SIXTH GRADERS CHANGE IN SENIORITY

It has been four months since the sixth graders joined the middle school from elementary. The reason for this was due to the teacher leaving in the middle of the year. Without any sort of warning, the sixth graders were put in an unfamiliar environment as soon as winter break ended. Due to this change, there was a school wide schedule change for everyone in the Middle/High school. Not only the students were affected by this, but the staff as well.

Middle/High school math teacher Ms. Rendon says she doesn't think they were ready since it happened too fast to adjust to everything. Also, it was kind of thrown at her before she was prepared to teach all 26 sixth graders in one class. One positive for her is that she'll be able to teach them from 6th ,7th ,8th and hopefully 9th grade math. 6th/8th grade history and MS Special Education teacher Ms. Lopez says the pros of having the sixth graders here are that she has more time with the students in middle school, and "we are more like the other middle schools in the state." But the cons are having to teach all 26 sixth graders in one class. "It gets hard to help struggling students when there are a bunch of students in one group." Her entire position changed from teaching ELA and history to her current position 6th/8th grade history and MS Special Education. After two years of remote learning, students weren't as prepared as they could be.

School counselor Ms. Laumbach says that this was the best option since they could either learn from multiple teachers for the rest of the year, or, be stuck with a sub probably not learning as much as they should. This change had been discussed before but was never put in place since they wanted to see what effect this would have on all of the students including high school students. The biggest challenge for Laumbach was trying to get the teachers to accept this change, but staff and other classmen as well were also apprehensive to change.

The incoming sixth graders were affected the most by this change. They went from being the oldest in the elementary to the youngest in middle school. Sixth grader Natalia Duran says that this new experience has a lot of responsibility, and she's learned you have to be more mature but overall likes it. Duran never thought she would be in middle school this quickly since she thought she had another year to prepare herself. Sixth grader Daniel Martinez says he was excited and nervous to be in middle school because it would be new but different. He had no problem with the teachers and students and thinks it's better than he thought it would be. All sixth graders must feel this way since they were used to the elementary environment and had to get used to the difficulty of switching classes, getting to know the teachers, knowing the locker, and being with older kids.

6th graders continued.

Overall, the bringing up of the sixth graders to the middle school can hopefully help them mature faster. From some points others think that they still have their immature elementary behavior while others think they aren't as bad as they thought. This change will stay in place for incoming sixth graders. The fact that you have a lot more freedom and you don't have to deal with one teacher the whole day proves that it's a big stepping stone to becoming more independent. With all the hardships that happened with moving up a grade level, it may be easier to plan the next year.

MONEY FOR INTERNET BILLS

All families at PISD are eligible for funding to pay \$35-75/month toward their Internet bills. Many people previously received the Emergency Broadband Benefit. That program has ended, and now you must apply for a new program, the Affordable Connectivity Benefit.

You will need the following:

- The Internet account holder's date of birth
- Account holder's address (physical and mailing)
- Account holder's last four digits of social security #
- One student's date of birth
- One student's last four digits of social security number
- You will likely be asked to attach proof of your child's enrollment. You
 must type your names on the form or ask the Nurturing Center to
 add your names



PROOF OF STUDENT ENROLLMENT AT PISD USE FOR ACP APPLICATION

During the application process (either during enrollment or in a follow-up email), you may be asked for proof of enrollment. Use this form. Add your student's name and your name where it says "Student" and "Guardian." You must type your name or ask the Nurtuing Center to do so for you.

HOW TO APPLY FOR THE AFFORDABLE CONNECTIVITY PROGRAM (FORMERLY THE EMERGENCY BROADBAND BENEFIT)

All families in the district qualify for a federal program that will pay \$35/month toward your Internet bills (\$75/month for families living on tribal land). To apply, click here: https://acpbenefit.org. Scroll down the page until you see this:



You will need the DOB of the parent and child and the last 4 digits of the parent's SS# and child's SS#.

Once you create your account, you'll start the application. Select "Enrollment at USDA Community Eligibility Provision (CEO) School" as the qualifying factor.

Be sure to write down the child and address that you submit.

Submit the application. You will receive an email from Lifeline Support with the subject line "You Qualify for the Affordable Connectivity Program." If you have Kit Carson Internet, forward the email to nvarela@kitcarson.com along with this exact info:

- Your Name, Address, Phone #, Date of Birth, Last four of SSN.
- Your Child's Full name, Date of Birth and Last 4 SSN.

Thanks to changes signed into law by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, the New Mexico Working Families Tax Credit and Low Income Comprehensive Tax Rebate are worth more than ever -- and are available to more filers than ever.

More than 500,000 New Mexicans may be eligible for one or both, but you must file an income tax return to be eligible.

The credit and the rebate are both refundable, meaning you may get money back even if your income tax liability is zero.

WORKING FAMILIES TAX CREDIT

The Working Families Tax Credit is worth 20% of the federal Earned Income Tax Credit this year and is available to families with as much as \$57,000 in earned income.

Based on earned income and family size, the credit can be **worth as much as \$1,345**, on top of whatever federal EITC you may qualify for.

This year's expansion made Working Families available to young workers between 18 and 25 with or without children and to people who don't have a Social Security number but who file using an ITIN. So, even if you don't qualify for the EITC, you may still qualify for New Mexico's Working Families Tax Credit.

LOW INCOME COMPREHENSIVE TAX REBATE

The Low Income Comprehensive Tax Rebate is now available to people with as much as \$36,000 in modified gross income.

The rebate can be **as much as \$730**, depending on your income and the number of dependents you claim.
