
Academic News

As we continue on our path of collaboration to ensure <u>ALL</u> of our students meet their full potential in an equitable and inclusive environment, it's imperative we celebrate the progress we've made over the past several years. On **Monday, March 6, 2023**, the district is hosting a Kent City Schools Community Night.

Progress Theodore Roosevelt High School intends to highlight includes our advances in:

- Curriculum and Instruction;
- Equitable access to all educational opportunities;
- Professional Development;
- Athletics and co-curricular activities.



Highlights of National Black History Month -- The Roosevelt Staff has been highlighting Black History Month in many ways throughout the month of February.

- SOCIAL STUDIES: Students in US History courses worked on the heroes and works of the Harlem Renaissance as well as delving into the Tulsa Massacre, while US Government classes read MLK's "Letter from a Birmingham Jail" and used sections of the letter to create blackout poetry. Additionally, teachers point out appropriate "Black History" moments or history throughout the year in the American Government course and actively work with the Guidance office to promote the Black Experience I and II course, which is a great opportunity for Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors to take for College Preparatory or College Credit Plus credit.
- ENGLISH: AP English classes have featured Black poets in AP Literature -- Lucille Clifton, Maya Angelou, Langston Hughes. In the Expedition Academy English class, students research the Black Lives Matter movement. Additionally, several English classes did Black History month quilt blocks with students. Students in Women's Studies and Literature completed an intersectional Women's HERSTORY project to combine Women's History Month (March) with Black History Month where each student chose a historically significant black woman from the first and second waves of feminism (pre-1980) and highlighted the contributions of each. Students chose from all backgrounds and professions and prepared a slide to share with the class (along with a discussion question to tie the past to the present).





- <u>COUNSELING:</u> The Counseling Department created a Historically Black College and University (HBCU) Bulletin Board for the many college opportunities available to students and also offers Black Experience I and II courses for dual enrollment credit.
- <u>ACTIVITIES:</u> Black History Month Trivia was hosted for all students during lunch periods to test their knowledge of Black History and win prizes.



• <u>CTE</u>: Health Careers & Technologies teachers used **Oprah Winfrey's Documentary** "The **Color of Care**" to have a conversation with Health Careers Technologies students about racial inequities in America's healthcare system and what needs to be done to change it.

<u>College Credit Plus</u> intent forms are due April 1, 2023, and can be found on Final Forms. College Credit Plus (CCP) is an Ohio program where students in grades 7-12 can take college courses during high school (and earn both high school and college credit) for free. Its purpose is "to raise awareness of the importance of music education for all children. It is an opportunity for music teachers to bring their music programs to the attention of the school and the community, and to display the benefits that school music brings to students of all ages" (NAfME, 2023).

At Theodore Roosevelt High School, we kick off the month with our annual Band Extravaganza. This concert features all of our band students in grades 6 through 12 on March 7. On March 9, the Roosevelt and Stanton orchestras will come together for a concert. The TRHS bands will present a formal concert on March 14. Choral students in grades 5 through 12 come together for the annual KCSD Choral Festival on March 15. And finally, on March 16, we will feature the TRHS choirs in concert. The Band Extravaganza takes place in the gymnasium. All other concerts are in Richard Roberts Auditorium. All concerts begin at 7:00 PM, and the public is encouraged to attend.
