MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR / JORDAN SINZ

Dear Community,

This past month, the Board of Education decided to ask the community to support an operational referendum to maintain school programs and services for the next five years. This request, like the past operational referendums, is due to the continuing trend of state support not meeting school district operational costs. This trend impacts schools throughout the state of Wisconsin; our school district will be one of thirty-three districts asking operational referendum questions this spring.

Like past operational referendums in the school district, we will be requesting funds on a non-recurring basis. We are, however, seeking funds for the next five years rather than a two-year cycle. The school board determined a five-year operational referendum:

- Provides stability for the school district and community as we budget for the next five years.
- Recognizes the community's desire (as indicated by Future Search and School Perceptions Survey data) to recruit and retain quality staff members while maintaining current programming for students.
- Maintains or lowers the school district tax rate (projected to 2012-13 levels) through the length of the referendum.
- Saves district dollars and time needed to facilitate a referendum vote.
- Allows the district time to study facility needs and work to address them. Community feedback has indicated an interest in facility-related improvements.
- Moves the next-operational referendum question (for the 2024-25 school year) off the state budget cycle, allowing for better estimates on state funding.

The referendum will be on April 2, 2019, as part of the local and state spring election.

The District is requesting \$2,200,000 for each of the next five years (2019-20 through 2023-24). The District is projecting the 2019-20 School District <u>tax rates will drop</u> approximately 7 cents per \$1,000 when compared to 2018-19 rates.

This will be the sixth operational referendum proposed since 2009 to address the decrease in state support. The previous five referendums were approved, and the last referendum is currently providing \$2,227,435 of additional operational funding for the Wisconsin Heights School District. This referendum will expire on June 30, 2019.

Informational sessions are scheduled for Monday, March 11, at 6:30 PM at Black Earth Elementary School and Monday, March 18, at 6:30 PM at Mazomanie Elementary School. An informational flyer is being sent to all district residents and should arrive shortly. Also, information is available on the district website at www.wisheights.k12.wi.us.

Sick Policy

There has been a lot of sickness going around and the following conditions require your student to stay home and/or get picked up if it occurs during the school day:

- Temperature greater than 100.4 degrees F: may return after 24 hours fever free without the aid of fever-reducing medications
- **Diarrhea**: may return 24 hours after the last episode.
- Contagious diseases: strep throat, impetigo, pink eye (bacterial), scabies, ringworm, and other diseases not listed: may return after being on prescribed treatment for 24 hours.
- **Vomiting**: may return 24 hours after the last episode.

4K/Kindergarten Pre-Registration

We will be having a 4K/Kindergarten Pre-Registration for the 2019-2020 school year on Tuesday, February 5th, 2019. Parents of children who will be four years old on or before September 1, 2019, are invited to come and enroll their child in the K4 class, while parents of children who will be five years old on or before September 1, 2019, are invited to enroll their child in the K5 class. **Students who are currently enrolled in the Wisconsin Heights 4K class will be automatically enrolled in the Kindergarten program and do not need to attend this night of pre-registration. ** Parents are asked to bring to pre-registration verification of their child's birth date in the form of their original birth certificate and also proof of residency (utility bill, phone bill, lease, etc.). Children do not need to attend.

It has been a busy early winter at Wisconsin Heights Middle/High School. Typically, this time of year is where we begin planning for the next school, 2019-20. As many of you know there are some positive changes coming to the Middle/High School. These are:

• Backpack policy: Per the recommendation of the Dane County Sheriff's Department, we are changing the backpack policy. This new policy is:

Students may utilize traditional bags and backpacks to transport personal items to and from school, but they must be stored in their locker during the school day. Students may carry their books/materials in their arms from class to class. Alternatively, students can use clear plastic or see through mesh bags or backpacks to take books and personal items to classes during the day. Students may also carry a small pencil case to class. At the end of the day, students will be allowed to load their regular backpacks to take items home. There are many different versions of clear or mesh backpacks available on-line and the School Store is investigating adding clear plastic backpacks to the inventory. Students are not required to purchase a bag unless they want to use it to carry items from class to class in a bag.

Law enforcement state that policies like this help **decrease** students bringing items to school that are not appropriate or legal to have in a school setting. I acknowledge that it does not eliminate the risk of someone making a poor decision about a weapon, drugs, etc. Additionally, we are in line with other schools in our conference and in our state with similar policies. Finally, this was a cost neutral solution; students do not need to purchase a different bag. *Please note that this begins in Fall 2019*.

• To facilitate students' ability to go to lockers between classes we are changing the bell schedule for next year, increasing the passing period to four minutes.

I wanted to update you on a few mental health services that are available for families, individuals, and youth. The Psychology Center on the west side of Madison accepts most major insurance plans, as well as some medical assistance programs.

In February, The Psychology Center is offering a DBT (Dialectical Behavior Therapy) group for teen girls ages 13-17. The group will focus on topics such as mindfulness, effective communication, coping with overwhelming emotions, and handling stress. Click here for more information on <u>DBT</u>.

Scholarship Opportunities

I will make a presentation to all seniors in early February explaining the WHEF and Independent scholarships that are run through our school.

Please check the binder in the guidance office for scholarship opportunities and application deadlines. Currently we have a variety of random scholarships in the binder. The vast majority of local scholarships, however won't be available to apply for until later in February. There are also a number of random scholarships available in a binder in the Guidance Office.

Juniors and Seniors

All Juniors will be taking the ACT at the high school on February 20, 2019. There is no registration necessary as this will all be taken care of by the school. For those interested, ACT is now offering a free online test prep. This can be accessed at https://academy.act.org/. For those interested in doing a retake, you can register online for the ACT at www.actstudent.org. The SAT can be accessed at http://collegeboard.com/student/index.html? student. You can also find test dates and deadlines using these sites.

Seniors should be working on their college applications.

Admissions officials look at:

- High school rank in class and GPA (grade point average) and the strength of a student's courses over all four high school years
- ACT and/or SAT scores
- School and community activities
- Teacher recommendations, if required
- Student essays, if required
- Overall quality of student effort in preparing the application following directions, proper spelling, typing or neat handwriting, etc.

UW Universities/Colleges

Application priority dates and deadlines vary from campus to campus and sometimes among different programs at one campus. It is to your advantage to apply early! If you have any questions, please contact Mr. Wong or the institution to which you are applying.

The UW System has an enrollment management policy that limits the number of students each campus can accommodate. Specific programs may also have enrollment limits. Even applicants who meet minimum admission requirements may not be admitted.

Guidance Department continued

You may use the UW System Application for Undergraduate Admission to apply to any UW campus. Whether you apply online or use the paper application, several items must be submitted to complete your application file.

- A \$50 application fee (\$60 for UW Madison) must be paid to each campus to which you apply. In cases of exceptional need, the application fee may be waived. Contact your counselor for details.
- An official copy of your high school transcript. If you have completed any college course work, you must also have an official transcript sent from each college or university attended.
- ACT or SAT test scores. Some admission offices require an official score report directly from the testing agency before evaluating an application.

Visit https://apply.wisconsin.edu and use the UW System online application for admission. Features of the online eApplication include easy ability to apply to multiple campuses and optional Visa or MasterCard payment of the application fee.

The Admission Decision – High school seniors notified of admission before finishing their senior year are expected to graduate, successfully complete course work in progress at the time they applied and maintain the class rank required for admission. UW System institutions reserve the right to rescind admission if a student fails to meet conditions on which admission was based.

MATC Registration

MATC will start processing applications as soon as they receive them. You will need to look up the specific programs you are applying to because prerequisites vary. You will also be able to find out if there is a waiting list or not. From the Madison College homepage http://madisoncollege.edu/ click on Apply For Admission link.

Madison College's online application is secure and easy to use:

- Save your work and come back to it later.
- Receive immediate notification of receipt via e-mail.
- No delay application processing starts right away.

Some programs may have unique admission requirements such as assessment test scores, course requirements, or early admission deadlines. From the Madison College homepage, click on the link to "Programs of Study" and find your program to check for any additional requirements.

College Applications

Students must fill out a <u>Transcript Request Form</u> in order to have a transcript sent to any school they are applying to. This form may be picked up in the Guidance Office. At the present time there is no charge to have a transcript sent. Once the request is received, there will be a 3-4 day turnaround in getting the transcript out. Get applications in as soon as possible.

Notes from the Nurse KATY HOWE

There has been a lot of concern about head lice in our schools this year, although we have only had a few cases. I wanted to try to address some of the Myths and Truths associated with head lice.

Myth: Head Lice is easy to get

A lot of people assume head lice is easy to get but actually its harder to get than the common cold, flu, pink eye or pretty much anything else we have that goes around the school. The likelihood of it spreading at school is about 1%. You have to have very close head-to-head contact for it to spread and that doesn't really happen much in the school setting. Head lice are wingless insects that can't fly or jump and can only crawl short distances. To help reduce any spread make sure kids aren't sharing brushes, combs, hats or other hair accessories. That is the most likely way lice can spread at school but is still rare. They can't spread from helmets, headphones or baseball hats.

Myth: Head Lice breed in furniture or carpets or can spread from clothing

A louse's entire existence is dependent on its human host and without it lice typically die within 24 hours. Only things that have been in close contact with the head of the person with lice in the previous 24-48 hours should be considered for treatment. Lice want to stay close to their human host and can't crawl far so it's rare for them to be on other objects. If you are concerned about an item, then clothing should be washed and rugs or other cloth items can be vacuumed. Most of the time students share time together outside of school and that is where the lice is being spread. Clothing stored next to each other, shared headphones, riding on the bus together and playing on the playground or in sports are not sources of transmission.

Lice is not a fun thing to have and can be a pain to get rid of, the good thing about lice is it doesn't pose a health risk to you or your children. If we discover lice on a child at school their parents will be notified and they can stay for the day, they need to get treatment at home and then can return. If any lice cases are found we also send a letter home to the classroom, no names included, so you will be aware if there are any lice cases in your child's class. I hope that helps with any concerns you had about lice or what we do in the school setting.

Child Find

Under a federal program called "Child Find," school districts are required to offer screenings and evaluations to help identify children who need specialized instruction in motor, social, communication, self-help and/or learning skills. Children who are found to have a qualifying disability can receive Early Childhood Special Education Services (ECSE). Child Find is a continuous process of public awareness and activities provided by the Wisconsin Heights School District. All resident families with children ages two-five are invited to take part in our third annual Child Development Fair on February 18th from 1:00-6:30 pm. Information on Child Find will be mailed out in January.



Wisconsin Heights Child Development Fair (CDF)



February 18, 2019 (1:00-6:30 pm) at Black Earth Elementary School

The purpose of the Child Development Fair is to provide families of children ages 2-5 an opportunity to support their child's early development and to learn more about children's resources within our community. Children will be screened in all areas of development, (including a vision and hearing screening), and parents will be able to explore a variety of local community resources. Any child who will be two years old by January 1, 2019 is invited to attend this free event. Pre-Registration is required for the Child Development Fair which can be done in person at the 4K Registration being held Tuesday, February 5th, or by phone in early January.

Why is your Child's Developmental Health Important?

Research shows that recognizing and addressing delays early in a child's development increases their success in learning throughout their schooling. Find out how to ensure your child is on the right track for success by signing up for the Wisconsin Heights Child Development Fair.

What programs does the Wisconsin Heights School District offer for children between the ages of 3 and 5?

The Wisconsin Heights School District offers three educational programs for young children, Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE), 4-year-old Kindergarten, and Kindergarten.

Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) is for children who qualify for special services
due to a qualifying disability. Children between the ages of 3-5 may qualify for special
services. Possible services include Speech and Language Therapy; Occupational
Therapy; Physical Therapy; and cognitive, social-emotional, or adaptive services
provided by an Early Childhood Special Education Teacher. These services can be
provided within a range of environments including the following: inclusion into a 4K or
Kindergarten class, a separate three-year-old ECSE class, a home, or daycare setting.
Placement is determined by the age and needs of each individual child. Any child who

has a documented disability and who turns three years old prior to or within the 2019-20 school year is eligible for ECSE services for the 2019-20 school year.

- Four-Year-Old Kindergarten (4K) is a half day program for any child who will be four
 years old prior to September 1, 2019. Four-year-old-Kindergarten is universal and open
 to all children within the Wisconsin Heights School District. The curriculum is
 developmentally appropriate, with both child- and teacher-directed activities. The
 emphasis is on active learning and addressing all areas of child development.
- Kindergarten (5K) is for any child who will be five years old prior to September 1, 2019.

Age Eligibility at a Glance for the 2019-20 School Year

- Children 5 years of age by September 1, 2019 are eligible for Kindergarten (5K)
- Children 4 years of age by September 1, 2019 are eligible for 4K
- Children 3 years of age at any time during the 2019-20 school year may be eligible for Early Childhood Special Education (ECSE) with a documented disability. The Wisconsin Heights School District is responsible for screening, referring, and evaluating children suspected of having a disability.

Important Dates!

- February 5th Four-Year-Old Kindergarten (4K) Pre-Registration from 3:30-5:30 pm at Black Earth Elementary School. This is for parents interested in enrolling their child in the 4K program for the 2019-20 school year. Parents/caregivers are strongly encouraged to come to Black Earth Elementary and fill out pre-registration paperwork on February 5th. At the same time, parents will be able to sign-up for the Child Development Fair and complete the Parent Questionnaire.
- February 5th Pre-Registration/Appointment Sign-up for 2-5 year-olds to attend
 the Child Development Fair from 3:30-5:30 pm at Black Earth Elementary School.
