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At the Lancaster Elementary School - Play is Serious Business

As the snow melts, the playground becomes muddy, water flows downhill creating a small stream, and some of the four year old students at Lancaster Elementary are fascinated, spending several days building tiny dams with twigs, rocks, and pieces of ice. They observe how the water stream changes course and notice which materials are most effective at stopping or diverting the water. Curiosity is a natural trait of young learners who show eagerness to discover and explore. Play provides children with invaluable opportunities to learn. Besides the benefits for physical activity and exercise, children learn how to control their emotions and impulses when they are playing. When children are busy at play, they also learn how to persist and find solutions. For example, when children learned the stream had frozen overnight, they worked on finding elements they could use to break the ice and if something would not work, they would keep on trying to find the "right" tool. Play helps children develop a very important skill called *Executive Functioning*, which will help develop their ability to learn, focus, pay attention, and get along with others. Children who have the opportunity to play screen free, will have an enormous advantage in their learning. So when you see a group of children playing in the mud or running on the playground, know that indeed, their play is serious business.
