MSTEP Testing

Students in grades 3-5 are required to take the M-STEP which is an online standardized test. Students in 5th grade will be taking 4 subtests: Reading, Math, Science, and Social Studies. Students in 3rd and 4th grade will be taking 2 sub-tests: Reading and Math. All testing takes place while students are at school

We are working hard to ensure that students are prepared for taking the M-STEP. It will be important that students get good sleep the night before each testing date.

Read by 3rd **Grade Law**

The State has put into place the Read by Grade 3 reading law that requires schools in Michigan to assess our students 3 times per year to determine if they are at the appropriate grade level in reading. It is expected that students are at the 3rd-grade reading level by the end of 3rd grade.

We use several different assessments that help us to determine the areas in which we need to provide interventions for those students who are not at grade level. Those students receive a tier 2 intervention in the classroom. Those students who require additional interventions, a tier 3 intervention, are pulled out to the Title I Reading Room to work with our Reading Interventist. We have been able to see good growth for all of our students this school year.

All 3rd grade students will be required to take the M-STEP for the first time in their educationals career. The data from that state-required assessment will determine if a student might need to be recommended to be retained due to low reading skills. It is very important that we work together to avoid any of our students having to be retained at the end of 3rd-grade.

The best way to support your student at home is to read with him/her every day. You can have them read to you, you can read to them, you can take turns reading. Any type of reading will greatly benefit your students. If you are in need of books at home please let your student's teacher
