#### MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR / DR. JORDAN SINZ

#### A Transition in Health Procedures

**Note:** the following information was sent to District parents on February 23, 2022.

These procedural changes are being made after consultation with our medical advisors and communication with the School Board. These shifts may result in a myriad of emotions. With that in mind, please remember the following:

- 1. Respecting each other has never been more important. Our school community will support students and staff as this transition unfolds. This means we respect each individual's choices and understand that differences are okay and accepted.
- 2. While our medical advisors, School Board, and administration believe the time is right to make this transition, we also understand that circumstances can change. We will continue to focus on safely providing in-person instruction for as many students as possible. If the health situation turns for the worse, we may need to re-implement mitigation strategies that are being rolled back.

Regardless of whether a child is excited, scared, worried, or uncertain, for all children (& many of us as adults!), times of transition can be unsettling. During this transition phase, your child may need extra love, support, and time for connection. We will be encouraging children to demonstrate kindness with themselves and their peers. I hope you will also reinforce the importance of respecting and supporting all students in our classrooms regardless of families' individual masking decisions.

Our goal this school year has been to safely provide in-person instruction for all students/families that prefer this mode of learning. Through the first six months of the 2021 - 22 school year, we have largely attained this goal through layered mitigation strategies to minimize the impact of Covid-19 on in-person learning. This is not to suggest it has been without challenges, particularly this January when cases surged.

On February 14, Public Health Madison & Dane County (PHMDC) announced their Face Covering Emergency Order would expire on March 1. While the School Board had approved a procedure in November that called for masking based on community levels of Covid-19 transmission, we acknowledge that a lot has changed since November. Namely, a majority of our students have been vaccinated, nearly our entire staff is vaccinated, and many members of our school community have had a recent Covid-19 infection. We have also seen a rapid decline in cases since they peaked on January 20.

With all of this in mind, the district will be shifting to a <u>masking recommended procedure</u> when a PHMDC order is not in place. This shift will occur <u>on Tuesday</u>, <u>March 1</u>, <u>2022</u>. Should we have close contact situations, it will be important to reference our isolation/quarantine guidance. We will also continue to follow the guidelines outlined in the document "When Can Students/Staff Return After Illness?" Both of these documents are on the WHSD web page under the COVID Tab.

The District will continue to monitor our ability to provide in-person learning and will adjust protocols to attain this goal. Together we will prudently work to stay healthy and in the classroom. In my weekly lessons, students have been learning how to manage their strong emotions. They have worked on how to <u>stop</u>, <u>name their feelings</u>, and then choose a calming strategy that works for them. We have talked about a lot of different breathing techniques, specifically focusing on belly breathing, that will help them calm their bodies down.

In some grades, we have begun our problem-solving unit, which will help the students develop the tools to become more effective problem solvers. The lessons utilize the <u>STEP</u> model as a method to work through small problems. We are also learning that small problems are problems that kids have the ability to solve on their own and big problems are those that require assistance from an adult.

As the winds of March usher in Spring, March is also the opening of state testing requirements in Wisconsin. Please be aware of these important dates in March:

Tuesday, March 8: ACT Plus Writing for all JUNIORS (Class of 2023). *ONLY juniors will be on campus this day*. All other students will be home, learning asynchronously; this means students in grades 6-10 and 12 are to be checking Schoology and completing assigned work. All teachers will have an open zoom session from 2:00 to 3:00 PM; zoom links will be posted by teachers in Schoology. Students who have questions about their assigned work will be able to zoom in at that time.

Students who are absent will be scheduled to make up their test at a later date.

Tuesday, March 15: AP students – the remaining balance on your test fees is due in the Main Office. If you are unsure about your remaining balance or if you have changed your mind about sitting for an examination, please see either Ms. Van den Bergh or Ms. Dostal.

In April, students will sit for the FORWARD exams (grades 6, 7, 8 and 10) and the ACT ASPIRE exams (grades 9 and 10). These dates are:

# **Notes from the Nurse**

We have seen a continued decline in COVID cases and hopefully that trend will continue this spring. The decline has allowed us to transition to a mask recommended policy. As we make this transition I wanted to go through all of our COVID policies because some will have changes and some will not.

#### **Sick Students**

Nothing has changed in the past couple years on how we need to react when a student is sick. The goal is to keep those who are potentially infectious from spreading it to others in school. Please keep your student home when they are not feeling well. Sick students that meet our <u>criteria for COVID</u> still need to get tested with a PCR or NAAT test before they can return. We need a copy of the negative test before they can return. We also still offer free COVID testing at our <u>school testing site</u>.

# **Close Contact**

A close contact to someone with COVID is defined as anyone who has been within 6 feet of an infectious person for 15 minutes or more cumulative in a 24 hours period. Without universal masking we will no longer be doing 3 feet in the school setting when it comes to close contacts, we will return to a close contact being anyone within 6 feet. There are a few different things that might happen if someone is a close contact to an infectious person.

- Fully Vaccinated if the close contact has completed the primary series of the vaccine and it has been 2 weeks since the 2nd dose they are considered fully vaccinated. They would not have to quarantine with a close contact. However, they do need to wear a well fitting mask for 10 days with the day of the last contact being day 0. It is also recommended to get a PCR or NAAT test 5 days after the close contact. If any symptoms develop during the 10 days they would need to stay home and get tested.
- Not Fully Vaccinated if the close contact has not completed their vaccine series they will need to complete a 5 day quarantine, with Day 0 being the day of contact. After 5 days they would be allowed to return to school as long as they are asymptomatic. If they return to school after 5 days they will need to wear a well fitting mask for the rest of the 10 days. If any symptoms develop they will need to remain home and get tested before they can return,

#### **Positive Case**

If someone tests positive for COVID they will have to complete 10 days of isolation. The day symptoms started or the day of the test is day 0. <u>Positive individuals have the option to come back after 5 days if they meet all the requirements below:</u>

- Symptoms are improving AND
- Fever free for 24 hours without the use of medications AND
- Test negative on a rapid antigen test done at a testing location on day 5. It cannot be a home test and results need to be shared with the school (we can do this test at our school testing site) AND
- Can wear a well fitting mask correctly and consistently for the full 10 days

If they choose to try to come back after 5 days, make sure the student gets a rapid test on day 5, not a PCR or NAAT test. The PCR or NAAT tests are more sensitive and pick up lower levels of disease. These tests can stay positive for a while after infection and the person is likely no longer infectious. Rapid antigen tests are less sensitive, when they are positive it is more indicative of an active infection. Those who are positive on a rapid antigen test are likely still infectious.

We have many COVID resources up on the school webpage including information on <u>isolation and quarantine</u>, <u>when sick individuals can return</u> and our <u>data dashboard</u>. They are helpful resources if you have COVID questions. Feel free to reach out with any COVID questions. I am happy to help in any way I can. Thank you all for what you are doing to keep our students safe, healthy, and in school learning.

### **Scholarship Information**

All scholarship information is posted on the Wisconsin Heights High School website under Academics. The scholarships are posted in order of their deadline. The Wisconsin Heights Class of 2022 scholarship booklet is now posted on the website. The scholarship book contains independent scholarship and Wisconsin Heights Education Foundation scholarships. The deadline for turning in applications is Tuesday, March 29 at 3:30 PM to the Guidance Office.

**UW Universities/Colleges**: Application priority dates and deadlines vary from campus to campus and sometimes among different programs at one campus. It is to your advantage to apply early! If you have any questions, please contact me or the institution to which you are applying.

The UW System has an enrollment management policy that limits the number of students each campus can accommodate. Specific programs may also have enrollment limits. Even applicants who meet minimum admission requirements may not be admitted. You may use the UW System Application for Undergraduate Admission to apply to any UW campus. Several items must be submitted to complete your application file.

- A \$25 application fee must be paid to each campus to which you apply with the exception of UW Madison (\$60). In cases of exceptional need, the application fee may be waived. Contact your counselor for details.
- An official copy of your high school transcript. If you have completed any college course work, you must also have an official transcript sent from each college or university attended.
- ACT or SAT test scores currently optional at many schools. Some admission offices require an official score report directly from the testing agency before evaluating an application.
- Visit <a href="https://apply.wisconsin.edu">https://apply.wisconsin.edu</a> and use the UW System online application for admission.

The Admission Decision – High school seniors notified of admission before finishing their senior year are expected to graduate, successfully complete course work in progress at the time they applied and maintain the class rank required for admission. UW System institutions reserve the right to rescind admission if a student fails to meet conditions on which admission was based.

MATC will start processing applications as soon as they receive them. You will need to look up the specific programs you are applying to because prerequisites vary. You will also be able to find out if there is a waiting list or not. From the Madison College homepage <a href="http://madisoncollege.edu/">http://madisoncollege.edu/</a> click on the Apply for Admission button. Madison College's online application is secure and easy to use:

- Save your work and come back to it later.
- Receive immediate notification of receipt via e-mail.
- No delay application processing starts right away.

Some programs may have unique admission requirements or early such as assessment test scores, course requirements, or early admission deadlines. From the Madison College homepage, click on the link to "Programs of Study" and find your program to check for any additional requirements.

## **College/Technical School Applications**

Students should email Ms. Shaffer in order to have a transcript sent to any school they are applying. At the present time there is no charge to have a transcript sent. Once the request is received, the Guidance Department will mail the transcript out. Get your college applications in as soon as possible.

It's all about the books! And, learning to read.

<u>The Importance of Reading to Kids Daily</u> summarizes research done at Ohio State University School of Education and Human Ecology showing that reading to children daily has a significant impact on their vocabulary acquisition and ability to learn how to read. For example, students who are never read to are exposed to just 4,662 words through conversation alone by the time they are 5, but students who are read to 3-5 times per week are exposed to over 169,000 words in that same time frame. That is a huge difference!

Fortunately, we are able to help provide access to age appropriate reading materials in two ways:

- Madison Reading Project is partnering with Dolly Parton's Imagination Library to mail one free book per month to children under age 5 that reside in Dane County. To enroll a child, go to <a href="https://www.madisonreadingproject.com/imaginationlibrary">https://www.madisonreadingproject.com/imaginationlibrary</a> click register and complete the enrollment process for each child. Your first book will arrive within 60 days. If you have children over the age of 5 and would like to request books from Madison Reading Project, please complete <a href="this online form">this is a great way to get books into the hands of children!</a>
- We've also been sending home free books with students from our school libraries. We are weeding our library collections at Black Earth and Mazomanie Elementary Schools as we prepare to consolidate the two buildings next Fall. We will continue to send home books with students, but if you or someone you know would like books for your home or daycare, please let us know! We would be happy to share with you!

#### **Digital Citizenship Tips and Tricks!**
