Freshman year:

- Take the most challenging courses that you can
- Begin to keep track of your activities for your resume
- Talk to your school counselor about job shadowing
- Join at least one club, organization or sport
- Review requirements for National Honor Society: 89.5 avg. and participation in extra-curricular activities.
- Complete Naviance orientation with your counselor

Sophomore year:

- Continue taking the most challenging courses that you can
- Join or stay involved in at least one club, organization or sport
- Update your resume with awards, honors, activities
- Take pre-PSAT in early spring for practice
- Research careers in Naviance

Junior year:

- Take the PSAT in October, and the SAT or ACT in the spring
- Join or stay involved in at least one club, organization or sport
- Update your resume with awards, honors, activities
- Attend the TC3 College Fair
- Meet with college representatives who come to the school
- Use Naviance to make a list of colleges that meet your Interests, needs and goals
- Do some college visits (interviews and tours)

Checklist for summer and breaks

- Visit college campuses

Senior year

- Meet with counselor to do senior credit check
- Update your resume with awards, honors, activities
- Take or retake SATs or ACTs
- File NCAA form if playing a sport for a Div. I or II college
- Apply for scholarships - Read your emails for applications
- Meet with college representatives who come to school
- Ask teachers, counselor, employers, club advisors and coaches to write you recommendations
- Apply to college; let your counselor know where
- Attend the Financial Aid Workshop
- File the FAFSA after October 1
- Keep in close contact with your counselor about your plans
