What is our "Why"?

Our District has been functioning effectively on the same local operating revenue base for the past 8 school years. Unfortunately, costs for personnel and resources have escalated and will continue to escalate. The effective result will be that we will need to raise additional operating revenue, operate beyond our means, or dramatically cut services to our students.

Purpose of this Committee

Determine a fiscal strategy to support and maintain increasing costs. Specific concerns include:

- General costs of doing business
- School safety and security
- Transportation
- Technology
- Staff recruitment and retention

School District Finances

- State Driven by September 30th Unit Count.
 - 76 percent of the District's resources
- Local Property Tax Receipts for operations, debt service, tuition and match areas.
 - 18 percent of the District's resources
- **Federal** Passed through from DOE to supplement state and local funding.
 - 6 percent of the District's resources



Financial Vocabulary

- **District Budget** The Budget of Discretionary Funds (both State and Local) Available to Use for Local Expense Obligations.
- **District Reserve** Amount of Locally Sourced Funds at Year End that are Available for Emergency Use or to Balance the Budget.
- Transportation Match School Districts are required to Match 10% of the total Cost of Transportation (State covers 90%).
- School Tax The Tax Rate Approved by the District's Board of Education and/or through Referendum to Cover Local Expense Obligations.

Lake Forest School Tax Rate - FY2023

Debt Service 0.0496 only used to pay off bonds from construction projects

Tuition Tax 0.4499 used to pay the cost of sending students with special needs to other schools or additional resources needed in District

School Tax Rate 1.6122

per \$100 Assessed Value Match Tax 0.1619 used for maintenance of buildings, technology, and local salary of Reading Specialists

Current Operating Expense 0.9508 used for operating the District, books, instructional programs, transportation, salaries/benefits, SRO

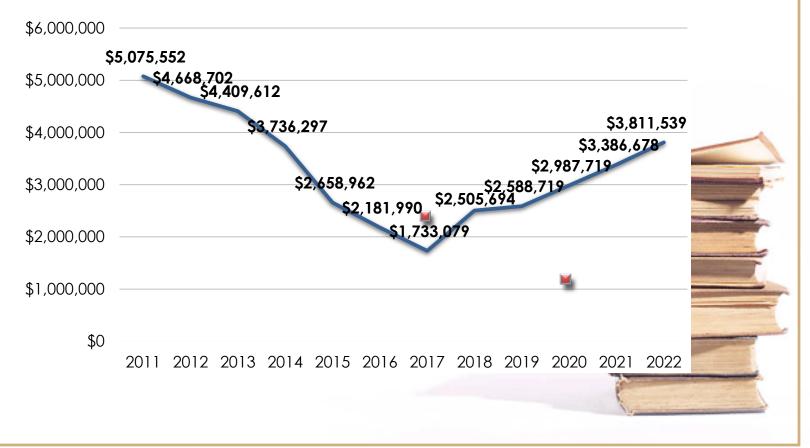

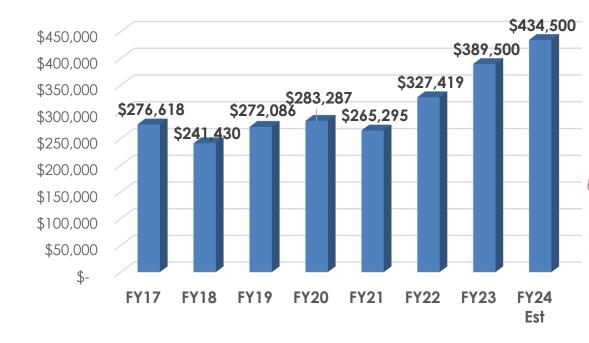

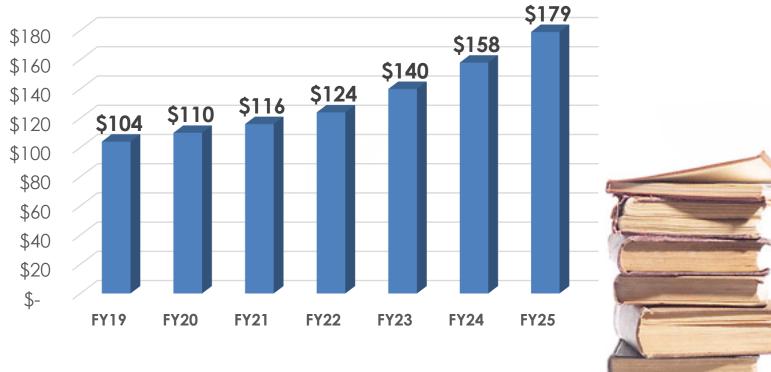
Local Transportation Match

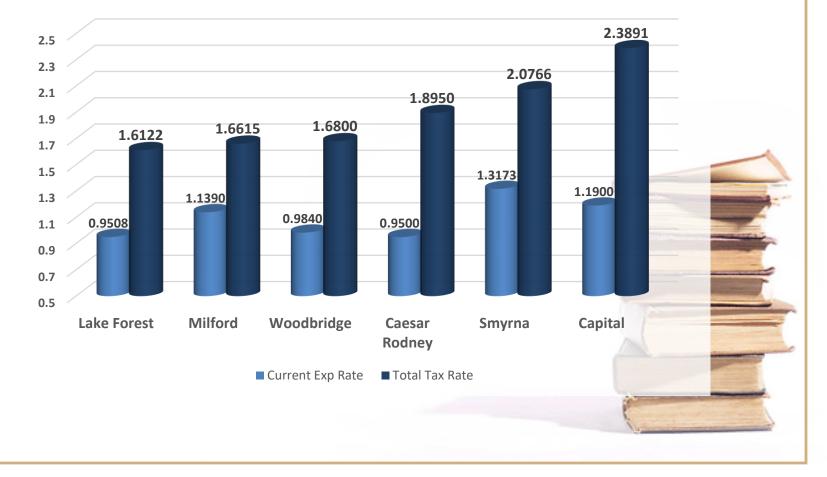

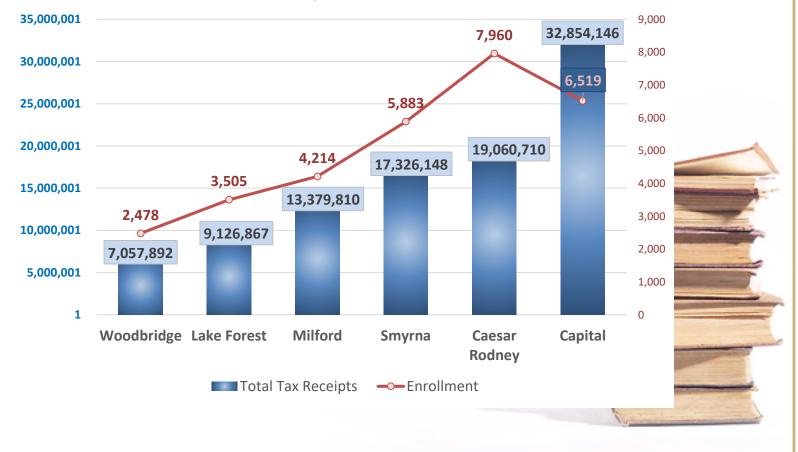

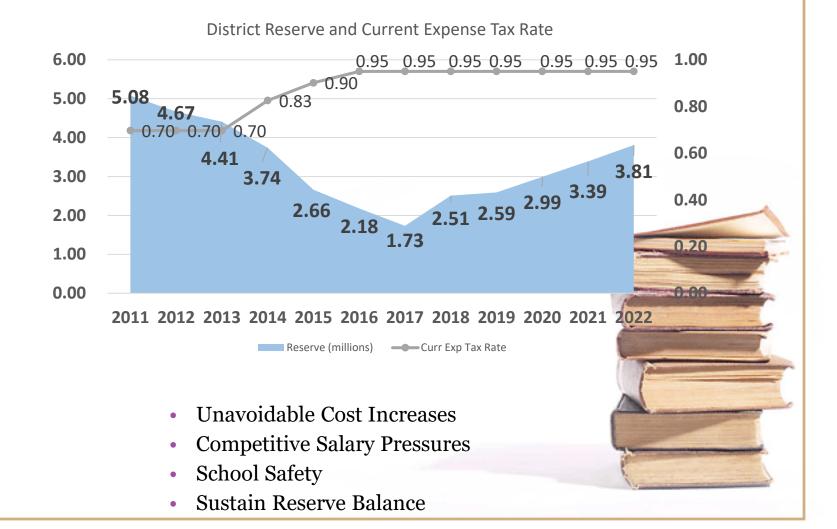
Referendum History for Lake Forest
