MESSAGE FROM THE DISTRICT ADMINISTRATOR / JORDAN SINZ

I find myself asking what is going on and more importantly, what small part can I play in helping the situation vs. contributing to the seemingly non-stop negative news feed. I believe that we as a school district and a community at large can play a very powerful role in shaping the newsfeed that surrounds us. From safety plans to ALICE training to collaboration with local law enforcement, our district has and will continue to take proactive steps in the area of school safety. Please do not hesitate to share any feedback you may have, particularly around the topic of school safety. Simply put, we are working hard to ensure our school environment is a safe place to learn.

The title of this article, "Relationships Matter", is a fundamental belief that I have as an educator and something that I work to consistently reinforce with anyone that will listen! Our school's relationships with students, parents, and the community matters. We show it matters by listening and doing the best we can to be responsive to the needs of our students. This does not mean we will always have unanimous support for every decision we make, but it does mean that every decision we make is grounded in doing what is best for ALL students in the Wisconsin Heights School District. At the start of the school year and in many situations since, I have shared three non-negotiable behaviors for our staff members.

1. We will establish a collaborative culture
2. We will respect each other (students and staff alike)
3. We will do what is best for kids

Middle/High School News

The end of January and early February have been very busy times at the High School and Middle School. Looking at each point, it's exciting to see evidence of reaching towards our shared vision.

I'll begin by talking about academics and the building. Juniors and staff have been preparing for the ACT on February 27 and 28. Students have completed the non-assessment parts of their forms and are ready to begin on Tuesday with the ACT+Writing, followed by the ACT WorkKeys on Wednesday. Big thanks to Tammy Shaffer, Kurt Wong, and Rich Moyer for their coordination.

Our School Improvement Planning (SIP) team recently decided that staff needed to see and experience vocabulary-building strategies. So members of the team (Trevor Steiner, Mike Dahlman, Dawn Schlick, and Kalpana Kanwar) put together live demos for staff. Staff left the session affirming they had strategies to try. Everyone also left with an understand for how difficult vocabulary can be to learn and use.

Students recently took the Dane County Youth Assessment (DCYA). Data from the assessment is used to inform policy, practice, and resource distribution to help students across the county. We are waiting on results for our schools (not individuals) and the county.

Melissa Schmitt's 7th grade class has begun the #StandByYou movement in school as a way to advocate for inclusion of all students. Students have created banners, taken surveys, and shared how we're all alike while also showing we have differences - differences that make us unique and worth knowing.

In December, staff took to the challenge to share positive referrals with students. Since that time, positive referrals have vastly outnumbered behavioral referrals. So the challenge was presented to students to send positive referrals to staff in the building. Students responded right away with an outpouring of kind words for staff. It's been wonderful to see the positivity.

In partnership with Sarah Shatz, who is our social worker with Joining Family Forces, we have requested to the Dane County Executive and Board that Wisconsin Heights be made a part of the Access to Opportunity initiative. The initiative provides support to school districts so that all students can take drivers education. For some of our families, the cost of drivers education can be very prohibitive, which in a rural area can be prohibitive to a career and transportation.

Deputy Scott Herrem of the Dane County Sheriff's department is new to our area and has been in contact on a regular basis to build our relationship. Recently, Deputy Herrem and a partner visited the building to walk and become more familiar with the layout and spaces. This was a helpful dialogue as we constantly revisit safety. This also follows a review of our security cameras in the building that need updating. Thanks to Scott Wischer, Rich Moyer, and Bill Sullivan for their insights in the review and in working with vendors on walk throughs. We're also working on networking our cameras to the Dane County Sheriff's department in order to have another set of eyes in our building. While we hope it's never needed, it's a step we're taking to help in the event of a crisis.

Turning from academics and the building, students have been involved in a number of activities.

The Honors Choir recently traveled to Platteville High School for a busy day of singing training with performers from other southwesternly schools. The day concluded with a concert, featuring four songs the collaborative choir learned and crafted that day. Remarkable.

Rehearsal has begun for the Spring Play under the direction of Bruce Bradley. The show will be performed on March 16 through the 18th.

The annual Prom Fashion Show did not disappoint. Our Juniors looked amazing in their outfits, and the community enjoyed the sites, atmosphere, and even the occasional joke. Kim Houser and Natalie Goebel were pivotal staff members working in conjunction with many, many parents on making a successful event.

Seniors

The WHEF and Other Local Scholarship Booklet and information has gone out to the senior class. **These scholarship applications are due to the guidance office by 3:30 p.m. on Monday, March 12th. Late applications will not be accepted.**

Please check the binder in the guidance office for other scholarship opportunities. Currently we have a variety of random scholarships in the binder.

Scholarships Received from College or Other Outside Sources

On Scholarship Evening, we would like to recognize students who have been awarded scholarships from the school they will be attending next year or from other outside sources. If you have received notification of a scholarship from a college or group not included in our WHEF and Other Local Scholarship Booklet, please see Ms. Shaffer for an Outside Scholarship Award form. All forms are due to the guidance department no later than Monday, May 7th.

Taking the ACT or SAT

The ACT and the SAT are national tests which colleges use as part of the admission process. All of our juniors will take the ACT with writing on Tuesday, February 27 and the results may be used for college admissions. Later tests will be offered outside the school in April, June, July, September, October and December. Many students will take a test more than once, in an effort to improve their score. Most schools in the Midwest prefer the ACT. However, you should check with any school you are considering applying to, to find out which they would like you to take and whether they require the writing portion of the test. All juniors interested in attending a four-year college or a UW system school should take one or the other. Students are encouraged to take the practice tests to familiarize themselves with the test (<http://www.act.org/content/dam/act/unsecured/documents/Preparing-for-the-ACT.pdf>) or (<http://knowhow2gowisconsin.org>). Madison College (formerly known as MATC) does not require the ACT although it could be helpful when applying for certain programs.

Wisconsin Heights School District Summer Program

Tired of hearing “I’m bored,” or “There’s nothing to do,” over summer vacation? Well, Wisconsin Heights School District will be hosting a NEW and IMPROVED Summer School Program this year to keep your children busy, active and learning. We will have even more enrichment courses to choose from and have extended our enrichment program to three weeks / ten days. Our Summer Program will run in two sessions. Session One will offer both enrichment and remedial course offerings and will run from June 18th through July 3rd, Monday – Thursday from 8:00-12:00.
