SCHOOL CLOSINGS & DELAYS

Dear SHPS Parent/Guardian(s):

face the challenges of bad weather. Knowing the cancellation of school impacts many of our students and parents in different ways, I wanted to share some thoughts that may help you better understand how the decisions to delay or close school are made. Typically, the decision-making process begins the day and night before when weather alerts are received from the National Weather Service. Around 4:15 AM, our Transportation Supervisor, Ms. Walantyn, begins to communicate with neighboring transportation directors and driving our district's roads. If she determines there is a possibility of a school closing or delay, she contacts me. At that time we review the latest weather announcements from the NWS, discuss weather conditions in neighboring areas, and continue to drive the roads in our district and review local conditions. Based on this information, I make the decision to hold school, close school or delay school. Our goal is to make the decision by 5:00 AM. Shortly after informing early morning employees, we begin to notify parents through local television and radio stations (WKZO,

WWMT, WOOD, WOTV) and via the district's parent alert

As you know, your child's safety is our primary concern and we would never knowingly make a decision that would place your child in danger, including snow day calls. I know from experience, weather conditions can be different throughout the community and we cannot travel every road. Weather conditions can also change dramatically between 5:00 AM and the start of school. Therefore keep in mind, that ultimately it is your decision whether or not to permit your child to come to school. Students who walk as opposed to riding a bus may face different challenges associated with coming to school. I also encourage parents of inexperienced student drivers to take into consideration their individual student's driving ability while assessing weather conditions. It is also your right, if you are uncomfortable with the weather conditions during the day, to communicate with your school's office staff and make the necessary arrangements to pick up your child. I understand that there may be guestions regarding the decisions. Once again, your child's safety is my highest priority on inclement weather days.

NEW BUS COMMUNICATION

To reduce confusion, South Haven Public Schools is instituting a new communication system for identifying buses. Instead of referring to your child's bus by route or number, each rider will be assigned to an animal. When a cancellation occurs, the notification will state the specific animal, ex: The Owl Bus.

Assignments will be communicated to families via email, text message, and in the mail to the address on file.

We appreciate your patience and flexibility as we've navigated bus shortages and cancelations. We hope that with these changes, we can better serve you when issues occur.

MG Maple Syrup Project (YAC) - Tera Crichton

Second graders at Maple Grove Elementary are



looking forward to their Maple Sugaring Project, funded by a 2022-23 YAC Grant! Mrs. Crichton will facilitate maple tree identification, tapping the trees, and assisting the students in the process of creating maple syrup from sap. The students will take home a sampling of their very own Maple Grove Maple Syrup, and the classrooms will celebrate with a maple syrup treat at the end of the season.

Student Self Care Items - Tanya Williams

Basic self care items are important tools in building confidence and feeling good about oneself. At North Shore Elementary, through the generous donation of the South Haven Public Schools Foundation, they will have just that with products including but not limited to, deodorant, maxi pads and tampons, shampoo and conditioner, toothbrushes and toothpaste, Chapstick, soap, hair ties, brushes, and floss. With access to daily hygiene items, students' self-esteem can be positively impacted.

Year Round Folklorsco - Carey Frost

Funding from this Foundation grant will be used to establish a year-round Folklorico Club for South Haven Middle and High School Students. Baile Folklorico is a term for traditional, regional dances from Mexico, the Southwestern United States, and Central America that emphasize local culture with ballet characteristics and elaborate outfits, such as brightly colored ruffled skirts trimmed with ribbons for women and wide-brimmed hats for men (Wikipedia, 2022). The club will be overseen by SHPS' bilingual liaisons but students will manage choreography along with parent volunteers. The group will be invited to perform at school functions, specifically during the fall and spring Noche de Familia in October and May.

Cafe Library Reading - Sandy Kluskowski

CAFE is a system used to teach reading strategies to students. In this grant from the Foundation, Lincoln Elementary was able to purchase books for the teacher CAFE resource center that will supplement the mini lessons created to support the strategies.

Art Showcase Project (Foundation & YAC) - Tanya Ebert

Funds from this grant will go directly towards helping students see magic in not only their own artwork but the artwork of their peers. A showcase for three dimensional student art will be installed at Maple Grove Elementary. This is important because students are inspired by other student artwork, and because it is a chance for students to feel that their art is valuable and important when it is on display.

<u> Art Room Tools & Equipment - Colleen Anastacio</u>

Exciting times are in store for Baseline Middle School Art Students as they enter into the Nature Art project. Students will use found materials such as branches, stones, etc. to create artworks based on natural artists such as Andy Goldsworthy. With this grant, they will have access to hand-operated and electronic tools, opening up new possibilities for building sculptures and perfecting their skills.

Money Pencil Boxes - Heidi Rupley

A new system was implemented for Lincoln's second graders to enhance life skills such as counting currency. Pencil boxes, purchased with funds from the Foundation, will help learners organize not only their supplies, but plastic money. Additionally, second grade classroom libraries got a kid-friendly update with new book bins which will be used to spread the books and organize them by genre, author, and subject.

Flexible Seating - Matt Diaz

Mr. Diaz and his kindergarten class at Lincoln Elementary were awarded a grant for flexible seating! Five rainbow stools, ten portable lap desks, six foam butterfly stools, and bean bag chair peanuts were purchased and added to the classroom layout. Students have enjoyed the flexibility to move around the classroom and learn in various ways.

Hands on Learning with Osmo - Angela Williamson

With the grant from the SHPS Foundation, Mrs. Williamson's students received Osmos which they use daily during independent work time. An Osmo is an attachment for an iPad that allows students to engage in hands-on educational learning games. The Osmo's Little Genius activities can be differentiated so students are learning and working at their own level. The engaging activities help kids to work on letters, sounds, making words, and math concepts like adding, subtracting, and comparing numbers.

Bins - Susan Meyer

The second grade at Lincoln Elementary received a grant for book tubs to help organize classroom libraries. The restructuring will make books easier to find for children.

Special Education Reading at Baseline - Jessica Klaver

Ms. Klaver's classroom will be voting on additional books that students would like to see purchased for their library with the Foundation grant funds. If additional funds are left over, school supplies such as pencils, erasers, lead, science equipment kits, and hands-on activities will be purchased.

Garden at Baseline - Lotte Resek

The Baseline Learning Garden is being used to support seventh grade science curriculum and as an extracurricular activity for interested students. The money received from the South Haven Public Schools Foundation will be used to create a better watering system for the garden as well as purchase tools and materials to amend the existing soil.



Emergent Readers Books - Mary Wilcox

It's important that students have books available at their specific reading levels so they can practice their decoding skills. When students are beginning to read and the books are well above their level, students are often lost in the excess words and structure. Through this grant, books in levels Guided Reading B-E have been purchased and will be used by students in their independent reading tubs as well as in small group work.

Spotlight Wall - History - Melissa Valenti-Stibal

Each week in Mrs. Stibal's class, students learn about a different notable person from their "Notable Person Wall." They set special time apart to learn about very important people that may be unfamiliar, but have made amazing contributions. Due to the generous support of the Foundation, they were able to purchase fifty-one books from a local bookstore in order to help support their research and build excitement surrounding these extraordinary people.

Storywalk Trail - Jennifer Robinson

What better way to incorporate nature and a good book than a Storywalk? With the funding from this grant, students at North Shore Elementary will have the opportunity to enjoy the trails around their school while also engaging with reading. Throughout the predetermined walk, pages from a book will be posted for participants to stop and read along the way. Students will travel from one page to the next, captivated by a great read and beautiful scenery at the same time!

On Saturday, January 21st, two members of the South Haven Middle School Band traveled to Grand Rapids where they performed with the prestigious All State Band in DeVos Hall! To be selected for the All State Band, Trish (clarinet) and Lariah (bass clarinet) prepared an announced etude, a series of scales, and sight-read during a 10 minute recorded audition. Each audition was then submitted using only an identification number with no reference to the student or school. The auditions were evaluated by an adjudicator and placed in order. The required number of instruments were selected to fill each section. An average of 2,500 students audition each year for the 400 seats in five ensembles. For two students from South Haven to be accepted is a huge honor and we couldn't be more proud of these two talented musicians.
