SUPERINTENDENT MESSAGE

I wanted to take some time this month to talk about items of interest that will be occurring as we enter the last quarter of the 2022-2023 school year. During the month of April students in 3rd - 11th grades will begin taking the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP). The ISASP is administered annually and is the assessment that is used to determine how our students and district compares with others across the state. The ISASP puts a large emphasis on students showing growth from year to year as it determines their score and how we do as a district. While this is only one measure

of our students' growth, it is important our students do their very best on the upcoming assessments. This will provide our district with accurate information to consider as we evaluate our programs. In addition to assessments in reading, math, and science, every district is required to administer a Conditions for Learning Survey. The Conditions for Learning Survey is another tool used to determine the overall score we receive as a district. All parents of students in grades 3rd-11th will be receiving information via email about the survey with the option to opt your son/daughter out of taking the survey if you so choose. We will also be sending out information to

parents and staff about a Conditions for Learning survey that they can complete. While the parent and staff survey isn't used to calculate our district's overall score, we do receive the information so that we have indication of how our parents and staff feel about our work as a district.

School Calendar:

As you are all aware, the winter weather caused us to cancel 4 days of school and delay or release school early on several other occasions. Each year, our school calendar has additional hours built in so that we are able to absorb a few snow days and early releases without having to make up those student contact hours in order to meet the 1080 hour minimum requirement. At this time, we do not need to make up any student days and have a few more hours worth of cushion should we experience a late season snow storm. I hope I am not tempting fate by saving our last day of school for the 22-23 school year is still scheduled to be Friday, May 26th. Like you, I am hopeful that we can put

winter behind us and start to experience warmer days ahead.

Field Trips and More Outdoor Activities:

With warmer weather comes field trips and outdoor activities. If you are able to accompany our students on a field trip, I would encourage you to do so. Field trips are a great way for our students to make connections between what they are learning in the classroom and the real world - they are also a lot of fun! Be sure to check out the district activity calendar, as well. You will find information about all of the district's upcoming events and there are a lot of opportunities to come out and support our students.

I am looking forward to the opportunities that remain ahead of our students this last quarter and to finishing the 2022-2023 school year strong. Its a GREAT time to be a Husky!

All Kindergarten students must be up to date on their preschool shots and have received their 4 year old boosters of Dtap, Polio, MMR and Varicella.

All 7th grade (and above) students must show proof of having received a Tdap (Tetanus/Acellular Pertusis) vaccination booster AND a Meningococcal vaccination on or after 10 years of age, before the first day of school.

All 12th grade students must show proof of receiving 2 DOSES of Meningococcal vaccine; or 1 dose if first dose was received at 16 years of age or older before the first day of school.

All Kindergarten students must have a dental screen performed between the ages of 3 and 6 years old with a dental certificate on file. All 9th grade students must have a current, within the past 12 months, dental certificate on file.

All Kindergarten and 3rd grade students must have a current. within the past 12 months, vision certificate on file.

Local Loan Opportunities Winterset graduates should be aware that our school is privileged to have two well-funded loan programs.

The Lillard-Miller and Eva Rogan Funds were established to help students finance post high school education. The funds are financed through private contributions. Each academic year, a student can only be awarded ONE scholarship loan for \$1,000 and a maximum of \$3,000 per student. No interest is charged, but the loans must be paid back. Applications are available on the guidance webpage and in the guidance office or the administrative office and may be completed anytime now through August.

Farmers Electric Cooperative Scholarship- For high school seniors whose parents are members and reside in FEC's service territory. Deadline is April 1st.

Madison County Health Trust Scholarship- Must be a current resident of Madison County or a graduate of any Madison County high school or a current high school student in Madison County. You must be accepted or enrolled in an accredited health care field program. Deadline is April 1st.

The Charles & Lois Taylor Scholarship- The 2019 Applications are available at the First Christian Church office. First Christian Church has awarded over \$1,600,000 in scholarships to more than 1300 applicants since 1989. Requirements are: resident of Madison County and graduate of Madison County Schools. Financial Need is a prime consideration. Deadline is May 1st.

Winterset Professional Educators of Iowa Scholarship-Two Winterset High School seniors will be awarded a \$250 stipend, one majoring in the field of education and the other studying any academic major. Deadline is April 1st.

Lorimor Lions Club Scholarship- this scholarship is for any graduation senior that is planning to attend a college, university, nursing, trade school, commercial, or vocational education in an accredited school operated within the state of Iowa. Amount of the scholarship is \$300.00.

Deadline is April 15th.



6 Essential Summer Camp Criteria for Kids with ADHD

Before registering your child for summer day or overnight camp, ask these six questions to understand how kids with ADHD can decompress, how the schedule is structured, and more to ensure your child has a positive summer experience.

The right summer camp experience pushes kids in all the right directions — toward new friendships, new challenges, and new perspectives. In my experience, camp can be a tremendous confidence builder for kids with ADHD, who may otherwise automatically say "no" to anything unfamiliar. Campers are often more receptive to stepping outside of their comfort zones when they're doing so among a supportive peer group of kids with whom they have no social history. The value of this "social reset," when it goes well, can't be overstated.

Of course, we can't assume things will go well.

Sadly, every year I hear from parents of children with hyperactive/impulsive ADHD who were asked to leave camp. In most cases, the overnight camp was not equipped to support the child — and the parents didn't realize this until it was too late.

Even campers with inattentive ADHD face unfortunate consequences when a camp doesn't understand ADHD.

Often, these kids are not required to participate in activities and, since they rarely cause problems, they end up wandering around or sitting off to the side alone. That is not the point of camp.

When parents ask me how to evaluate whether a summer camp will serve their kids' needs and interests, I encourage them to favor programs that involve physical activity, which benefits the body and mind. While some kids with ADHD prefer to sit in front of a screen all day, I do not recommend camps that revolve around screen-based activities.

6 Questions to Ask a Prospective Camp

How structured is the camp schedule for my child's age group?

How much time do campers get to engage in free play or choice activities? Some kids with impulse-control issues do not do well in unstructured camps; "free time" is when they struggle the most.

2. Are campers required to participate in activities or can they choose to sit out?

The ideal answer would be that they are strongly encouraged and supported to participate in all activities but are not forced. Additionally, parents should be notified if their child is sitting out of activities.

3. If my child needs some time to "decompress," where would he do that?

How would you make sure that he returns to the activity? Children with ADHD benefit when they develop self-soothing and calming strategies, which prove invaluable in moments of emotional dysregulation at school and at home. A camp should encourage its participants to develop these regulatory skills while ensuring they aren't left out or forgotten.

4. Which types of ADHD profiles have you found to be successful, and not successful, at camp?

If the camp doesn't know what you mean by "ADHD profile," that is a red flag.

5. How much time is spent on screen-based activities?

If your child likes excessive screen time, less is better here.

6. What can I do proactively to set up my child for success at camp?

I recommend providing information to the camp staff weeks in advance about your child's strengths and how to support her when she's struggling. Any good camp administrative staff will appreciate parental transparency, proactive strategy ideas, and the opportunity for a collaborative relationship. What is not helpful: withholding your child's ADHD diagnosis or timing a "medication vacation" to overlap with camp. Summer camps demand a great deal of a child's attention, emotional regulation, and impulse control — perhaps even more than schools do. If your child takes ADHD medication during the school day, he should continue his regimen at camp. Discuss this with your prescribing physician.

Summer Camp Communication: Sample Letter

Hi (Camp Name) Staff,

We are excited that our child, (child's name), will be joining you this summer. We are writing to provide you with some helpful information and to offer our assistance in answering any questions you may have.

(Child's name) has an (impulsive or inattentive) profile of ADHD, which may present in the following ways at camp:

(Below, provide a list of behaviors or challenges your child has experienced at previous overnight camps or in semi-structured activities like sports teams or Scouts, e.g.,

- He may sit off to the side unless encouraged to participate.
- He may avoid other campers and gravitate toward adults because that interaction is easier for him
- He may respond impulsively in competitive environments and lash out during intense athletic games.)

Here are some strategies you can use to help (child's name) if you observe any of these things:

- Ask him to return to the game and remind him that his team needs him.
- Offer him purposeful praise and recognition.
- If you see him becoming irritable, he may need some water and time to sit in the shade or a quiet area for 5 to 10 minutes.
- If he seems to prefer talking to the counselors instead of the kids, please suggest topics of conversation he
 can try with other campers. It is often easier for him to talk to younger kids or adults because he does not
 always remember to show interest in his same-age peers.
- If you find he is having one-sided conversations and talking at the other kids, please feel free to pull him
 aside and remind him that it helps us make friends when we listen more than we talk (which is something
 he knows but forgets).
- To help him avoid losing things, please ask him questions using visual language. For example, if he
 forgets his towel for swimming, you can ask him, "Do you look like you're ready for swim?" If he leaves
 his water bottle on the table at dismissal, you can say, "Please check your backpack and make sure you
 have all the things you brought to camp today."

How to Manage Your Child's Toughest Behavioral Problems

Too much screen time. Zero school motivation. Fights. Outbursts. The silent treatment. If this sounds familiar, you're not alone. Many ADHD families report high levels of stress and conflict. To solve these and other behavioral problems, focus more of your parenting energy on rewarding the positive than on enforcing harsh punishments. Here's how.

Years into the pandemic, and the ramifications of upended routines and rituals persist. Parents, caregivers, and children – especially those with ADHD – are under tremendous, prolonged stress, which has made for increased family conflict, aggravated ADHD symptoms, and exaggerated behavioral problems. Outbursts, meltdowns, defiance, and intense emotions are among the most prevalent problems facing families today, along with concerns about screen time and a lack of motivation and interest in school.

Even amid these circumstances, there are effective ways to manage behavioral problems associated with ADHD at home and avoid undue conflict. Parents, at the helm, can steer their children toward positive behaviors by building better relationships and adapting behavioral techniques.

Behavioral Problems: ADHD Parenting Guidance

Parents, especially of younger children, comprise the first line of defense against behavioral problems because they are truly the agents of change. This is not to say that parents are at fault for behavioral problems, but rather that their influence over the solution cannot be overstated.

When caregivers are well-versed in the tried-and-true approaches proven to remedy ADHD behavioral problems, it leads to a positive parent-child relationship and to a happy, healthy, and successful child who is better equipped to cope with ADHD symptoms and other challenges.

These behavioral techniques should follow a hierarchy that looks like the following:

- Setting the stage for success (this is the base for all behavioral solutions, and should be used frequently)
- · Positively attending to desired behaviors and actively ignoring problem ones
- Giving good directions
- Implementing behavior plans and reward systems
- Enforcing consequences for misbehavior, which should be done sparingly

Behavioral Problems: At-Home Strategies for Parents

1. Rapport and Relationship Building

Despite many reminders, your child won't get off their video game and go to bed. Annoyed, you raise your voice, hoping that will get their attention. Instead, they yell back, and you lose your temper. At last, they either stop playing, or you give up your requests. Either way, it's an exhausting pattern that is only reinforced by its repetition.

Too many of these types of interactions can create feelings of anger and resentment from both sides. To set the stage for success, begin by building and reinforcing your relationship with your child by creating more moments of genuine joy. This is the first step toward effective behavioral changes.

A few times each week, do the following:

- Pick an enjoyable activity for your child (be it video games, a sport, or anything interesting to them) and be fully present in their experience. That means putting phones away, saving any chatter about personal obligations, and avoiding the urge to multi-task in the moment.
- Follow their lead. Even if the activity is boring to you, seek out what matters to them in that
 experience.

- Give attention to positive behaviors. You might commend your child on their ability to get through a particularly tough level on their video game or thank them for explaining how the game works.
- Avoid directions, questions, and critical statements that can spoil the mood and put your child on the defensive.

Establishing a warm relationship with your child helps them feel appreciated, and it boosts your intrinsic authority as their parent. It also helps strike a balance between structure and nurture, which is at the heart of being an effective behavior manager.

2. Observe Behavioral Problems and Causes

There is a logic to your child's behaviors. Carefully taking note of behaviors and their contexts is the second step toward eventually changing them.

Use any kind of note-taking system to record answers to the following questions:

- What is the problematic behavior in question? Be as specific as possible, and describe it in
 observable, measurable terms. (Make sure it's a behavior that happens frequently, like yelling and
 becoming rageful multiple times a day).
- When does the behavior take place?
- Where does it take place?
- With whom does it take place?
- Why does it take place? Are they looking for sensory stimulation? To escape an activity that they
 don't like? To get attention?

Breaking down behaviors in this format allows for opportunities to de-escalate and reinforce positive behaviors in ways that work for your child, rather than resorting to consequences right away. The focus is not on eliminating the "big moment," which can take time to mellow out, but in noticing the little trends toward positive change at every turn.

3. Set the Stage for Success

Third, put supports in place, especially with a focus on ADHD symptoms and their unique challenges, to steer your child toward positive behaviors. Supports should center on clear rules and routines, visual cues, and creative reminders to prompt your child toward desired behaviors, consistent limits and corrective feedback, and frequent positive feedback, rewards, and other incentives to increase motivation toward target behaviors.

If your child struggles with routines, for example, post in a prominent area a chart or checklist of required tasks labeled and listed with times for each.

Similarly, and especially if your child is younger and learning from home, I recommend creating a chart that lists appropriate behaviors and expectations for remote learning, like keeping muted, turning on the camera, and raising their hand to speak.

4. Provide Positive Feedback

Praise your child for the behaviors you'd like to see more of:

- Be specific. Instead of a vague "good job" or a high five, praise your child for a specific action.
 ("Great job using a calm voice"; "It was wonderful how you raised your hand during online class": "You are so focused on your work.")
- Be consistent. Catch your child when they demonstrate the desired behaviors.
- Give more positive feedback than negative, and watch your feedback become that much more
 effective.
- Give feedback immediately and while in close proximity to them to drive the connection between a certain behavior and a positive response.
- Use non-verbal reinforcers, like a thumbs up or a high five, only in situations where it's clear what behavior you are responding to.
- Be sincere. Engaging with this skill can feel unnatural if it's new, but with enough practice, it'll become a genuine part of your toolbox.

At the same time, withdraw attention from difficult behaviors like whining, arguing, and interrupting, and provide positive feedback around a preferred behavior occurring subsequently or simultaneously instead. Eventually, the problem behavior will decrease as your child recognizes that their undesirable behavior is not serving a function.

5. Give Instructions Effectively

Getting your child to listen to you largely depends on how you're delivering instructions:

- Keep your cool it models appropriate behavior and prevents yelling.
- Be clear and straightforward to the point of performance. Don't frame the instruction as a
 question. Instead of, "Can you start your homework?" say, "Please start your
- homework."
- Give instructions one at a time. Remembering a series of steps can be hard for children with ADHD. If possible, break up the task further to start, and remind your child their past successes with the task.
- Wait for follow-through and catch it with praise, no matter how "small" the task. Children respond better when given credit for following through.

6. Create a Behavior Plan and Reward System

Clear behavioral goals and rewards are great for motivating and stimulating children and teens with ADHD toward positive behaviors. Use behavior charts and point systems to keep track of up to three target skills and behaviors at a time. On the chart, be sure to positively phrase the task (i.e. what to do instead of what not to do) and be specific: "Focus on lessons for 30 minutes"; "Get started on schoolwork right at 4 pm."

Reward systems can vary based on age. Young children respond well to simple systems like sticker charts, while older children can follow a points system and pick rewards from a co-created menu. Teenagers can follow a more sophisticated point system, where they can "deposit" and "withdraw" points depending on the task, and where point values increase with task difficulty.

7. Enforce Consequences Sparingly

It's a fallacy that harsh punishments will make your child think long and hard about what they've done. In fact, harsh punishments are quite ineffective, as they:

- Only have short-term impact
- Increase emotional reactions from your child
- Can deteriorate relationships
- Teach your child what not to do rather than the appropriate behavior

If you do pursue consequences for misbehavior, follow these guidelines:

- Establish your consequence plan in advance to avoid an impulsive decision
- Administer the consequence in a neutral and calm voice, and immediately after the behavior occurs. This teaches your child that they shouldn't wait to hear a raised voice to start complying
- Give consequences in small doses
- Reset after delivering a consequence and continue to reinforce positive behaviors, even if the consequence has yet to be delivered

With practice and persistence, these strategies will improve your child's behaviors and decrease family conflict at home — now, and years into the future.


















Who besettle from respite care?

- Respite care provides short-term relief for primary caregivers and allows idds in crisis to have a safe specia to recoup.
- We surve likks agus 6 to 17 who may be at risk of extering the child welfare or juvenile justice systems.
- Families dealing with a variety of clarifunger including mental and behavioral health concerns benefit from this program.

What does respite care entail?

WHAT IS CRISIS STABILIZATION?

The YSS Crisis Stabilization Program is for those times when a youth (ages 12-18) is experiencing an acute mental health, behavioral health or substance use issue that requires more than a visit to the pediatrician, but less than a trip to the emergency room.* Crisis stabilization provides short-term care with 24-hour supervision without the added traums of hospitalization. The program affects intervention and support for both the family and the youth to stabilize the current situation and plan for the future.

When a youth is in the midst of emotional turmoil, it is important to surround them and their family with comprehensive treatment services quickly. The sooner the youth receives treatment, the less likely the crisis will evolve into a chronic mental health concern and the more likely the family can recover. The Crisis Stabilization Program approach is traums-informed, strength-based, and family-centered from referral to discharge.

This program is not available to youth who are system involved through the Department of Human Services (DHS) or the Juvenile Court System.

REFERRAL PROCESS:

- Oali (S15) 233-2330 or (641) 423-7362 and convey interest in the Crisis Stabilization Program.
- Staff will conduct a brief screening to determine program fit.
- If the youth is identified as a candidate for the program, staff will contact the appropriate mental health region to approve eligibility.
- Once eligibility is confirmed, the youth will be admitted into the program and services will begin.



WHAT TO EXPECT:

- Initial crisis screening upon referral
- + 24-hour shelter placement for youth (length of stay is 1-14 days)
- Assessment completed by a licensed professional to determine service recommendations
- Services may include a combination of mental health, behavioral health, substance use, medication management, and/or family therapy
- Family Team Meeting to establish goals for ongoing supports, as well as treatment recommendations for the individual and family
- Behavioral Health Intervention
 Services (BHIS) to address unhealthy
 skills and improve how the youth and
 family function together as a unit
- Discharge planning, including recommendations for services in the home community
