



Dear North Lyon County School Families,

As many of you know the USD 251 North Lyon County Board of Education has initiated a school facilities study to begin this month. The final facilities report will be completed in April 2023. The purpose of the study is to provide USD 251 with up-todate population trends, enrollment trends, and future enrollment estimates. In addition, the study will contain information pertaining to classroom utilization, student capacity of buildings, and strengths and weaknesses of buildings. Specifically, this study will provide the school district and our communities with relevant information to assist our school district in reaching good decisions about the school building repairs and updates as well as the education program we provide to students in the future. Most importantly, the information will guide future decision making to ensure that students are provided with the most effective and efficient education in the 21st century. This is a good common-sense practice for schools to engage in periodically in order to provide information needed for long range planning purposes. Dr. G. Kent Stewart of Manhattan, Kansas will conduct the study. Dr. Stewart is a retired professor of Education at Kansas State University with over 50 years of experience as a consultant to school boards and communities on school facility issues. He has conducted many similar studies in Kansas and other states.

Currently, the Board of Education is engaged in a process of selecting patrons to serve on the USD 251 North Lyon County Strategic Planning Committee. The goal is to appoint a group of patrons that will be a representative cross section of our entire school district's citizens. The board will be reaching out to each of our communities governing bodies to nominate one person each. Additionally, the board will appoint 9 additional committee members bringing the total Strategic Planning Committee to 13 members. The membership of the committee will be finalized by March 2023. We are anticipating that the study will be completed in April 2023. Upon completion, the study will be received by the board and immediately released to the public for review prior to the first Strategic Planning Committee meeting in the summer of 2023. The committee will be assigned with the following tasks:

- Review the school facilities study, which is currently scheduled to be completed from January through April 2023. The purpose of the study is to provide USD 251 with up-to-date population trends, enrollment trends for the past decade, and future enrollment estimates. Furthermore, the study will contain information pertaining to classroom utilization, student capacity of buildings and their strengths and weaknesses. Specifically, the facilities study provides the board and our patrons with information necessary to utilize our school facilities effectively and efficiently for teaching and learning in today's world. The information will also serve to assist in defining and prioritizing building repairs and updates that may be needed in the future.
- Engage in long-term strategic planning for 21st century schools by reviewing USD 251's four strategic directions adopted by the board in early 2022. Those areas are: 1) Improving student achievement, 2) recruiting, developing, and retaining quality staff, 3) Engaging and involving all district stakeholders, 4) Managing the school district's budget & resources effectively and engaging the community in researching potential solutions for school district facilities.

It is important to understand that this ad hoc committee could potentially meet over a long period of time if necessary. After the committee has studied all of the relevant information pertaining to the facilities study and the four strategic directions of the school district, the committee will be asked to provide feedback to the USD 251 Board of Education.

We are currently anticipating the following timeline:

January 2023: USD 251 Facility Study begins.

February/March 2023: USD 251 Board of Education appoints Strategic Planning Committee.

April 2023: Facility Study completed and made available to the USD 251 Board of Education and the general public.

May/June 2023: Strategic Planning Committee begins meeting on a regular ongoing basis.


FFA / FCCLA

Attendance in School Matters!

The mission of North Lyon County USD 251 is to prepare all students for a successful future and to be productive members of society.

The first step in that process is for your child to attend school regularly.

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and in life.

We realize some absences are unavoidable due to health problems or other circumstances. But, we also know that when students miss too much school— regardless of the reason – it can cause them to fall behind academically. Your child is less likely to succeed if he or she is chronically absent—which means missing 18 or more days over the course of an entire school year.

Did you know...?

Of children with good attendance in Kindergarten and first grade, 64% were proficient readers by third grade, while only 17% of students with poor attendance were reading on grade level.

By 6th grade, chronic absence is a proven early warning sign for students at risk of dropping out of school.

By 9th grade, good attendance can predict graduation rates even better than 8th grade test scores.

Absences can add up quickly. A child is considered chronically absent if he or she misses just two days every month.

We don't want your child to fall behind in school and get discouraged. Please ensure that your child attends school every day and arrives on time.

Here are a few practical tips to help support regular attendance:

- Make sure your children keep a regular bedtime and establish a morning routine.
- Lay out clothes and pack backpacks the night before.
- Ensure your children go to school every day unless they are truly sick.
- Avoid scheduling vacations or doctor's appointments when school is in session.
- Talk to teachers and counselors for advice if your children feel anxious about going to school.
- Develop backup plans for getting to school if something comes up. Call on a family member, neighbor, or another parent to take your child to school.
