

#### INFORMATION SENIORS SHOULD KNOW

lowa's three public universities (Iowa State University, The University of Iowa, and the University of Northern Iowa) will maintain their minimum high school course requirements for admission for incoming freshmen; the Regent Admission Index (RAI) will replace their traditional upper-half class rank requirement.

The universities will compute an RAI score for each applicant that will be based on the student's high school grade point average, percentile class rank, ACT or SAT scores, and the number of years of core courses the student will complete in grades 9-12. Detailed information concerning the new admission requirements may be found online at www. state.ia.us/regents/RAI/index

• All seniors should have had a conference with Mrs. Erickson or Miss Slagter. At this interview your individual folder was reviewed and updated. Your folder is also your transcript, so it is important that it is up-to-date before college applications are sent. If you have not met with one of them, please come in asap.

• Seniors should be aware of the ACT's which will be administered here on Saturday, October 22nd. The deadline was September 16th. Late registration deadline is September 17-30 (with late fee). The next ACT held at WHS will be on December 10th. Register at actstudent. org

• Juniors & Seniors! Please pay attention to the guidance page on the school's website and morning announcements. Messages concerning college visits and scholarship information will be online, in the announcements and posted on the school's Facebook and Twitter pages.

• Seniors must be aware of the deadline for applying at certain colleges. Some select colleges have a deadline of Dec 1. Please check in the Guidance center and we will help you find the deadline dates. You are encouraged to visit a college of your choice. Follow the proper procedures as outlined in your student handbook.

• BEWARE of scholarship search and financial aid service organizations that charge a fee for service. Much of the information you may be seeking is available at no cost. Check with a counselor or search for free on the web site www.collegeplanning.org.

**COLLEGE VISITS** Juniors and Seniors are encouraged to visit college representatives when they visit our school. Students may visit representatives as many times as needed during Learning Seminar time. Seniors may use up to two (2) days for on-campus visits. Additional days for on-campus college visits are subject to approval by the principal. Seniors wishing to make on-campus visits must pick up the proper form from Mrs. Wetzel two (2) days in advance of the visit. Seniors must have all of the signatures necessary and their work made up in advance for the visit to be approved. A college representative must sign the form during their visit. The form must be returned to the office immediately after the visit. If all the procedures are not followed, the absence will be considered a truancy and the student will receive the appropriate consequence. Juniors and Seniors must let their Learning Seminar teacher know that they are visiting a college représen-tative. The College Repre-sentative will be in the office

TESTING, TESTING, TESTING There are a lot of tests given during the fall.

The ACT's will be given here in October, December, February, April and June. These are four, 35-60 minute tests in academic areas of english, mathematics, reading, and science reasoning. Colleges in the Midwest, West and South commonly prefer the ACT's. Students receive four separate scores plus a composite score. Now most schools will accept either the ACT or the SAT. You MUST pre-register for the tests at www.actstudent.org.

The PSAT/NMSQT test will be given on October 12th

to high school juniors nationwide. We encourage sophomores to take them for practice. The PSAT is a useful indicator of scholastic aptitude as well as the basis of some merit scholarships. Also, the PSAT, administered by the College Board, is the source of some college mailings that you will receive. The cost of the test is \$18.00. If you have any questions, see the guidance department and sign up in the office.

The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (AS-VAB) is a multiple-aptitude test that covers eight areas including science, word knowledge, mathematics, and mechanical comprehension. It assesses a student's ability to learn new skills and is a predictor of success in training and education programs. The program is administered by civilian Education Services Specialists who have no recruiting function. The ASVAB is offered each fall, this year it will take place on November 10th. All Kindergarten students must be up to date on their preschool shots and have received their 4 year old boosters of Dtap, Polio, MMR and Varicella.

All 7th grade (and above) students must show proof of having received a Tdap (Tetanus/Acellular Pertusis) vaccination booster AND a Meningococcal vaccination on or after 10 years of age, before the first day of school.

All 12th grade students must show proof of receiving 2 DOSES of Meningococcal vaccine; or 1 dose if first dose was received at 16 years of age or older before the first day of school.

All Kindergarten students must have a dental screen performed between the ages of 3 and 6 years old with a dental certificate on file. All 9th grade students must have a current, within the past 12 months, dental certificate on file.

All Kindergarten and 3rd grade students must have a current, within the past 12 months, vision certificate on file.



## "I'm Sick of Taking Meds!"

If your teen forgets or resists medication, here's how you can persuade him to stick with the program.

One of the problems with medication is that teenagers with ADHD don't always remember to take it. As one psychiatrist said, "If a teen can remember to take his medicine consistently, he probably doesn't have attention deficit."

When our son, Alex, was in high school, he went through periods during which he stopped taking his medicine. His reasons varied: Sometimes he forgot, and other times he was frustrated by having to take medicine every day. Knowing that he could be impulsive and daring, we were worried until we got through those rough spots.

One thing we learned: Nagging your teen to take medication doesn't work. Many teenagers don't mind taking their medication because they know that it helps them succeed in school, sharpens focus, and improves their driving skills. The big challenge is to make it a consistent thing. Here are some strategies for how to get kids to take medicine.

**Don't assume the worst.** "Medication refusal," which sometimes occurs during adolescence, may be "medication forgetfulness." If parents mistakenly assume the worst — that the teenager is willfully refusing to take the medication — it will set off a power struggle. A teen will tune you out or flush the pill down the toilet to get even.

Create a reminder system. We filled our son's weekly medicine container and placed it by his breakfast plate. That way, we knew at a glance if he'd taken his medicine, and didn't have to nag him about it. If he forgot, we handed him the container and said nothing. If we were away from home, we would text him a reminder.

Talk amongst yourselves. When Alex refused to take medication, we asked him why. We listened, discussed his concerns, and made adjustments. Sometimes giving him a sounding board was enough. When your teen ticks off his complaints about medication, you might say, "I know you get tired of taking it. It stinks that you need medicine every day. I know how you feel" — then give him a hug. "I'm in the same boat. I hate it that I have to take blood pressure medication all the time."


Make your child an expert. Soon after Alex's diagnosis, we educated him about medication and how it worked to improve his focus and impulsivity. He became an expert of sorts by participating in teen panel discussions about ADHD and medication. His expertise helped him understand how valuable meds were to his everyday success. Talk with your local CHADD group about setting up a teen panel on medication.

Connect him with other teens who have ADHD. Getting advice directly from other teens with the same challenges helps. Alex and I created a DVD, called Real Life ADHD (available at amazon.com and chrisdendy.com), in which teens explain that medication makes life easier. Emily explained, "My grades went from Ds to As and Bs when I started taking medicine." Anthony adds that while "it stinks" to have to take meds, he couldn't do college work without them. Max summed it up when he said, "Medicine brings out your whole potential."

Go med-less for a while. On one occasion, when Alex was adamant about not taking medication, we permitted him to go med-less for a while. We said, "OK, Alex, we need to set up a scientific way to see how you do in school without meds. Let's give it a six-week trial. You can tell us how you think you're doing without medication in school each week. We'll check with teachers for an update midway through the six weeks." After a week, we asked Alex how things were going. He admitted that he was struggling and agreed to go back on medication.

Lay down the law. The rule in our house was: If you're driving, you have to take medicine. It wasn't negotiable. Without the benefit of medication, Alex was likely to have an accident.

**Involve your doctor or treatment professional.** If the family can't resolve the medication problems, set up an appointment with your doctor or treatment professional to discuss solutions.

## Why the DEA is Sounding the Alarm About Rainbow Fentanyl

- The DEA says that rainbow fentanyl has been seized in multiple states.
- The fentanyl pills are brightly colored.
- Fentanyl is currently the deadliest drug threat in the United States. In 2021 alone, 107,622 Americans died from a drug overdose —66% of those deaths involved synthetic opioids like fentanyl.

The United States Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) issued a warning this week about rainbow pills that contain fentanyl.

According to the DEA, the colorful pills, which are highly addictive and potentially deadly, were seized in 18 states in August. The DEA has also The brightly-colored pills look like candy — an effort by drug cartels to appeal to kids and young adults, according to the DEA.

Fentanyl is currently the deadliest drug threat in the United States. In 2021 alone, 107,622 Americans died from a drug overdose — 66% of those deaths involved synthetic opioids like fentanyl.

"This DEA alert demonstrates that fentanyl, or any illicit drug, can come in different shapes or colors and appear quite visually attractive," says Dr. Kelly Johnson-Arbor, a medical toxicologist and co-medical director of the National Capital Poison Center.

## What is fentanyl?

Fentanyl is a man-made opioid medication that was originally designed to function as an anesthetic in the 1960s.

According to Johnson-Arbor, it has since been developed into a prescription medication available in oral, nasal, and injectable formulations, as well as transdermal skin patches.

It is approved for treating severe pain<sup>®</sup>.

"In recent years, fentanyl has been trafficked into the United States from other countries as an illicit drug," says Johnson-Arbor.

According to Johnson-Arbor, pill presses can easily be purchased online, which illicit drug manufacturers can use to create fentanyl pills that look just like prescription medications.

It's also cheap and easy to create, which is likely why it's commonly found in the illicit drug circuit in the United States.

### How deadly is fentanyl?

Fentanyl is 50 to 100 times more potent than morphine .

"Fentanvl is a dangerous drug that can cause death in verv small amounts

deadly drug," says Dr. Danelle Fisher, MD, FAAP, pediatrician and Chair of Pediatrics at Providence Saint John's Health Center in Santa Monica, CA.

Fentanyl is highly fat soluble, meaning it quickly moves from the bloodstream to the brain, causing rapid effects.

This makes fentanyl extremely risky — amounts as small as 2 milligrams can be deadly and overdose can occur immediately after ingesting the pills, says Johnson-Arbor.

Because the pills often resemble other prescription medications, such as Percocet, many overdose deaths are unintentional.

Without testing, there is no way to know what's in illicit drugs. While fentanyl test strips are available for purchase, they don't tell you how much of the substance is in the product.

"People think that they're using Percocet, heroin, or another less-potent opioid, but instead they are unknowingly exposed to fentanyl," says Johnson-Arbor.

Fisher recommends that parents and children be aware of the colorful pills ahead of the Halloween season.

Avoid purchasing drugs from the internet and don't take pills unless they were prescribed by a healthcare provider.

For any questions about fentanyl and its side effects, you can contact poison control for expert, non-judgmental advice, Johnson-Arbor says.

If you come across fentanyl, call 911, and if you ingest it, seek medical care immediately.

#### Asbestos Notification - September 2020

#### Corporal Punishment, Restraint, and Physical Confinement and Detention

State law forbids district employees from using corporal punishment against any student. Boant Policy series 500. Certain actions by district employees are not considered corporal punishment. Additionally, district employees may use "reasonable and necessary force, not designed or intended to cause pain" to do certain things such as prevent harm to persons or property. Employees are provided annual training on this law.

State law also places limits on district employees' abilities to restrain or confine and detain any student. The law limits why, how, where, and for how long a school employee may restrain or confine and detain a child. If a child is restrained or confined and detained, the school must maintain documentation and must provide certain types of notice to the child's parent.

#### Fees

The district charges fees for certain items, such as technock rental. #### Grievance Procedure

Students, parents of students, employees, and applicants for employment in the school district have the right to file a formal complaint alleging discrimination. The district has policies and procedures in place to identify and investigate complaints alleging discrimination. If appropriate, the district will take steps to prevent the recurrence of discrimination and to correct its discriminatory effects on the Complainant and others.

A Complainant may attempt to resolve the problem informally by discussing the matter with a building principal or a direct supervisor. However, the Complainant has the right to end the informal process at any time and pursue the formal grievance procedures outlined below. Use of the informal or formal grievance procedure is not a prerequisite to the pursuit of other remedies. Please note that informal processes and procedures are not to be used in certain circumstances (e.g., sexual harassment and sexual assault).

#### Filing a Complaint

A Complainant who wishes to avail himself/herself of this grievance procedure may do so by filing a complaint with the equity coordinator. An alternate will be designated in the event it is claimed that the equity coordinator or superintendent committed the alleged discrimination or some other conflict of interest exists. Complaints shall be filed within 5 working days of the event giving rise to the complaint or from the date the Complainant could reasonably become aware of such occurrence. The Complainant will state the nature of the complaint and the remedy requested. The equity coordinator shall assist the Complainant as needed.

#### Investigation

Within 15 working days, the equity coordinator will begin the investigation of the complaint or appoint a qualified person to undertake the investigation (hereinafter "equity coordinator"). If the Complainant is under 18 years of age, the equity coordinator shall notify his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) that they may attend investigatory meetings in which the Complainant is involved. The complaint and identity of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses will only be disclosed as reasonably necessary in connection with the investigation or as required by law or policy. The investigation may include, but is not limited to the following:

- A request for the Complainant to provide a written statement regarding the nature of the complaint;
- A request for the individual named in the complaint to provide a written statement;
- A request for witnesses identified during the course of the investigation to provide a written statement;
- Interviews of the Complainant, Respondent, or witnesses;
- An opportunity to present witnesses or other relevant information; and
- Review and collection of documentation or information deemed relevant to the investigation.

Within 60 working days, the equity coordinator shall complete the investigation and issue a report with respect to the findings. The equity coordinator shall notify the Complainant and Respondent of the decision within 5 working days of completing the written report. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class.

#### Decision and Appeal

The complaint is closed after the equity coordinator has issued the report, unless within 5 working days after receiving the decision, either party appeals the decision to the superintendent by making a written request detailing why he/she believes the decision should be reconsidered. The equity coordinator shall promptly forward all materials relative to the complaint and appeal to the superintendent. Within 30 working days, the superintendent shall affirm, reverse, amend the decision, or direct the equity coordinator to gather additional information. The superintendent shall notify the Complainant, Respondent, and the equity coordinator of the decision within 5 working days of the decision. Notification shall be by U.S. mail, first class. The decision of the superintendent shall be final.

#### Handbooks and Board Policies

Each year, students/parents may receive a copy of the student/parent handbook. Handbooks and school boand polices are posted on the district website at unururinterset k12 jacus. Parents are strongly encouraged to review the handbook and policies of the Board of Education with their student so that both understand the regulations and expectations of the district for students. Handbooks include many important annual notices and information about policies students and their parents are responsible for knowing and understanding. Ignorance of the contents of the handbooks and the policies of the Board of Education excuses no one from complying with these regulations.

#### Highly Qualified Teacher/Title 1 Parent Notification

The Winterset Community School District ensures that parents will be notified in writing if their child has been assigned, or has been taught by a teacher for four or more consecutive meets by a teacher who is not considered highly qualified.

- A child or youth who is sharing the housing for other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; is living in a motel, holel, traiter park, or camping grounds due to the tack of alternative adequate accommodations; is living in an emergency or transitional shelter; is abandoned in a hospital; or is availing fuster care placement.
- A child or youth who has a primary nightime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarity used as a regular deeping accommodation for human beings
- A child or youth who is living in a car, park, public space, abandoned building, substandard housing, bus or train station or similar setting, or
- A migratury child or youth who qualifies as humeless because the child or youth is living in circumstances described in paragraphs "1" through "3" above

#### Human Growth and Development

I understand that this access is delivered under the direct supervision of a teacher or other trained adult employee.

Furthermore, I understand that while the Winterset Community School District strives to provide protection from all objectionable material found on the Internet, some objectionable material is impossible to filter and may inadvertently be accessed. I, as parent or legal guardian, accept responsibility for guidance of appropriate Internet use as it pertains to the exploration and selection of media and information.

#### Iowa Concussion Legislation

Effective July 1, 2011, Iowa law requires that students in grades 7 – 12 who participate in extracurricular interscholastic activities, cheerleading and dance; and their parents/guardians; must sign a copy of the activitiedgement form and return it to their school.

Students cannot practice or compete in those activities until this form is completed.

In addition, please note this important information from towa Code Section 280.13C, Brain Injury Policies:

A child must be immediately removed from participation (practice or competition) if his/her coach or a contest official observes signs, symptoms, or behaviors consistent with a concussion or brain injury in an extracunicular interscholastic activity.

A child may not participate again until a licensed health care provider trained in the evaluation and management of concussions and other brain injuries has evaluated him/her and the student has received written clearance from that person to return to participation.

#### Key definitions:

"Licensed health care provider" means a physician, physician assistant, chiropractor, advanced registered nurse practitioner, nurse, physical therapist, or athletic trainer licensed by a boant.

"Extracutionian interscholastic activity" means any extracutricular interscholastic activity, contest, or practice, including sports, stance, or cheerleading.

#### Level 1 Investigator: Aluse

The district does not tolerate employees physically or sexually abusing or harassing students. Students who are physically or sexually abused or harassest by an employee should notify their parents, leacher, principal or another employee. The lowa Department of Education has established a two-step procedure for investigating allegations of physical or sexual abuse of students by employees. That procedure requires the district to designate an independent investigator to look into the allegations. The district has designated the school nurses: Nicole Anderson (PreK-3), Brittany Salton (4-6), and Mackerzie Ostoum (7-12) at (515) 452-2718, as Level 1 investigators.

Physical abuse is a non-accidental physical injury that leaves a mark at least 24 hours alter the incident. While employees cannot use physical force to discipline a student, there are times when the use of physical force is appropriate. The times when physical force is appropriate include, but are not limited to, fimes when it is necessary to stop a disturbance, to obtain a weapon or other dangerous object, for purposes of self-defense or to protect the safety of others, to remove a disruptive student, to protect others from harm, for the protection of property or to protect a student from self-infliction or harm.

Sexual abuse includes, but is not limited to, sexual acts involving a student and intentional sexual behavior as well as sexual harassment. Sexual harassment is unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when submission to such conduct is made either implicitly or explicitly a term or condition of the student's education or benefits; submission to or rejection of the conduct is used as the basis for academia decisions affecting that student; or the conduct has the purpose of effect of substantially interfering with a student's academic performance by creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive educational environment.

#### Notice to Parents Regarding Teacher Qualifications

Parents/Guantians in the Winterset Community School District have the right to learn about the following qualifications of their child's teacher: state licensure requirements for the grade level and content areas taught, the current licensing status of your child's teacher, and baccalaureate/graduate certification/degree. You may also request the qualifications of an instructional paragrofessional who serves your student in a Title 1 program.

#### Open Enrollment

Iona's open enrolment law allows students residing in one school district to request transfer to another school district upon the parents' request. Students wishing to open enroll to another school district must apply for open enrolment. Open enrolled students from Ion-income families may qualify for transportation assistance. Winterset Community School District will accept students for open enrolment. #### Parents' Roles During Emergencies

Providing a safe place for students to learn and grow is one of the most important responsibilities of any school system. Along with school ufficials, leachers and staff, families play a critical role in preventing and responding to emergencies. This information is intended to provide parents and guardians with the steps you can take before, during and alter an emergency. It is the ABC's of the parent's role during emergencies.

#### A Beline

Prevention: The Role of Parents in Keeping Schools Safe – Parents and community members play an important role in keeping our schools safe. You can be our eyes and ears by reporting any issues, concerns or rumors related to safety to district or laar enforcement officials. Two holine numbers that are asswered 24/7:

You also can help by following and supporting all security measures when you visit one of our school buildings. This includes signing in and out at all school district offices and wearing a visitor's badge at all times while in the building.

Contact Information: Another of the most important steps parents can take prior to an emergency is to ensure contact information is updated regularly in the district's infinite Campus system. Please regularly update emergency and contact telephone numbers, o-mail addresses and other information with your school to ensure you receive information and updates during emergency situations.

It is also important to review and update information regarding who can legally pick-up your child during an emergency. Once this information is on file, you should ensure that those people are aware they have been listed as i your "emergency contacts", and that they may receive messages via phone and/or e-mail during an emergency, meather early out, or other situation.

If your child is on medication, be sure the school has at least a two-day supply.

Create your own family emergency plan. Develop a family communication plan and have a supply lot to sustain you and your family for two to three days. For tips on how to prepare a plan go to var bensatyionalong.

#### 8. During

In a school emergency, the first instinct of many parents is to pick up the telephone and call their child or school, and/or rush to the school to get their children. But the truth is, this only complicates mailers from a safety and security standpoint. Parents too close to an incident often hinder rescue attempts of the police and fre officials on the scene. Calling your child's cell phone may prevent them from hearing important, even life-saving information. Too many parents calling the school also be up needed phone lines and hinder efforts to communicate. Students will be able to use cell phones if they need immediate assistance and once they are safe.

The best action parents can take in an emergency is to monitor their phone, e-mail and district websile for regular updates and instructions.

- Do not report to your child's school during emergency situations. Law enforcement officials will not allow entry to the school site during a location or shelter-in-place.
- Avoid calling the school or the district during the emergency.

Notification and Communication: The district is committed to providing parents and guardians with the latest and most accurate information available. Parents will be asterd to monitor official emergency updates at the district's mebsile. In today's world, it is likely students will be testing and calling parents immediately. Be aware that information you receive from your child may not always be accurate; ensure the information you are using is official and comes directly from the Winterset Community School District.

School Energency Response Publicols: A school crisis can take a number of forms including an environmental event, such as a chemical spill or gas leak; a weather emergency, such as a tomado warning; or an intruster in or near the school. The nature of a school crisis dictates whether district officials will put in place a lockdown, shelter-inplace, evacuation, or any combination of bio of these protocols, as a means to ensure the safety and wellbeing of students and staff.

When and Why are Statents and Staff Asted to Lockstown, Sheller-in-Place or Evacuate?

- Lockstown A lockstown is normally in effect when there is a threat inside the building. Students and staff are
  removed from harms way by having them safety located inside secure classrooms or other areas inside the
  building to reduce the risk of being exposed to the source of potential harm. During lockstowns access to the
  building is prohibited.
- Steller-in-Place Sheller-in-place is instituted when the threat is outside the building. Students and staff are secured inside a classroom or other areas inside the building reducing the risk for exposure to inclement vesafter or other potential harm such as a gas release.
- Evacuation Evacuations are typically conducted to remove students and staff from harms way by having them safety evacuate the school and massemble in a more secure location.

File school building is execusied, how will I be able to locale my child?

Parents will be directed to a specific location where they will be required to show proper identification. At the
reunification site, school administrators, pulse and fire officials account for students and provide aide to those
who need it immediately. Students are released only to authorized individuals. If you are a non-custodial
parent, you must be listed with your child's emergency contact information as a guardian and show proper
identification.

#### C. Alter

Monitor your child's behavior and let the school know if you think counseling or help is needed. Following a school crisis, specially trained achool and district crisis team members and social workers are available to provide counseling and outside referrals to students, staff members and others who may need it.

Recovery Plan – Depending on the nature and amount of damage, school maybe moved to a different location. The district will inform parents of any changes.

#### Protection of Pupil Rights Amendment

PPRA allords parents certain rights regarding our conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include the right to:

- Consent before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following
  protected areas ("protected information survey") if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the
  U.S. Department of Education;
  - a. Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent;
  - Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
  - c. Sex behavior or attitudes;
  - d. Regal, anti-social, self-incriminaling, or demoaning behavior,
  - e. Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
  - f. Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
  - g. Religious practices, attiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or
  - h. Income, other than as required by laar to determine program eligibility.
- 2. Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of:
  - a. Any other protected information survey regardless of funding;
  - b. Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or sculiosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under state hair; and
  - c. Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of personal information obtained from students for marketing or to set or otherwise distribute the information to others.
- 3. Inspect, upon request and before administration or use -
  - a. Protected information surveys of students;
  - Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
  - Instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum.

These rights transfer from the parents to a student who is 18 years old or an emancipated minor under state tar. Winterset Community School District will develop and adopt policies, in consultation with parents, regarding these rights, as well as arrangements to protect student privacy in the administration of protected information surveys and the collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales or other distribution purposes. Winterset Community School District will directly notify parents of these policies at least annually at the start of each school year and after any substantive changes.

Winterset Community School District will also directly notify, such as through U.S. mail, or o-mail, parents of students who are scheduled to participate in the specific activities or surveys noted below and will provide an opportunity for the parent to opt his or her child out of participation of the specific activity or survey. The district will make his notification to parents at the beginning of the school year if the district has identified the specific or approximate dates of the activities or surveys at the time. For surveys and activities scheduled after the school year starts, parents will be provided reasonable notification of the planned activities and surveys listed below and are provided an opportunity to opt their child out of such activities and surveys. Parents will also be provided an opportunity to review any pertinent surveys. Following is a list of the specific activities and surveys covered under this requirement.

- Collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales or other distribution. Administration of any protected information survey not funded in whole or in part of the extraction department.
- Any non-emergency, invarive physical examination or screening as described above.

Parents who believe their rights have been violated may file a complaint with:

#### Section 504 - Notice of Rights

Winterset Community School District does not discriminate in admission or access to, or treatment or employment in, its programs and activities. Section 504 of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act is a non-discrimination statute having discrimination on the basis of disability. It is the policy of the district not to discriminate on the basis of disability in its extractional programs, activities, or employment policies as required by the Act. The 1973 Rehabilitation Act requires the district to locate, evacuate, and determine if the student is a qualified individual requiring accommodation necessary to provide access to educational programs.

Parents are entitled to the opportunity to review relevant educational records under the Family Education Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). The requirements are described in the Board of Education Policy Manual that is available on the district's website (www.winterset.k12.ia.us). Parents/guardians disagreeing with the decisions reached by district personnel regarding necessary accommodations for access to the educational program may request a hearing before an impartial hearing officer by notifying the districts' ADA/Section 504 Coordinator. The parent/guardian is entitled to participate in the hearing and to be represented by coursel.

#### Student Directory Information-Policy 506.2

Student directory information is designed to be used internally within the school district. Directory information is information contained in the education records of a student that would not generally be considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if disclosed. The district may disclose "directory information" to third parties without consent if it has given public notice of the types of information which it has designated at "directory information," the parent's or eligible student's right to restrict the disclosure of such information, and the period of time within which a parent or eligible student has to notify the school in writing that he or she does not want any or all of those types of information designated as "directory information." The district has designated the following as "directory information"

- Statents name
- Address
- Telephone listing
- Electronic mail address
- Photograph
- Date and place of hirth
- Major field of study
- Date of attendance
- Grade level
- Participation in officially recognized activities and sports
- Weight and height of member of alkletic learns
- Degrees, honors, and awards received
- The most recent educational agency or institution attended.
- Student ID number, user ID, or other unique personal identities used to communicate in electronic system
  that cannot be used to access education records without a PIN, password, etc. (A student's SSN, in whole
  or in part, cannot be used for this purpose.)

Student is defined as an enrolled individual, PK-12 including children in school district sponsored child-care programs.

Prior to developing a student directory or to give general information to the public, parents (including parents of students open enrolled out of the school district and parents of children home schooled in the school district) will be given notice annually of the intent to develop a directory or to give out general information and have the opportunity to deny the inclusion of their child's information in the directory or in the general information about the students.

If is the responsibility of the superintendent to provide notice and determine the method of notice that will inform parents.

#### Student Nedia Interviews

During the course of the school year, students may be interviewed from time to time by newspaper, television, radio or other reporters in regard to projects, activities and other school events. This is considered a part of the district's directory information concert policy (Student Records, see below), along with pholos, video and other media. If you object to your student being interviewed in this manner, you should read and till out the district's directory information opt-out form. To datain a copy of this form, please contact your school's main office.

Use of Recording Devices in School Buildings and on School Buses- Policy 802.08 District-Owned and Operated Recording Devices

The Winterset Board of Education supports the use of recording devices in District buildings, on school grounds and on District buses used for transportation to and from school as well as for field trips, curricular, or extracurricular events. Recording devices may be used as a means to monitor and maintain order and to help promote a safe environment for students and employees.

Recording devices may be used on school buses and other district vehicles and in public areas of the school buildings. Recording devices will not be placed or be used in bathrooms, shower facilities, locker rooms, <u>or other similar spaces</u> where privacy is reasonably presumed. Determination of how recording devices will be used and which areas of the school will be equipped with recording equipment will be made in consultation with the building principals and Director of Operations.

The contents of the recordings may be used as evidence in student or employee disciplinary proceedings, and also for regular driver training and improvement on an individual or group basis. The content of the recordings may be considered a confidential education record and/or a confidential personnel record. Such records will be handled in accordance with applicable law and Board policies regarding access to and disclosure of student and personnel records. Parents may request to view a recording which is an education record of their child to the extent permitted by law.

#### Noice

The school District will annually provide the following notice to students and parents:

The Winterset Community School District Board of Directors has authorized the use of recording devices in legally authorized locations in District buildings on school District buses. The recording devices will be used to help monitor and to maintain order in school buildings and on school buses to promote and maintain a safe environment for students and employees. Students and parents are hereby notified that the recording may be used in a student or employee disciplinary proceedings. The content of the recordings may be a confidential education record and handled in accordance with applicable law and Board policies regarding access to and disclosure of education records. Recording will be retained, if necessary, for use in a student or employee disciplinary proceeding or other matters as determined necessary by the administration. Parents may request to view recording which are an education record of their child to the extent permitted by law.

The following notice will also be placed on all school buses equipped with a recording device:

"This bus is equipped with a recording/audio monitoring system."

The following notice will also be placed at District buildings:

"These premises are monitored by a recording monitoring system as permitted by Iowa law."

#### Review of Recording Devices

Authorized personnel of the school District may review the recordings randomly or when necessary as a result of an incident. The recordings not otherwise saved will be routinely re-circulated for erasure.

Viewing of the recordings is limited to the school personnel having a legal right or legitimate educational purpose. A written log will be kept of those individuals viewing the recordings stating the time, name of individual viewing and the date the recordings was viewed.

#### Student Conduct

Students are prohibited from tampering with the recording devices on the school buses or District buildings. Students found in violation of this regulation will be disciplined in accordance with the school District discipline policy and will reimburse the school District for any repairs or replacement necessary as a result of the tampering.

#### Recording by Parents, Students or Visitors

Photography and recording audio or video is generally prohibited during the instructional day on District property, as it frequently materially interferes with the District's educational mission. Students, visitors, parents/guardians of students, and community members may take photographs, record audio or video or livestream public events held at school and may only do so during non-public events if authorized in advance to do so by a school staff member. A staff member may take photographs, record audio or livestream only if doing so assists in fulfilling the staff member's duties.

#### Recordings by Employees

No employee may make an unauthorized audio or visual recording of a conversation or meeting pertaining to District business unless the employee making the recording notifies all participants in the conversation or meeting of the recording. An employee making an authorized recording shall ensure that the recording device is located in plain view for the duration of the conversation or meeting. Secret recordings are prohibited and the use of these recordings may lead to disciplinary action, up to, and including termination.

These provisions are not intended to limit or restrict recordings involving authorized investigations conducted by District personnel or any meeting recorded in accordance with Board policy, including Board meetings, grievance hearings, and audio recordings of meetings or proceedings at which the substance of an employee grievance is discussed.

#### Monitoring Devices

A parent or student shall obtain approval from the principal before operating technology allowing for remote recording or listen-in capability at school or at school-sponsored events. Because of student privacy concerns, the District requires remote listen-in technology to be disabled while the device is on District property. The District prohibits unauthorized audio or visual recordings or transmission of audio or images of other students.

#### Water Testing

The lowa Department of Public Health requires school districts to conduct testing of all water coolers and fountains for lead-containing sediment. The Winterset Community School District has completed the required testing of all district water coolers and fountains. All water dispensers have been identified below 20 ppb (0.020 myliter) as required by law. Additional information regarding specific testing results may be obtained by contacting the Director of Support Services at (515) 452-2520.
