#### Superintendent's Message

Dear North Lyon County School Community,

The USD 251 Site Council has devoted time at their January and February meetings working on the building needs assessments for both NLC Elementary School and Northern Heights High School. The Needs Assessment drafts and site council recommendations will be presented to the USD 251 Board of Education at a future board meeting. Building needs assessments in Kansas are required by Kansas statute and include important questions to monitor the data and progress of each building with regard to curriculum, staffing, facility needs, student needs, staff needs, family needs, and school work to achieve the State Board of Education Outcomes/Educational Capacities. These needs assessments will be utilized by the Board of Education when approving the annual budget for the 2023-2024 school year. The Site Council has been very thorough and thoughtful in their discussions as well as providing the school with valuable advice.

Recently the USD 251 Board of Education has been discussing the implementation of a weights program at the NLC Junior High. Currently there is not a weight room or any opportunities for the junior high students to engage in weightlifting at the junior high level. This places our students at a significant disadvantage as they begin competing in junior high and high school athletics. This spring, we will begin converting the metal storage building located next to the NLC gym into a weight room where junior high students will have the added opportunities for summer weights and weights classes beginning in the 2023-2024 school year.

In February, our school district submitted our Kansas Pre-school Pilot (KPP) grant application. When we opened the Early Learning Center in August 2022, our district utilized this \$107,280 competitive grant to assist in the start-up of the four-year-old preschool program. The bulk of this grant money was utilized to purchase the furniture, curriculum, lockers, and other learning materials. In addition, it provided some reimbursement for teacher aide salaries, and a portion of the transportation and maintenance costs. We have applied for the same amount of grant money again, although we may not receive the entire amount for the second year. In addition to the grant funding, the program generated about \$103,000 in additional funding from KSDE based on the total number of qualifying students and weightings. In the future, the program should continue to receive the additional state funding to make it self-sustaining. Furthermore, our district is very appreciate of the Walter S. and Evan C. Jones Trust grant that provided a significant amount of the funding to remodel the building for the Early Learning Center. This program is already providing great promise in student learning achievement and kindergarten readiness for USD 251.

The USD 251 District Leadership Team (DLT) is continuing to meet on an on-going basis to select our two school district goals for the next five years from 2022 until 2027. The goal selection is a part of the Kansas Education Systems Accreditation (KESA) school accreditation process. All USD 251 teachers participated in a needs assessment process by analyzing all school district data in October 2022. The DLT has utilized the needs assessment results and additional data narrowing down the number of possible goals to improve student achievement and success. The goal setting process will be completed by the March 29<sup>th</sup> Outside Visitation Team visit to work with our DLT in supporting our five-year accreditation efforts.

The facilities study commissioned by the USD 251 Board of Education began in January, and it is currently on track to be completed in April. This study will provide our district and our communities with valuable information to assist with long term strategic planning.

I continually have opportunities to visit with patrons about the advantages of living in our family-friendly communities located in USD 251. Our school district's desire to serve our families and maintain the traditional values of our communities is a great advantage for our school district and communities. In the past year our school district has partnered with Admire to repair the baseball field lights and Americus to assist in acquisition of baseball scoreboards. In the near future, our district will be partnering with Allen to assist with softball field restroom/concession stand improvements. In the future, our district will continue to work with our communities, businesses, and churches to find additional ways to partner together. Also, I would like to thank the several parents and patrons that have recently told me that they are praying for our students and staff.







#### How much screen time is too much?


According to the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry, side effects of too much screen time include:

- Sleeping problems
- Poor self-image
- Reading fewer books
- Spending less time
- Lower grades
- Struggling to maintain a moderate weight
- Mood or attention disorders

The more time children spend on social media, gaming, and TV, the less connected they feel to others. There is a direct link between screens and behavior. The exciting nature of screen time can trigger the release of dopamine, a feel-good neurotransmitter that makes us associate screen with pleasure and therefore something we want to spend more time with. All screen content is intended to capture your attention, some products like video games appeal to that dopamine rush. A paper published in the Journal Pediatrics, found that children who use screen time more than recommended were more likely to act impulsively and make poorer decisions.

#### Tips to reduce daily screen time:

- Restrict access to devices especially before bedtime
- Use family meals and car rides as no screen zones
- Set an example and reduce your own screen time
- Spend time playing board games or puzzles



#### With state assessments starting March 20, here is information for our students.

#### **Kansas Summative Assessment Program for 2022-2023**

Students across Kansas will be tested in the following subjects between March 20th to April 28th:

- English Language Arts (ELA) Grades 3-8 and 10
- Mathematics Grades 3-8 and 10
- Science Grades 5, 8, and 11
- History, Government, and Social Studies (HGSS) Grades 4, 7, and either 10, 11, or 12 (Done in class)

#### What will the test look like this year?

Students in each grade level will complete two separate computer-based sessions for each of the ELA, Math, and Science assessments. Students will provide answers to multiple choice and technology enhanced questions. The HGSS assessment is a classroom-based assessment that students in applicable grade levels will complete with their Social Sciences / Social Studies teachers during the year.

#### What can I do to help my child(ren) maximize their effort on the Kansas Summative Assessments?

There are a number of ways to help your child maximize performance on the Kansas Summative Assessments. Families can help their children most by knowing when these assessments will take place using the schedule provided by the school. Additionally, starting the day with a nourishing breakfast and ensuring they get plenty of rest the night before definitely helps. If your child is not feeling well during their scheduled assessment day, we will have an opportunity to provide a make-up date and time.

#### **Anticipated Results**

Students and families should be able to review their results prior to the end of the school year. Schools will let families know when this information is available. In addition to Kansas Summative Assessment results, 8th and 10th grade students will see an ACT predictive measure added to their child's assessment report. This measure predicts a likely range of ACT scores based on how the student performed on the Kansas Summative Assessment.


#### Northern Heights Student receives RUDD Foundation Scholarship.
