


heart disease and stroke. Our school district is supporting the American Heart Association once again by raising funds for the cause.

Dismissal Time is 4:07

Parents, please note the elementary dismissal time in Huron Valley is 4:07pm. At Kurtz, we have been starting to release students before that 4:07 time in response to some of the pandemic-related obstacles that we have experienced over the last few years. As this is no longer the case, we will be starting the dismissal process at 4:07, in order to be consistent with district and state expectations.

You may know that our calendar and bell schedule are based on actual "seat" time students are in school. This time is set to meet our 180 student days and 1098 hours needed for us to receive our state aid. Having students line up in hallways, leave for buses, or dismiss prior to 4:07 pm would mean that we would be out of compliance.

Starting this Monday, February 6, walkers and the first bus will be called at 4:07. Our dismissal crew will also start calling names for car riders at 4:07, as well.

I would like to remind parents that instruction takes place between 9:15am and 4:07pm each day. We ask that parents refrain from early pick-ups as they create unnecessary distractions in the learning environment. We understand that things happen that must be a priority for you and your family, but we greatly

appreciate it when parents do not schedule events that would require early pickups. If you do have to pick up early, please do not call expecting your child(ren) to be called down to the office. Students are called down when parents arrive. Thank you for your attention to these important dismissal time details.



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
Pick Up and Drop Off

We are very proud of the pickup and drop-off processes we have in place at Kurtz. We work hard to make this daily routine safe and effective. There are Kurtz staff members assigned to ensuring our systems work effectively, while still making sure to use the time to connect with students and provide support when and if support is needed. We assure you that our system works and is most effective when visitors follow our plan. We are always focused on getting you in and out of the parking lot as quickly as possible. Visitors can help us make pick-up and drop-off times flow best by not parking on the curb during pick-up and drop-off times.

- Mind the 15 MPH speed limit on Kurtz Drive.
- Vehicles should be pulling all the way up and quickly getting child(ren) in and out of the car. Please do not get out and help children in or out of the vehicle.

- Utilize pick-up and drop-off Kurtz staff or park if your child requires extra support.
- Visitors should never pass in the left lane of the loop because it is not safe for our students and could (and has) resulted in damage to

vehicles, adding unnecessary stress on individuals. We feel strongly that passing really only has the potential to save a few sec-



please park in a designate parking space. Kurtz staff members park in the back of the lot in order to make it as easy as possible for parents to find a parking space in our small parking lot. Al-

so, students should never be walking through the parking lot without an adult. Parents, please observe the posted speed limit sign on Kurtz Drive.

We ask parents to respect

our neighbors and never block driveways when you are picking up or dropping off. We have also been contacted by our neighbors at the Document Store to ask parents not to use their parking lot as a pick-up space.

Parents are not to escort their child(ren) to their classrooms for

various health and safety reasons. Teachers meet their students outside each morning to start the day in a positive and personal manner.
