (Guzzardi, D-Chicago) provides that no discrimination or punishment of any kind, including, but not limited to, the lowering of grades, exclusion from classes, or withholding of student records, transcripts, or diplomas, may be exercised against a student because the student's parents or guardians are unable to purchase required textbooks or instructional materials.

Bills Out of House Committees week of March 21

<u>HB 1170</u> (Meyers-Martin, D-Matteson) allows a school district to in partnership with other school districts, community colleges, universities, and employers to establish a career and technical education center.

<u>SB 3663</u> (Rezin, R-Morris) provides that the number of professional development hours required is reduced by 20% for any renewal cycle that includes the 2021-2022 school year.

<u>SB 3709</u> (Holmes) provides that with respect to a special education cooperative reorganization, the contractual continued service status of a teacher transfers to the new or different board.

<u>SB 3793</u> (Morrison, D-Deerfield) adds community service as a penalty for failing to stop before meeting or overtaking a school bus that is stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging pupils and has displayed visual signals.

SB 3914 (Loughran Cappel, D-Plainfield) would have given an additional five days of paid mental health leave for all full-time school employees. However, an amendment was adopted in the Senate that will allow full-time school district employees to take mental health days as part of sick days. A school board would be allowed to ask for a "doctor's note" just as they would for any other usage of a sick day. SB 3914 passed the Senate on February 25.

<u>SB 4028</u> (Simmons, D-Chicago) with respect to the Comprehensive Health Education Program, requires that the instruction on mental health and illness include how and where to find mental health resources in this state.


Bills in Committee week of March 28

<u>HB 4243</u> (Mason, D-Gurnee) prohibits a high school from withholding a student's grades, transcripts, or diploma because of an unpaid balance on the student's school account.

<u>HB 4813</u> (Gordon-Booth, D-Peoria) exempts from contract bidding requirements contracts for goods, services, or management in the operation of a school's food service, including a school that participates in any of the United States Department of Agriculture's child nutrition programs.

<u>HB 5159</u> (Evans, D-Chicago) requires school boards to cover the transit fees of students residing one and one-half miles or more from any school to which they are assigned for attendance, regardless of

the availability of public transportation.

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
