“Simply defined, number talks are five- to fifteen-minute classroom conversations around purposefully crafted computation problems that are solved mentally.”

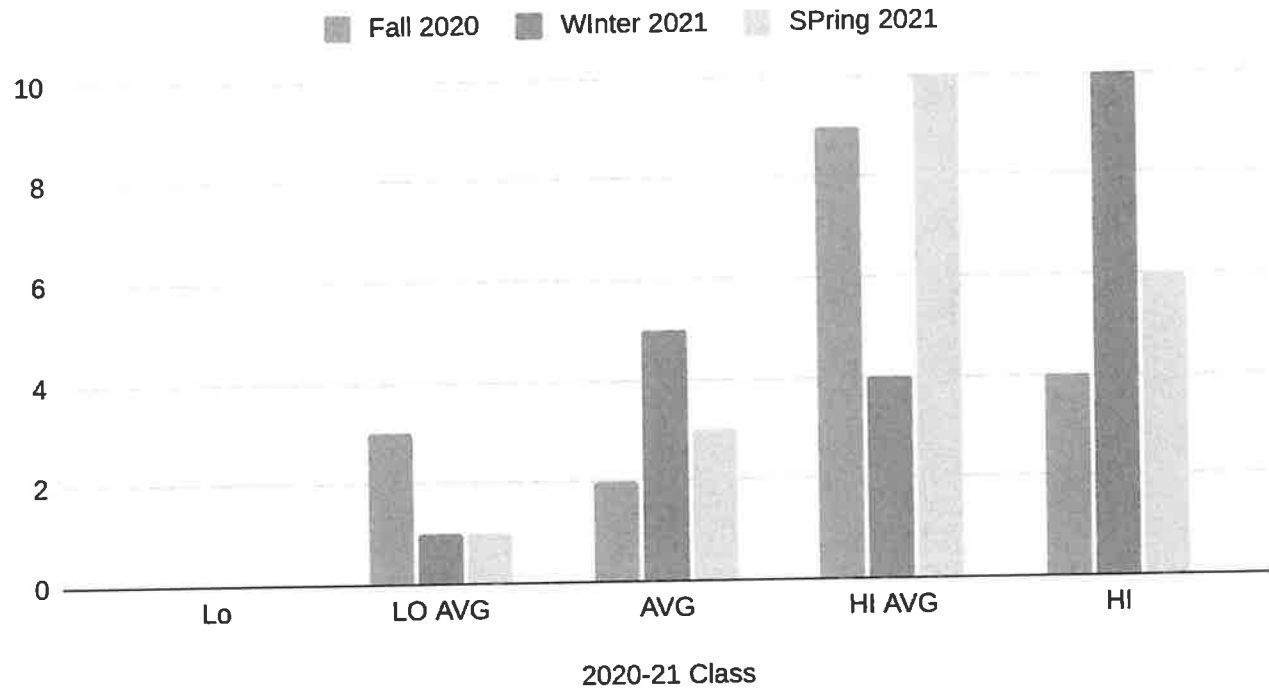
- Sherry Parish

- Spend only 5 to 15 minutes on Number Talks.
- Talks are most effective when done everyday.
- Students solve mentally- they do NOT use paper/pencil

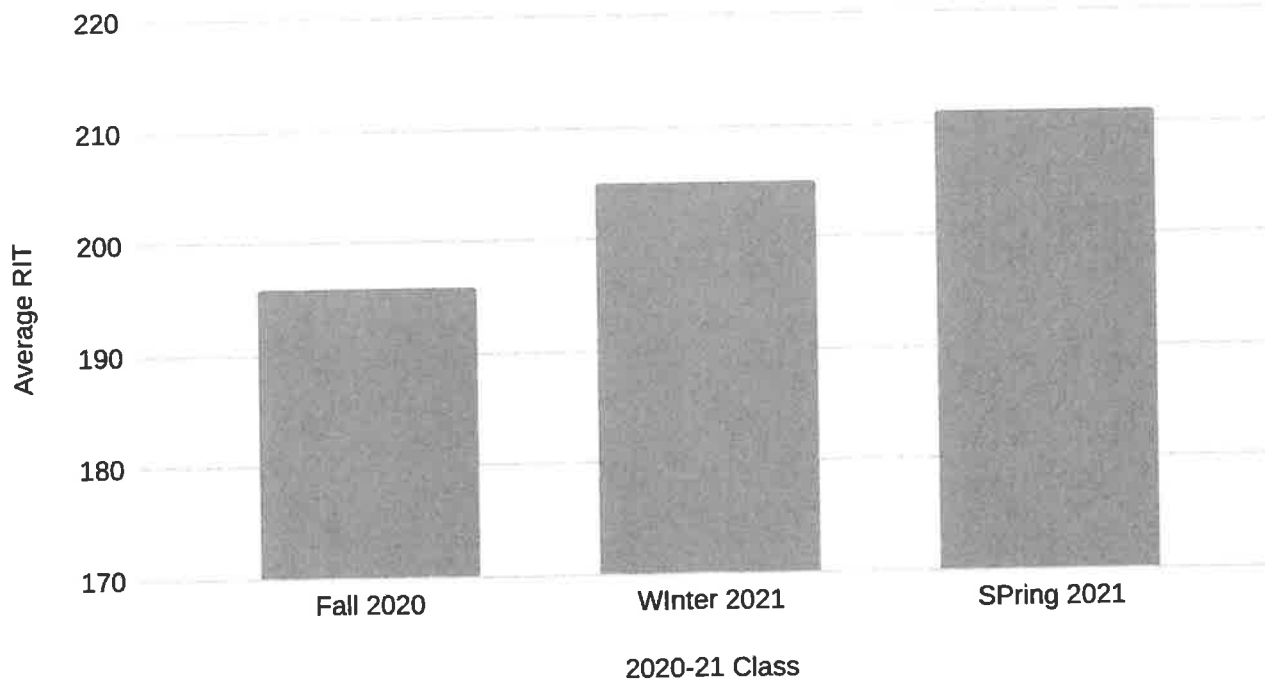

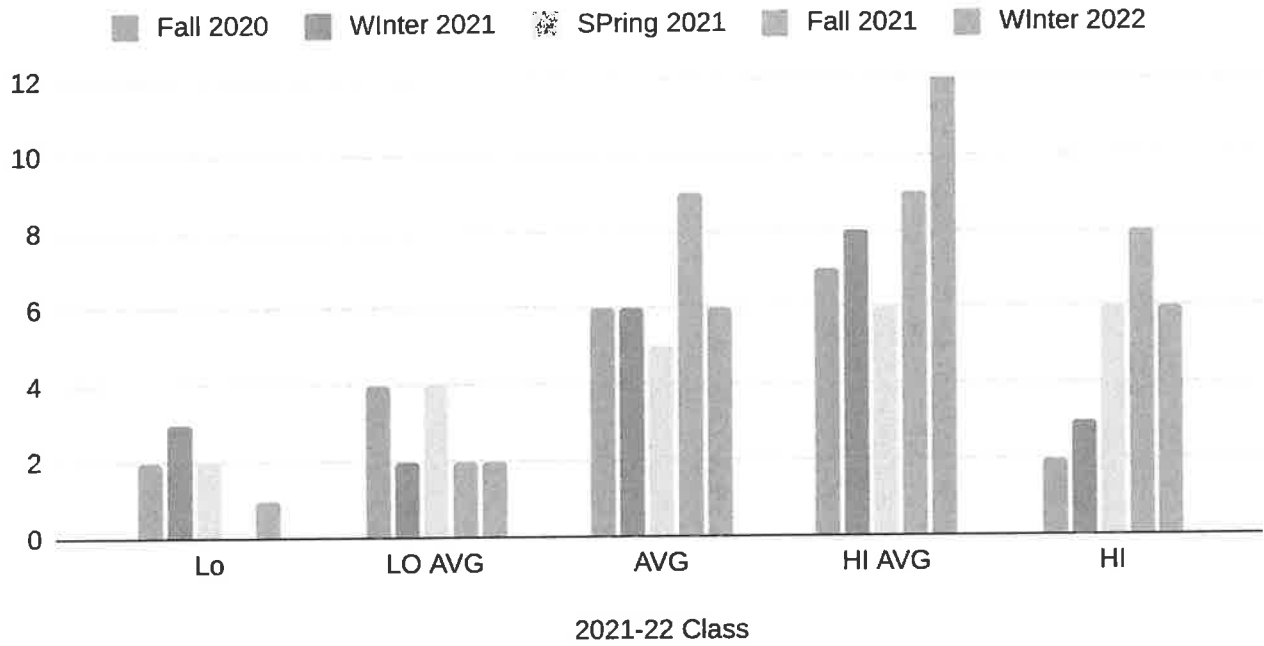

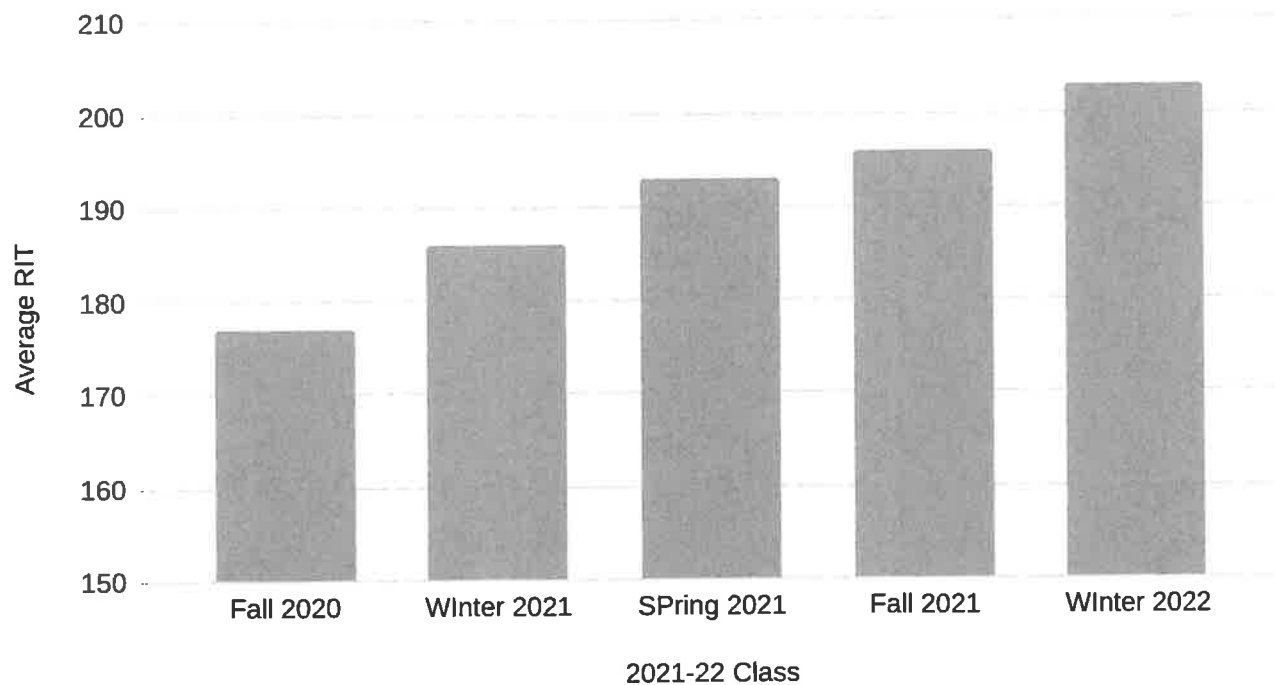
Average RIT vs. 2020-21 Class

Why Are Changes Needed?

- The National Association of Secondary School Principals advocates for removal of the Class Rank system.
- Colleges and universities use class rank, only if it is provided. If not provided, they use the student's course selection, GPA, and test scores for admission. The rigor of our curriculum is well known among college admissions offices.
- Many comparable high schools have removed class rank from transcripts including valedictorian and salutatorian recognition.
 - Comparable Schools including Centerville, Worthington, Mason, Perrysburg, Hilliard, etc.



Why Does Beavercreek Need a Change?

- We have many high achieving students and typically only 4-6 students are formally recognized at graduation.
- Students are experiencing more anxiety and stress than ever before.
- Selection of courses that meet the needs of the whole child.



Proposed Changes to Class Rank

Beginning with the Class of 2024:

- There will be no class list generated.
- Class rank will no longer be listed on the transcript.
- Class rank will be made available to students and parents upon request.

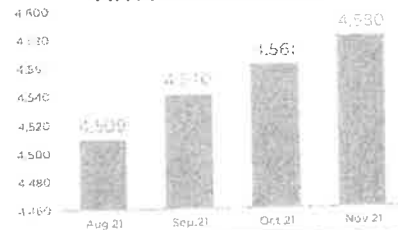

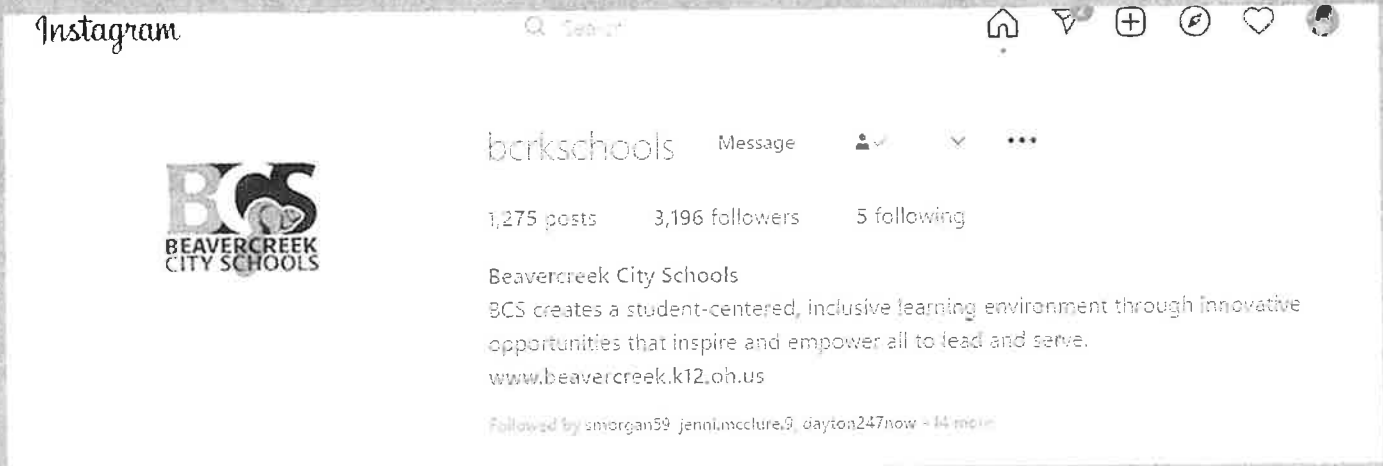

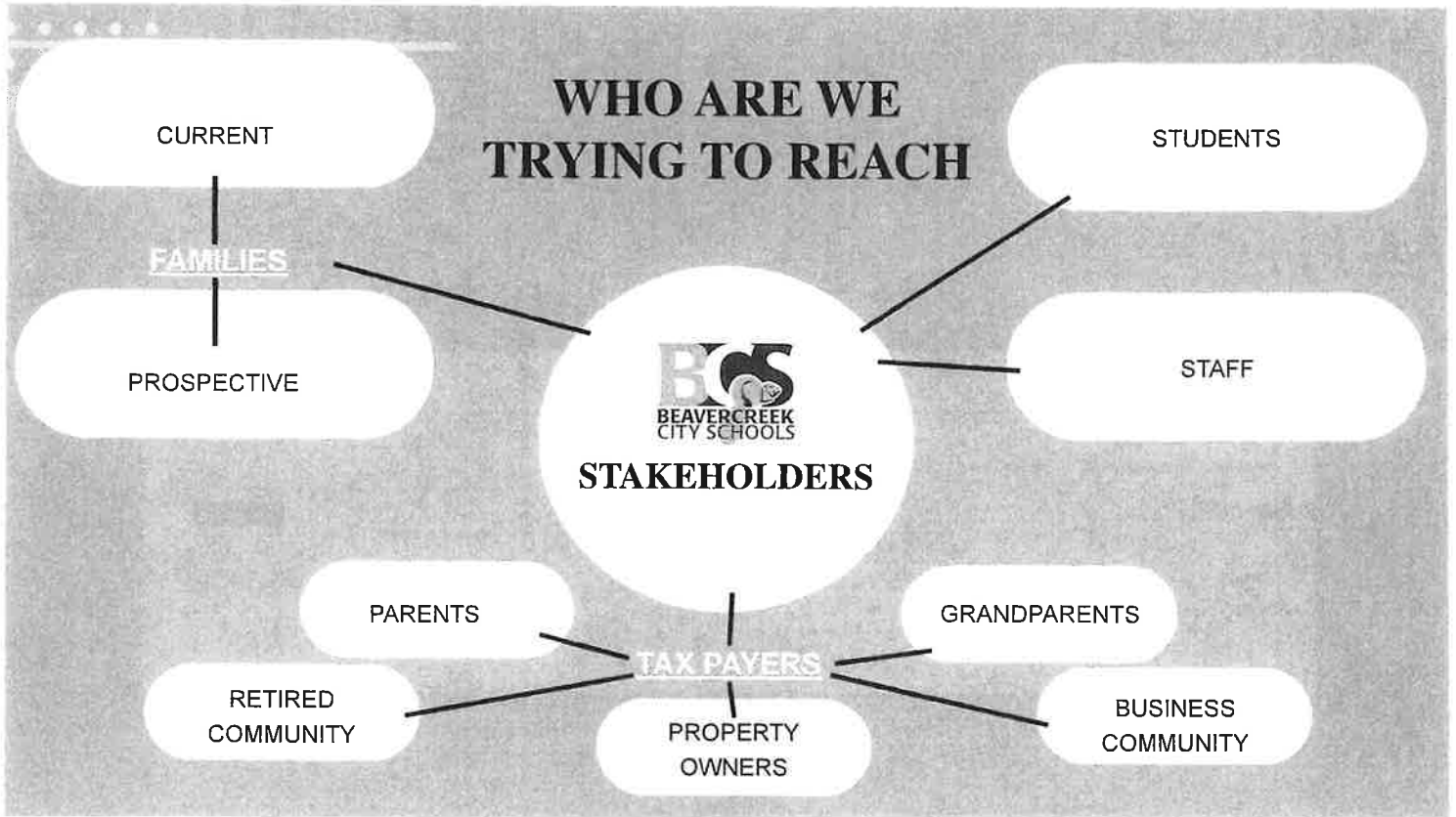

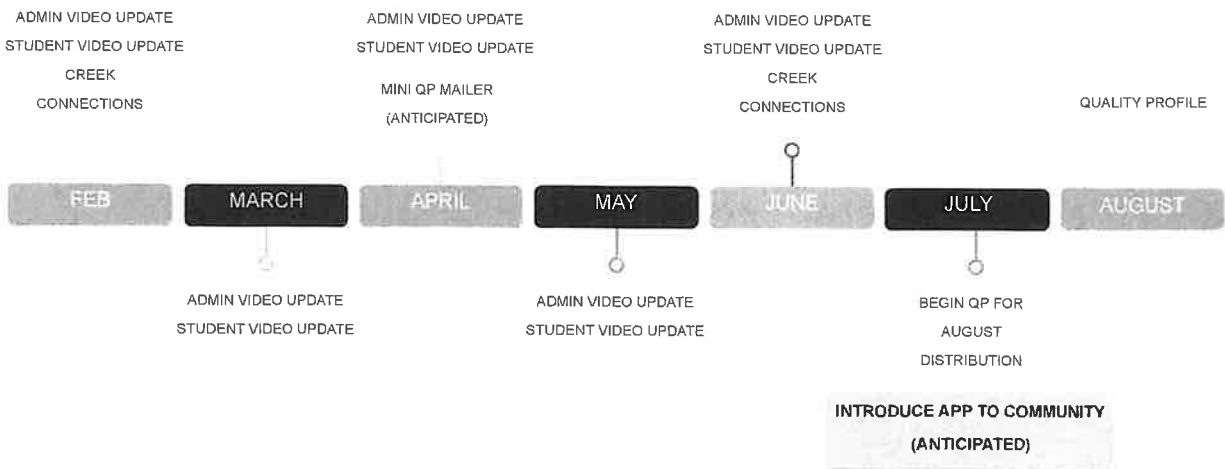

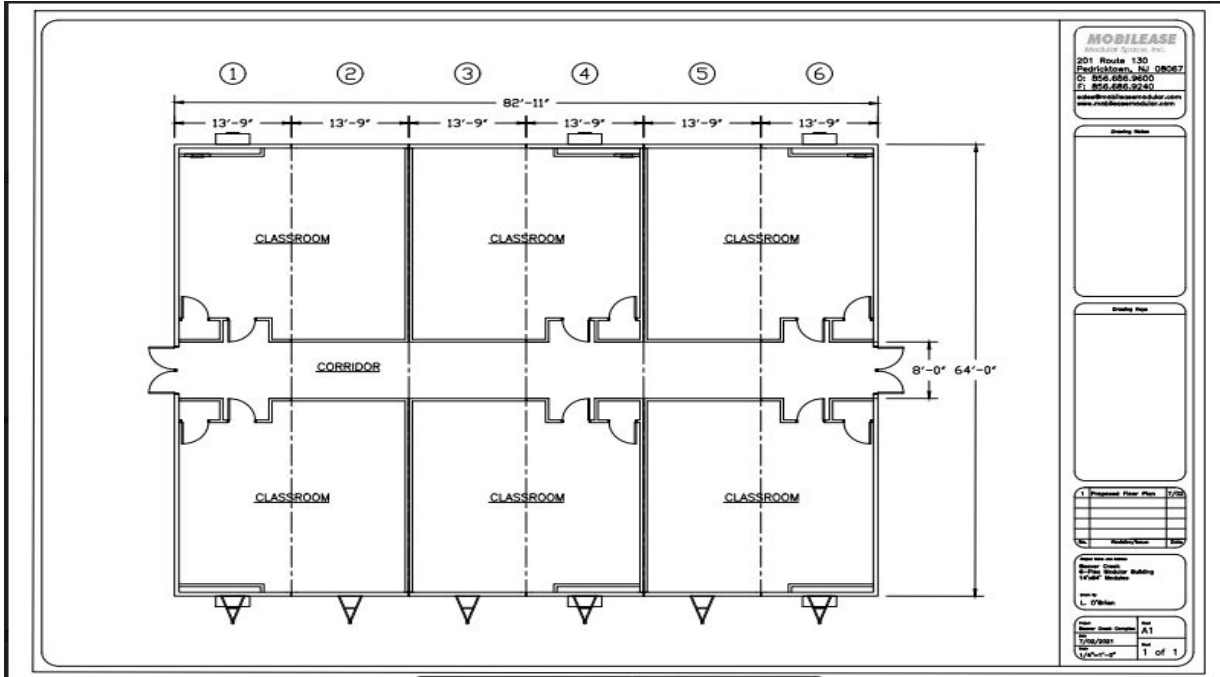

Fairbrook - Classroom Space Modular Classroom Layout

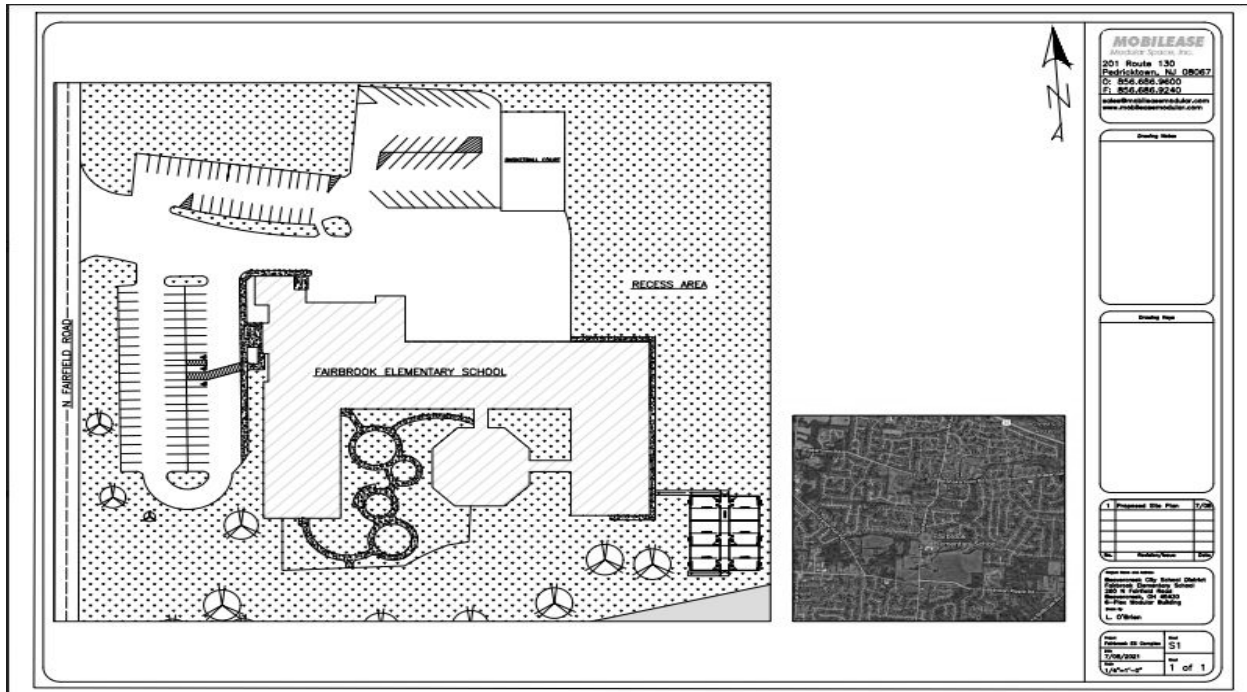


Fairbrook - Classroom Space Site Plan

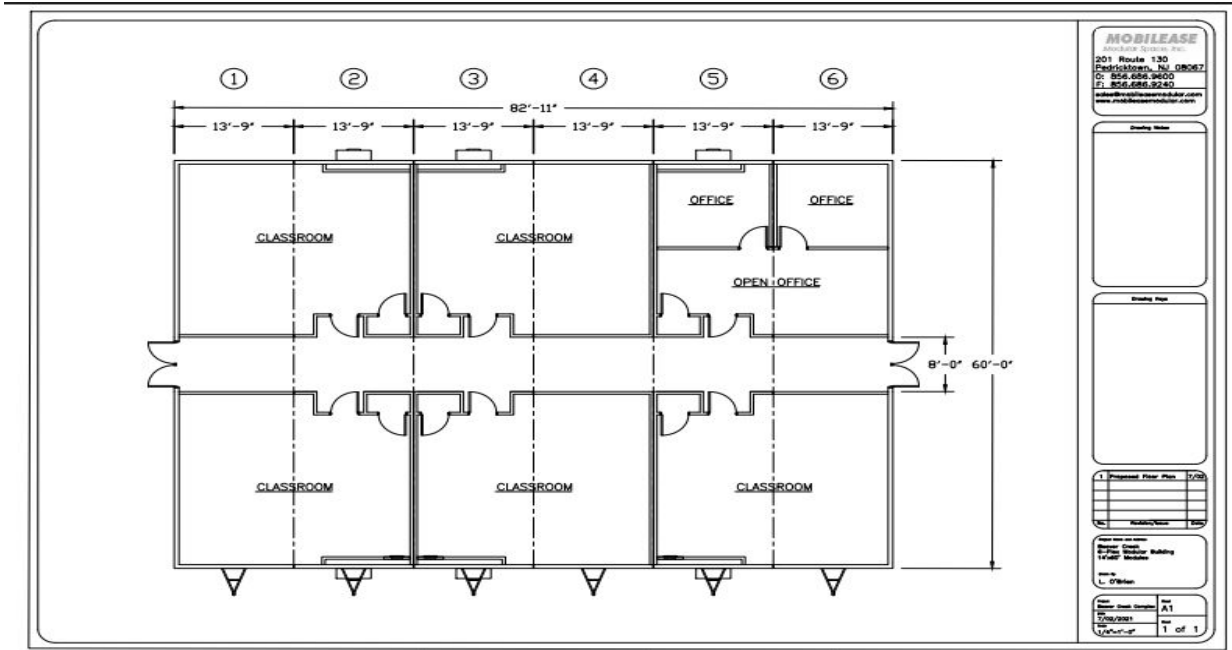

Main - Classroom Space Modular Classroom Layout

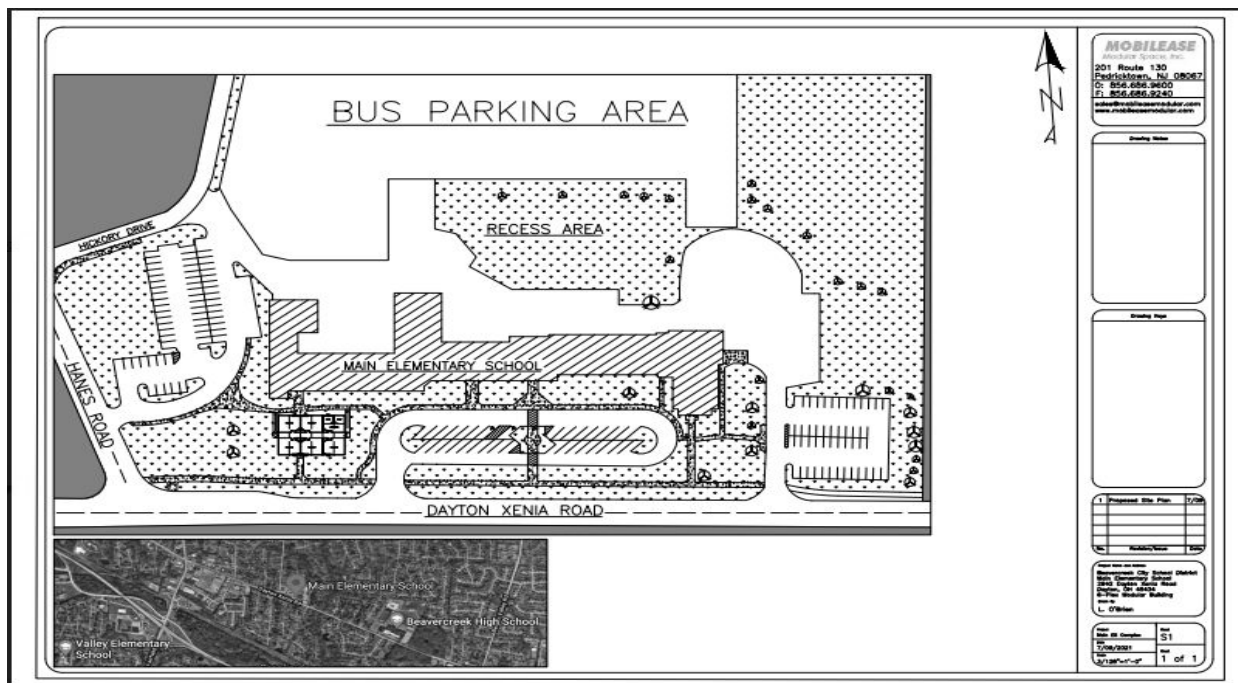


Main - Classroom Space Site Plan

Overview

✓ This report is based on the Five Year Forecast that was approved by the Board of Education in November 2021. As the Forecast is transitioned into budgets for the district, we will be monitoring our expenditure levels reflected in the financial reports.

Revenues:


- ✓ Our non-operating receipts are comprised of FY22 “advances in” for \$1,311,221.85. Typically, grants are awaiting federal/state reimbursements at year-end and General Fund (GF) must advance out funds on June 30th that will be advanced back into the GF after June 30th.
- ✓ This practice of advancing funds to/from the GF at year-end/year-beginning is in compliance with Ohio Revised Code and is audited annually to be sure proper accounting is used.
- ✓ We are in compliance.

Expenditures:

- ✓ **Salaries and wages** as of January are coming in over projections by approximately \$168,191.
- ✓ **Fringe benefits** as of the month of January came in under projections by approximately \$-175,140.

Expenditures:

- ✓ As of January , we are in alignment with budgeted expenditures, 58.33% of the fiscal year has elapsed and we have spent 56.87% of the annual budget. Our cash-flow is positive and we expect to end the year within budget.
- ✓ We did have \$1,311,221.85 in advances to close the books as of June 30, 2021. We made these advances from General Fund to the various grant funds awaiting reimbursement from state and federal sources. Since the grants are reimbursing, we must advance funds at year-end so they are not in a deficit. Advances are not required to be budgeted per Ohio Law.

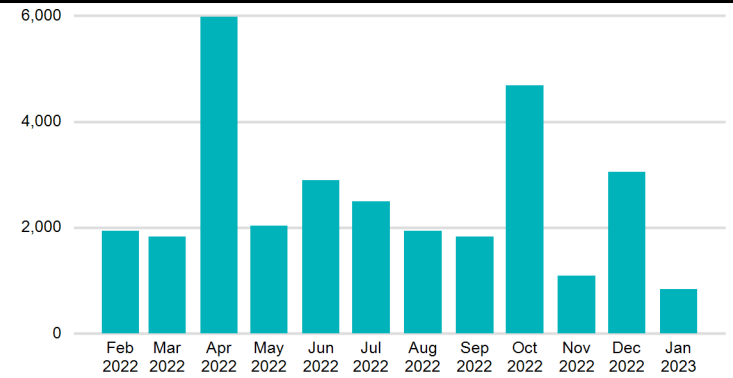

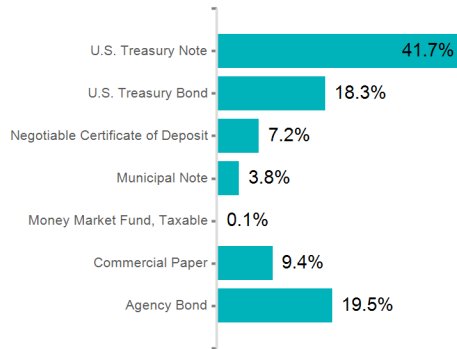

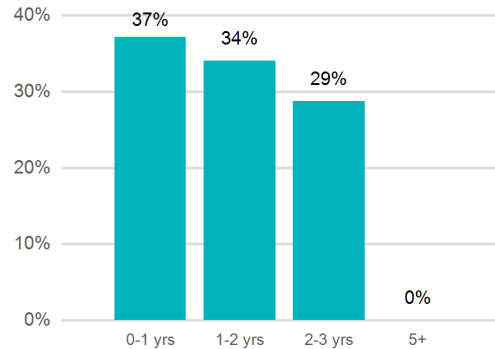
PROJECTED MONTHLY INCOME SCHEDULE



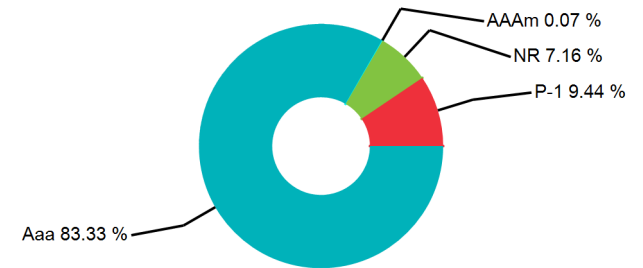
SECTOR ALLOCATION

Parents are also concerned with their child's safety when walking/biking to school in terms of amount and speed of traffic along their routes and safety of street crossings.

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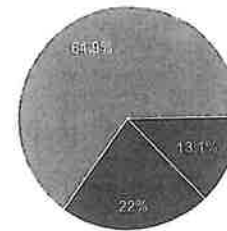

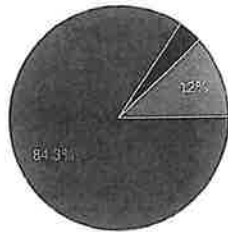

SAFE ROUTES TO SCHOOL MEETING

Beavercreek City Schools joins the Beavercreek community and agencies throughout Greene County in support of the Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program. The purpose of the SRTS program is to foster a more active, healthier lifestyle for elementary and middle school students by encouraging them to walk or ride a bicycle to school. As part of the SRTS program, engineering projects such as sidewalk and bike path construction in conjunction with education and encouragement activities help students safely achieve a more active, healthier lifestyle. Administered by the Ohio Department of Transportation, the federally funded SRTS program has increased the amount of students walking and bicycling to Ohio schools.

Input from parents with children attending Beavercreek City Schools is very important to the SRTS program. On Thursday, September 29th at 4:00 PM in the Coy Commons, a meeting will occur to brief interested parents and teachers about the program and also to gather input from these groups on how to make riding or walking to Coy safe. Please join us for this worthwhile venture!

IPAD'S ARE COMING HOME

iPads, chargers and cords will be distributed through ELA classes on Thursday, August 18th. Only students who have submitted signed iPad agreements will be given an iPad at this time so it is very important that you either have a form on file from last year or a form is brought back to school on Thursday. Students should hold onto the iPad form until they attend ELA class and then present it to the teacher.

As always, it is our goal to be considerate of your family's wishes regarding technology. While use of the iPad is a fantastic tool for learning, it is not always necessarily a good fit for a child at home or one that has limited supervision. If you would prefer, your child does not take his/her iPad home from school this year, please simply write this across iPad Agreement form or email a short statement to that effect to Debbie Bush, our IMC technician. STUDENT RULE CLARIFICATIONS

- Water Bottles.** Students may have transparent, re-usable water bottles at school. If we cannot readily see the contents of the bottle or the bottle is not designed for multiple uses then they should stay home to await the kids once they get home. The bottle rule is part of ensuring a safe environment for everyone here at school and making sure students are not placing certain materials in the bottles instead of water.
- Student Drop-off.** Our goal is to keep kids safe and keep traffic moving through quickly and efficiently during our student drop-off. You can help by pulling around to the side doors of the school before stopping along the curb to allow your child to get out of the car. The building's side doors are open from 8:30 AM to 8:45 AM. Additionally, please do not stop in the crosswalk linking the visitor lot with the main sidewalk in front of the building and remain in a single-file line of vehicles when dropping off and picking up from school.

3. **Lunch.** Students are allowed to make a quick stop in the student restrooms at the end of each hall on their way to lunch. They may also take a book or magazine to read during the lunch recess, but no electronics, phones or iPads are to be taken to lunch or recess. Students may NOT stop at their lockers on the way back from lunch. They are to return directly to their 4th period class.

WHEREAS, the United States Congress has set aside monies for Safe Routes to School Projects, hereinafter SRTS funds through the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, Local Participating Agencies (LPAs) can apply for SRTS funds and be selected for funding by the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation; and

WHEREAS, various Greene County agencies and representatives from Beavercreek City Schools, the community, local governments, education, health, and public safety have worked as a committee over the last year developing the travel plan; and

WHEREAS, the Beavercreek City Schools Safe Routes to School Committee has identified multi-use pedestrian paths and connection paths as being eligible for application through SRTS; and

WHEREAS, the Beavercreek City Schools-Trebein Elementary/Coy Middle School Phase 1 Projects, hereinafter referred to as the Project, is a transportation activity eligible to receive federal funding; and

WHEREAS, the Beavercreek City Schools Safe Routes to School Committee has been invited by ODOT to participate in the application process;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by THE BEAVERCREEK CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD of EDUCATION, State of Ohio, that:

SECTION ONE: THE BEAVERCREEK CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT BOARD of EDUCATION hereby authorizes the Greene County Engineer, to prepare and execute an application for SRTS funds for the stated project and to submit the same to the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation.

SECTION TWO: That Beavercreek City Schools, Beavercreek Township, and Greene County agree to pay One Hundred Percent (100%) of the construction cost over and above the maximum amount provided by the State of Ohio, Department of Transportation to satisfactorily complete the proposed project and become eligible for financial aid under the terms of the SRTS Program.

SECTION THREE: Upon completion of the described Project, and unless otherwise agreed, Beavercreek City Schools, Beavercreek Township, and Greene County shall: (1) provide adequate maintenance for the described Project in accordance with all applicable state and federal laws, including, but not limited to, 23 USC 116; (2) provide ample financial provisions, as necessary, for the maintenance of the described Project; (3) if necessary, maintain the right-of-way, keeping it free of obstructions; and (4) if necessary, hold said right-of-way inviolate for public highway purposes.
