## MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR / JORDAN SINZ

The first three months of the school year have flown by incredibly fast. Students and staff have done a phenomenal job, achieving remarkable things inside and outside of the classroom. As we approach the end of the calendar year, there are a few important items to share with all community members:

- The Wisconsin Heights School District would like to thank all our survey participants; we had a tremendous response rate. The survey results indicated our community is supportive of their public school and believes our district is providing a quality education. Our staff and school board are dedicated to continually reaffirming this belief and further demonstrating our shared commitment to continuous improvement. Paper copies of the results are also available through the district office; please call 608-767-2595 to request a copy.
- At our December 10th school board meeting, the Board of Education will discuss our upcoming operational referendum. This discussion will set the stage for the operational referendum resolution that will be approved at the January 14th Board Meeting. The school district understands their responsibility to provide a high-quality education in a fiscally responsible fashion. Our operational referendum question will ultimately reflect our desire to meet these needs. The referendum vote will take place on April 2, 2019. Stay tuned for more information.
- In preparation for winter weather, I have established communication lines with neighboring school districts, First Student transportation services, and county employees. The decision to delay, cancel, or excuse school early due to weather conditions is a very difficult process that involves communication with all of these groups. If the decision is made to cancel school, we will communicate immediately through our Skylert messaging system. Parents will receive a text, email, or phone call based on the preferences they selected during the registration process. We will also communicate with local media (TV and radio), and information will be placed on the district website and Facebook page. We will use all available information to make the best decision possible. However, I fully acknowledge “snow days” take on very different meanings depending on who you are. Some individuals cannot help but be excited, while others are left scrambling to make arrangements for their families. Careful thought will be put into this decision-making process as challenging winter weather arrives.

Happy Holidays and enjoy the winter break. I wish you and your family a blessed end to 2018 and a positive start to 2019! Students will be off school from December 22 through January 1. School will be back in session on January 2, 2019. We are together on the journey of providing an educational experience that is of distinct quality! 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Welcome to December! Our social/emotional lessons ended last month by talking about the difference between tattling and Telling. Our K-2 students used the book *A Bad Case of Tattle Tongue* by Julia Cook to help guide our discussion. We used the four tattle rules to help us play a game at the end of the lesson. Our 3-5 students watched a short video about tattling vs. telling, which helped us make some decisions on common scenarios of tattling.

We have moved into school safety and have been using the book *I'm Not Scared... I'm Prepared! Because I know All About ALICE* by Julia Cook. As a school district we are talking more about school safety and working with our students to prepare them for the possibility of a dangerous person coming into our buildings. This story walks through the steps of staying safe nicely and is helping us to guide our discussion with our students as we prepare for our new ALICE safety drills. Look for a letter to come home with the main points of the story.

As we move into the holiday season, our lessons will begin to focus on family. We will look at the differences within families, who makes up families, and how each of our family may look different from one another. I wish all of you a safe, healthy and happy holiday season!!

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## Senior Scholarship Opportunities

Please check the binder in the guidance office for scholarship opportunities and application deadlines. Currently we have a variety of random scholarships in the binder. The vast majority of local scholarships, however, won't be available to apply for until later in February. I will make a presentation to all seniors in early February explaining the WHEF and Independent scholarships that are run through our school.

Seniors should be working on their college applications.

Admissions officials look at:

- High school rank in class and GPA (grade point average) and the strength of a student's courses over all four high school years
- ACT and/or SAT scores
- School and community activities
- Teacher recommendations, if required
- Student essays, if required
- Overall quality of student effort in preparing the application – following directions, proper spelling, typing or neat handwriting, etc.

**UW Universities/Colleges** - Application priority dates and deadlines vary from campus to campus and sometimes among different programs at one campus. It is to your advantage to apply early! If you have any questions, please contact Mr. Wong or the institution to which you are applying.

The UW System has an enrollment management policy that limits the number of students each campus can accommodate. Specific programs may also have enrollment limits. Even applicants who meet minimum admission requirements may not be admitted.

You may use the UW System Application for Undergraduate Admission to apply to any UW campus. Whether you apply online or use the paper application, several items must be submitted to complete your application file.

- A \$60 application fee must be paid to each campus to which you apply. In cases of exceptional need, the application fee may be waived. Contact your counselor for details.
- An official copy of your high school transcript. If you have completed any college course work, you must also have an official transcript sent from each college or university attended.
- ACT or SAT test scores. Some admission offices require an official score report directly from the testing agency before evaluating an application.

Visit <https://apply.wisconsin.edu> and use the UW System online application for admission. Features of the online eApplication include an easy ability to apply to multiple campuses and optional Visa or MasterCard payment of the application fee.

The Admission Decision – High school seniors notified of admission before finishing their senior year are expected to graduate, successfully complete course work in progress at the time they applied, and maintain the class rank required for admission. UW System institutions reserve the right to rescind admission if a student fails to meet conditions on which admission was based.

MATC will start processing applications as soon as they receive them. You will need to look up the specific programs you are applying to because prerequisites vary. You will also be able to find out if there is a waiting list or not. From the Madison College homepage <http://madisoncollege.edu/> click on Apply for Admission button.

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Madison College's online application is secure and easy to use:

- Save your work and come back to it later.
- Receive immediate notification of receipt via e-mail.
- No delay – application processing starts right away.

Some programs may have unique or early admission requirements such as assessment test scores, course requirements, or early admission deadlines. From the Madison College homepage, click on the link to “Programs of Study” and find your program to check for any additional requirements.

## Transcripts

Students must fill out a Transcript Request Form in order to have a transcript sent to any school they are applying to. This form may be picked up outside the Guidance Office. At the present time there is no charge to have a transcript sent. Once the request is received it will be mailed out by the Guidance Office.

## Juniors and Seniors

All juniors will be taking the ACT at the high school on February 20, 2019. There is no registration necessary this will all be taken care of by the school. For those interested, ACT is now offering a free online test prep. This can be accessed at <https://act.org/>. For those interested in doing a retake you can register online for the ACT [www.actstudent.org](http://www.actstudent.org). The SAT can be accessed at <http://www.collegeboard.com/student/>. You can find out test dates and deadlines using these sites also.

## 8th Grade Parents' Night

Stay tuned for more information on an informational night for parents which will help to explain many of the questions you may have about the transition to high school. It is tentatively scheduled for some time in early December. You will be able to ask any questions that you have about scheduling or the general transition to high school. Besides learning about this transition, you will become familiarized with Wisconsin Heights High School graduation requirements and the coursework that will prepare students for post-secondary options.

# Harvest of the Month

## Cabbage



### FUN FACTS:

This low-calorie vegetable is a nutritional powerhouse! It is an excellent source of fiber, Vitamin C and Vitamin K, which aid in healing wounds and protecting the heart.

It is one of the oldest vegetables of the world. The most common varieties include:

- Green - used in traditional coleslaw
- Napa - commonly used in Asian cooking
- Red - often used in German and Swedish recipes
- Savoy - favorite for Italian cuisine

## CABBAGE

### The Underestimated Vegetable

## HARVEST OF THE MONTH RECIPE—DECEMBER

### Braised Cabbage Apple Bacon

Yield: 4 servings

- 2 slices thick cut bacon
- 3 c chopped green cabbage
- 3 c chopped red cabbage
- 1 c chopped yellow onion
- 1 c Braeburn apple, skin on, chopped
- 1 c Granny Smith apple, skin on, chopped
- 3 Tbs balsamic vinegar
- 3/4 tsp black pepper
- 1/8 tsp kosher salt

1. Chop bacon into small chunks and cook in a large saucepan for 5 minutes.
2. Add the chopped green and red cabbage, and chopped onion.
3. Simmer for 20 minutes, covered.
4. Add the chopped apples, balsamic vinegar, salt, and pepper.
5. Simmer for another 5 minutes.
6. Serve and Enjoy!
