District Updates

To write a district newsletter submission for the month of May means that the end of the school year is right around the corner. As we collectively work for an engaging last five weeks of the academic year, it is with a sense of gratitude for a school district that has continued to evolve to meet the needs of students. The past 14 months have been unlike any other, and as we near the completion of the 2020-21 school year, there are some key district-level updates:

- For the past three weeks, the district has been utilizing full-day, in-person instruction for approximately 85-90% of our student population. I am pleased to report this transition has been well received and very successful. The rest of our students continue to engage in online learning as requested by their families.
- We envision the start of the 2021-22 school year will largely resemble a traditional start. Through collaboration with Public Health Madison Dane County (PHMDC), the Department of Health Services (DHS), and the Department of Public Instruction (DPI), we will implement protocols that support the health and well-being of our students and staff. We also recognize that some families may want their child(ren) to continue participating in some form of online learning. Building principals will be seeking feedback on this matter and working with families to facilitate such. As always, if you have any questions about schedules or safety protocols, please contact your child's principal.
- Planning and design work continues to take place in preparation for construction to commence on for our single-campus construction project. Updates are publicly provided at each school board meeting (second and fourth Monday of the month). - A groundbreaking ceremony for the new elementary school will be held on Monday, May 24, at 5:00 PM. The ceremony will be held at the MS/HS site (future K-12 campus). School Greenhouse Ready for Spring Plant Sale!

Do you need plants for your landscape, a simple Mother's Day gift, or want to grow vegetables and herbs? The "Vangarden" will provide you with some of the highest quality plants for the lowest prices in the area!

The Greenhouse classes are getting a taste of what it is like running a business. Over the last few months, students involved in the agricultural education classes have been tending plants in their greenhouses. The operations have been made possible through the continuous support and efforts of the Wisconsin Heights District along with local supporters.

In addition to plants, there are hanging baskets, arrangements, and stepping stones! Each school has a catalog with plant availability, hours of operation, and pricing. Visit the district <u>website</u> and scroll down to the "What's New" section for more details.

Prices are \$3 for annuals, \$2 for herbs & vegetables, \$4-\$7 for perennials, \$10-\$18 for shrubs / landscape plants, \$15 for stepping stones, \$10 for ceramic planters, and \$30 for hanging baskets.

Greenhouse shopping options:

1. Order Online:

Fill out the <u>online form</u> (which will be available starting at 8:00 AM Saturday, May 1st through Monday May 3rd at 4:00 PM). After the form has been submitted, you will be contacted by a staff member confirming your order and pick up time.

2. In Person/Walk Through Sale:

We will be conducting an in person / walk-through sale on May 8th (8:00 AM - 1:00 PM) and May 9th (12:00 PM - 2:00 PM) as well as May 15th (8:00 AM - 1:00 PM). Please follow social distancing rules and wear a mask.

- There will be tables set up with plants for you to view on the sidewalk.
- You will fill out an order form and a staff/FFA Alumni member will gather your order and bring it to your vehicle.
- If you would rather shop in the greenhouse, it will be open for a limited number of people at a time.

Notes from the Nurse

We are getting close to the end of the year and it's time to start looking towards the next school year. All incoming Kindergarteners and 6th graders are required to have immunizations they need before next school year.

Kindergarten

Any students entering Kindergarten will need to get their last set of shots (for a few years), besides the recommended annual flu shot. Before next school year make sure your kindergarten student has:

- 4 doses of DTaP (1 dose needs to be after the 4th birthday)
- 4 doses of Polio
- 3 doses of Hepatitis B
- 2 doses of MMR
- 2 doses of Varicella

The usual Kindergarten shots include 1 dose of DTap, Polio, MMR and Varicella. These are typically in a combination so there are only 2 pokes.

6th Grade

All students entering 6th grade will need a Tdap booster (for tetanus, diphtheria and pertussis). Tdap is the only required immunization by the State of Wisconsin, however, the Meningococcal and HPV vaccines are also recommended nationally at age 11 or 12.

COVID-19 Vaccine

The COVID-19 vaccine is not required for school but it is recommended to get it when it becomes available for your child's age group. Currently only 16 and older are eligible for the vaccine but that could potentially change over the summer. Pfizer has had great success with their vaccine in the 12-15 age group and is looking to get it approved to start vaccinating that age as well. The more people we have vaccinated in our buildings the less likely we will have COVID-19 outbreaks. Students that are fully vaccinated (2 weeks after the last dose of the vaccine) also would not need to quarantine if they were exposed to someone with COVID-19, as long as they have no symptoms.

If you have any questions about your child's immunization status, please let me know. I am happy to look up your child's immunization records to see if they are up to date and if not let you know what they are missing.

Mental Health/Student Support

In February, Tasha Schuh shared the power of PATH with students (Purpose Attitude Team Hope) in building resilience. As the end of the school year is in sight let's revisit her message to maintain our stamina.

- Find your Purpose now everyone has one fulfill it everyday
- Understand Attitude's influence on growth and learning make it positive
- Choose a Team of trusted people for advocacy and support
- Anticipate Hope for the future

The Dane County Social Justice Youth Forum was held on April 14, 2021 in which Dane County high school students both planned and attended the conference. The students determined the theme to be Intersectionality and Identity and voted that the Keynote would be someone to represent the indigenous people of Wisconsin; therefore, David O-Connor (DPI), a member of the Bad River Band of Lake Superior Chippewa (Ojibwe) in northern Wisconsin, spoke to the students about identity and intersectionality. Other breakout topics included: Understanding white Privilege and your privilege, Celebrating all Cultures, Cultural Appropriation, Student Leader Training, Understanding and Supporting Non-Binary and LGBTQ, and Demystifying defunding the police-a conversation. The day also included a student panel and action planning at the end of the day with student leaders facilitating the conversation. In their action planning they answered the following questions: Who am I? (multicultural, allies, accepting of all our identities, survivor, leader, I am me) Who are my People? (Friends, family members, willing to fight for those who need it, to those who are "isolated" like us) What do we want? (safety and love for all in the world, accurate history, to be seen and heard, more social and emotional learning in our classrooms, equal representation and more voice, more acceptance of marginalized students, more restorative justice). What are we Building? (Fight for equality through different voices, a brave space for students throughout Dane County, community building where people are actively listening and caring for each other, what are we unbuilding and unlearning?) Are we ready to win? (We are ready to fight for future generations, bridges to connect us, failing as long as we learn from it, it is a win, acknowledging that problems exist... Yes, we are ready to win). Our students should be celebrated as they were engaged problem solvers throughout the forum and planning.

College Financial Aid Presentation

The FAFSA (Free Application For Federal Student Aid) financial aid presentation by the Edgewood College financial aid advisor can be found posted under the Wisconsin Heights High School Academics tab or click here: https://screencast-o-matic.com/watch/cYQbDIJ5Y9.

Seniors should be working on or have completed their college applications. If you need any help email kwong@wisheights.k12.wi.us or call 608-767-2586 x 3003.

Admissions officials look at:

- High school rank in class and GPA (grade point average) and the strength of a student's courses over all four high school years
- ACT and/or SAT scores
- School and community activities
- Teacher recommendations, if required
- Student essays, if required
- Overall quality of student effort in preparing the application following directions, proper spelling, typing or neat handwriting, etc.

UW Universities/Colleges: Application priority dates and deadlines vary from campus to campus and sometimes among different programs at one campus. It is to your advantage to apply early! UW-Madison has the earliest priority acceptance deadline. If you have any questions, please contact Mr. Wong or the institution to which you are applying.

The UW System has an enrollment management policy that limits the number of students each campus can accommodate. Specific programs may also have enrollment limits. Even applicants who meet minimum admission requirements may not be admitted.

You may use the UW System Application for Undergraduate Admission to apply to any UW campus. Several items must be submitted to complete your application file.

- A \$25 application fee must be paid to each campus to which you apply with the exception of UW Madison (\$60). In cases of exceptional need, the application fee may be waived. Contact your counselor for details.
- An official copy of your high school transcript. If you have completed any college course work, you must also have an official transcript sent from each college or university attended.
 - •ACT or SAT test scores currently optional at many schools. Some admission offices require an official score report directly from the testing agency before evaluating an application.

Visit https://apply.wisconsin.edu and use the UW System online application for admission.

The Admission Decision – High school seniors notified of admission before finishing their senior year are expected to graduate, successfully complete course work in progress at the time they applied, and maintain the class rank required for admission. UW System institutions reserve the right to rescind admission if a student fails to meet conditions on which admission was based.

MATC will start processing applications as soon as they receive them. You will need to look up the specific programs you are applying to because prerequisites vary. You will also be able to find out if there is a waiting list. From the Madison College homepage http://madisoncollege.edu/ click on Apply for Admission button.

Madison College's online application is secure and easy to use:

- Save your work and come back to it later.
- Receive immediate notification of receipt via e-mail.
- No delay application processing starts right away.

Some programs may have unique admission requirements or early such as assessment test scores, course requirements, or early admission deadlines. From the Madison College homepage, click on the link to "Programs of Study" and find your program to check for any additional requirements.

College/Technical School Applications

Students should email Ms. Shaffer in order to have a transcript sent to any school to which they are applying. At the present time there is no charge to have a transcript sent. Once the request is received, the Guidance Department will mail the transcript out. Get your college applications in as soon as possible.

Notes from the Elementary Music Department EMALIE STERNBERG




Hello Families of Black Earth and Mazomanie Elementaries!

Curbside Pickup Information

Curbside pickup will be at MSHS on Wednesdays between 3:30 PM and 4:30 PM due to significant decrease in need and utilization. Students who attend school in-person should participate in the school meals programs at school, not via curbside pickup. All Weekly Meal Pre-Order Forms through June 4 are posted on the Food/Nutritional Services website. Pre-orders must be placed no later than 12:00 PM on the Monday before curbside pickup, and you are strongly encouraged to pre-order as early as possible.

FREE School Meals - EXTENDED

The USDA issued a broad range of flexibilities to allow school meal programs and childcare institutions across the country to return to serving healthy meals in fall 2021. Several meal service flexibilities that enable social distancing are now extended through **June 30, 2022**. The waivers continue the USDA's commitment to provide safe, healthy meals free of charge to children as the pandemic continues to threaten the food and nutrition security of our most vulnerable.

As part of a complete breakfast or lunch, milk is free. Milk only is charged a la carte, as USDA reimburses complete meals, not a la carte purchases. The milk break (the Wisconsin School Day Milk Program) is charged according to students' meal eligibility as free or paid. This is a state funded rather than a federally funded program.

Please note, you may apply for free or reduced price school meals at any time during the school year. Food Service Application Forms and FAQs are posted to the Annual Student Registration website.

Question: If all meals are free, why are you promoting the completion of meal applications?

Answer: At some point, we expect to return to the traditional model, and there will be a charge for meals served to students who do not qualify for free meals. The application is also the gateway to other benefits. For example, it may assist in helping your family gain discounts on internet access services, as well as fees for college applications, AP tests, and sports participation. Plus, the overall data from applications is used in calculations in funding for other student programs and services, including grant opportunities and access to fresh fruit and vegetable snacks.
