District Performance

- □ In 2016 students were administered ACT Aspire for first time.
- ☐ In 2018 ACT Aspire was administered for third consecutive year. Districtwide, we showed 2% growth overall. Some grade cohort groups made significant growth. Unfortunately, some cohort lost ground. Three years' data are guiding plans. Weaknesses are being addressed.

District Performance

- Arkansas Department of Education did not assign A-F grades for the district as a whole.
- ESEA Data Showed the Following:
 - 99% of Students Tested
 - 66% of students are "Ready" or "Exceeding" in Language Arts as measured by ACT Aspire.
 - 30% of students are "Ready" or "Exceeding" in Mathematics.
 - The Achievement Gap remains at about 13%.
 - (Both ELA and Math are below state averages overall, though there are some grades that performed at or above state averages.)
 - 91.63% graduated over a three year period.

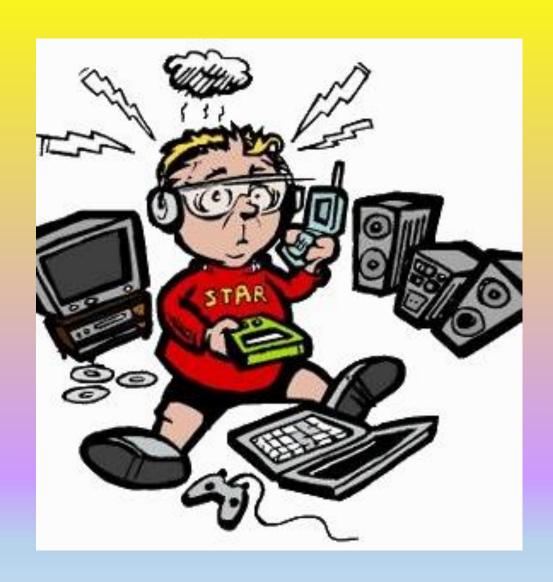

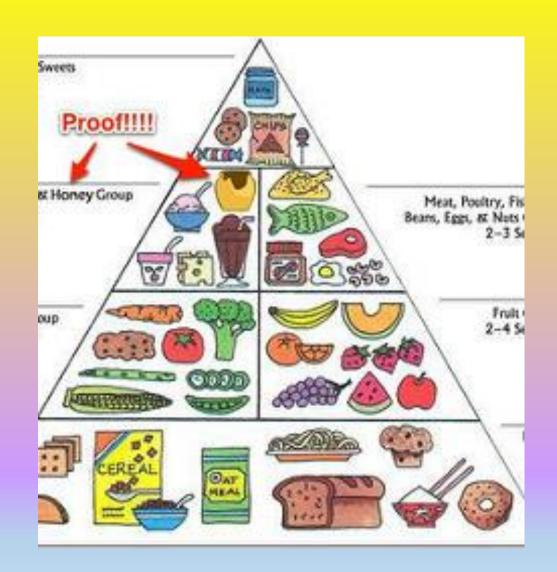

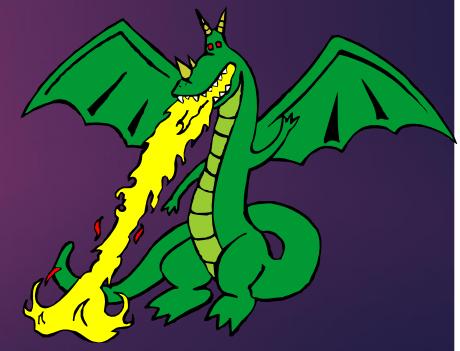
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Junction City Gifted and Talented

Report to the Public October 2018



General Information

Gifted and Talented youth are those of high potential or ability. Possession of these talents and gifts will be addressed and needs of these students met in Junction City School District.

Teachers and Administrator in the Gifted and Talented program have presented at state and local trainings. The Junction City School District staff is trained each year on the characteristics of gifted and talented and on how to differentiate instruction to best meet their needs.

Student Program Options

- ► K-3 Whole Group Enrichment
- ▶ 4-6 Resource Room
- ▶ 7-12 Pre AP courses offered in English , Math, Social Studies, Biology
- ▶ 7-12 AP courses offered in English, US History, Math, Biology
- Distance Learning Lab

Identification

- Includes seeking nominations from teachers, parents, peers, and community members. Nomination forms are on the school website. Formal identification begins at the end of third grade.
- A notice is sent home to parents for permission to test after a student is nominated and to seek information on the student from teachers and school records.
- Selection is made through a Blind Screening process done by an identification committee.
- Identification committee is made up of GT Coordinator, building principal, guidance counselor, and at least 2 classroom teachers.
- Students selected by the committee are included in the GT program with parent permission.
- ▶ Students not chosen have a notice of strengths sent to the teacher for differentiation in the regular classroom. Parents are notified.

Goals and Objectives for Gifted Education

- Students participating in the program will meet or exceed State Academic Content Standards.
- Students should have opportunities to interact with peers with common abilities, talents, and interests.
- ► Teachers should provide opportunities for students to demonstrate what they know and are able to do, particularly in their area(s) of giftedness.
- ▶ The program will be open to any student meeting the identification criteria.
- Updated brochure and handbook is available on the school website. A printed copy is available on request.
- ► An IEP will be written for all elementary identified GT students to encourage differentiation in the regular classroom.

GT Budget and General Information

- We have a total of 59 students identified at this time. Identified students are from the 4-12 grade. Student demographic percentages represent the demographic makeup of Junction City School District.
- We have purchased a chromebook cart for elementary campus and high school campus. Other options for technology for our students are being explored.
- ▶ GT Administrator and/or Teacher will attend AGATE conference in the winter.
- Lisa Burton Tarver from SAAC is coming to work with our Resource students on photography and technology.
- Money is allocated to GT budget based on a multiplier supplied by ADE. Money will be spent for technology, field trips, professional development, and Quiz Bowl. Additional materials and supplies may be purchased as needed for GT classes, Pre AP, and AP as approved by GT Coordinator and Superintendent.

Program Evaluation

- ▶ Junction City GT Program was evaluated by ADE during the 2015-16 school year and were found to meet all standards of the program. We will be evaluated on site again in 2021.
- Stakeholders overall are pleased with the program.

Parents and students are overall pleased with the GT program overall but would like to see more opportunities for competition and more educational opportunities in the Arts. Parents and students alike are pleased that we have a GT website. Stakeholders are happy that we are one-on-one for Chrome books in our district which gives our students greater opportunity for technology in the classroom. Parents are pleased that a trip to Washington D.C. is offered every other year for high school students. This report is disseminated to the administration, the board, parents, students, and community members.
