Describe how the LEA will determine its most important educational needs as a result of COVID-19:

Answer:

Hampton Public Schools will use multiple data points to assess the most important educational needs of our students, staff and families. The academic assessments are the Universal screens, DRA, and READ

180 data points. We will also hold a stakeholder input meeting open to all stakeholders. The purpose is to allow community members to give input into what next steps we should be taking as a district to ensure the needs of all students are understood and met. In addition, we will analyze our discipline data, our special education referrals, and attendance data, looking for trends or anomalies.

#### Question:

Describe the LEA's proposed time-line for providing services and assistance to all students and staff in public schools:

#### Answer:

We will start with providing an extensive and intensive summer program, with transportation, to all students who scored in the level 2 or below on our STARR assessments. In the fall we will provide an after-school home work club as well as after school mental health breakouts. We will also continue our student mentoring program. We will continue these supports all year. In addition, we will continue our staff quarterly mindful breakouts. These sessions were facilitated by our School Psychologists as a support for faculty and administrators to gather together and discuss our well being.

#### Ancwor

We intend to minimally use the ESSR funds to promote remote learning, but are glad to be able to use the remote learning when necessary. We will use remote learning on snow days or other times when school cannot be in session. We won't be offering a remote option next year but know that we can pivot to that option if need be.

## Answer:

We will continue to use our STARR assessments and other universal assessments as we have always used. We pride ourselves in using data to drive instruction. Our Personal learning cohorts and grade level teams will continue to meet often to decipher the data. We have interventionists at all schools and will continue to use their expertise to guide our efforts in closing any learning gaps that arise. Most important, we will not forget about the social emotional needs and possible gaps in our children. The Pandemic took a toll on all of us and we need time to heal. We will implement our district wide mentoring program for all students where all students are in a group of no more than 10 students. Groups meet weekly with Mentors, who are all staff in the building.

To hire consultants to assist the district in three separate areas:

- 1. To supplement our already existing mentoring program; one consultant who works 18 per month in all three schools implementing our mentoring program which provides novice and new teachers with collaborative coaching linked to student learning. The program includes 28 mentors and 34 coaching partners. Total cost = \$32,640; some funding already comes from Title II. We want ESSR to provide the remaining \$7,392.35 for this annual service.
- 2. To work closely with our staff and families to create a strong foundation for Hampton Public Schools sustained work focused on educational equity. We will continue our work with NH LIstens out of the University of New Hampshire. NH LIstens coaches will design and facilitate an "educators leading fro educational equity foundation learning series" across all schools in our district. This is capped at 25 educators and will include a mix of ed. assistants, support staff, teachers, and specialists. There will be 6 sessions of two hours each. In addition, NH Listens will will support our parent teacher groups to access and implement high quality family engagement strategies by providing structures across the district for family engagement. NH Listens will also provide School BOard Professional Development by designing and facilitating one 2- hour interactive work session to encourage members to foster an environment and culture that continually attends to building educational equity in classrooms, schools, and in the district overall. Total cost = \$21,850
- 3. To hire a BCBA consultant for one day per week to assist us in our needest program at our elementary school in the New England Center for Children program, ages K-2. This BCBA will provide direct services to 6 students with disabilities, provide supervision of two RBT's, and consult with staff. Total cost = \$129 / hour for 8 hours per day/ for 40 weeks = \$41,280
- 4. To hire an outside consultant to virtually facilitate a training for our support staff during their PD 1/2 day in May which will focus on important behavior management skills needed by today's para professionals. We will work Cristia Lesher Associates and Polly Bath is the consultant. total cost = \$1,900

Given the significant national and statewide concern with tenure and retention of high-quality principals, it is also hoped that mentoring and coaching will extend the longevity of school leaders.

This will temper, dehumidify, and improve air exchange at three times per hour. We continue to adhere to all CDC guidelines as we are full time face-to-face at this time.

Fountas and Pinnell Leveled Literacy Intervention Purple Level contains 144 titles (6 books for each title) that range in reading level R-W (grade 5-8). Titles are 60% non-fiction/40% fiction. These books are currently used at Marston Elementary.

Each lesson provides opportunities for word study/fluency/writing component/and or a running records assessment.

LLI recommends small groups of 4 with 45 minutes lessons, five times a week.

Students read a new book every day, alternating between books of their independent reading level (even-numbered lessons) and instructional reading level (odd numbered lessons.) A new book is introduced daily, with a review of the book from the previous day.
