DRESS Code Policy

Neckline of shirts must be no lower than the crease of your armpit.

Shirts must have some form of strap and therefore, strapless tops are not allowed.

Shirts should be at least long enough to reach the belly button when worn in a neutral stance/position.

Shorts/skirts should be sufficient in <u>length to cover a student's backside at all times</u>, never exposing a student's undergarments.

Jeans or pants should <u>not be excessively ripped</u>, and <u>no rips higher than the start of a pants inseam</u>.

Clothing, jewelry, and personal items like backpacks, <u>shall be free of</u> writing, graphics, or any other symbol that are deemed vulgar, profane, or sexually suggestive. Any item that advocate(s) racial, ethnic, LGBTQ+, or religious prejudice or the use of drugs, tobacco, or alcohol are not allowed.

Baseball caps, visors, and headbands free from writing and/or images that may disrupt the school environment may be allowed in classrooms at the **teacher's discretion**. = Individual teachers can decide if they allow hats or sweatshirt hoods to be worn inside their classroom.

Placement into Classes

- English: Placement will be based on 4 criteria:
 - 1. A writing sample for the honor program.
 - 2. 8th grade Language Arts teacher recommendation
 - 3. 8th grade Language Arts grade
 - 4. 8th CAASPP final performance
- Math: Placement will be based on 4 criteria:
 - 1. 8th grade math teacher's recommendation
 - 2. 8th grade math class grade
 - 3. 8th CAASPP/SBAC Final performance
 - 4. 8th MDTP placement test
- **Science:** General Earth Science, *Ag Earth Science (with a commitment to 4 years of Agriculture) or *Biology. (*Enrolled in Honors Math & Standard Exceed CAASPP, plus have 8th grade Science teacher's recommendation.)
