The first National Child Abuse Awareness Month was declared by President Jimmy Carter in 1979. After four years, April was formally established as Child Abuse Prevention Month by President Ronald Reagan.

The U.S Department of Health and Human Services requests that communities actively take part in preventing child abuse and be supportive of the well-being of families. The federal government of the United States gives funds in support of the cause.
