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English Language Learners are a Focus at Kurtz

During the 22-23 school year, first grade teacher, Kalie Zimmerman, and EL teacher, Alyssa Hathaway, participated in the Oakland Schools Leading for ELs (English Learners) Professional Learning Series. They participated in collaborative learning about the impact that co-planning, coteaching, and co-assessing can have on the success of multilingual learners.

An Oakland Schools partner, Christy Osborne, visited to observe this culminating lesson focused on letter/sound blends and academic language in a structured literacy block. All students actively engaged in whole group instruction. English learners were then supported in a small group, with additional explicit descriptions of vocabulary words and practice with letter sounds, with the EL teacher.

Cheers to an exemplary display of intentional collaborative teaching, coupled with push-in EL support to ensure these first graders can all be successful with grade level content and goals!

End of the Day Pick-Ups

The weather has finally started to clear up and sunny days are here for families to enjoy together. Springtime also brings added activities and appointments. Your Kurtz team works hard every day to ensure that teaching/ learning time is maximized.

Parents, please remember that classroom instruction takes place until 4:10. When students are picked up early, everything going on in the classroom stops. Attention is shifted from teaching and learning to the child that is being picked up. In the lower grades, teachers often have to help children pack up their belongings. In the upper grades, the attention is often awkward for the child being pulled. Although more independent, our students still often require support and/or attention packing up and or/taking work home.

We all understand that early pulls are sometimes unavoidable, but we are asking, for many reasons, that parents do their best to avoid early pick-ups, whenever possible. It is also important to note that an early pick -up designation is put into Skyward similar to a "tardy" designation that would be entered if a child comes in late for school.



Checking in at End of the Year Events

We are reminding parents and visitors to Kurtz that entry to the building must be made at the office door. All visitors must show ID and sign in to have access to the building. It is very easy to forget this when you are visiting for outdoor events, but please remember to support this safe and secure protocol when you are visiting, especially when you are on site for outdoor events.

It is easy to forget when your are visiting for an outdoor activity and try to follow your child back into the building, but visitors without a visitor badge will be escorted back to the office to check in. Following this protocol will help the Kurtz staff to ensure that all visitors have been appropriately vetted and are supposed to be on site. Thank you in advance for working with the Kurtz team to ensure the safety and security of our staff and students.

Summer is Coming...

With the summer months just around the corner, there are a few things the staff at Kurtz would love for parents to think about in order to increase the success students will experience in the 2023-24 school year. First and foremost, maintaining routines over the summer can help young learners when they reintegrate in the new school year. When things are more predictable and familiar, students often struggle less and transition into their new classes more smoothly.

We strongly suggest making sure students are spending time weekly, if not daily, reading. Parents are encouraged to make the local library a regular stop on the summer schedule. Students who are spending (at least) twenty minutes a day are going to be better prepared to tackle all subjects in the fall. It should also be noted that there are significant gains that are made when students participate in this expectation over their entire academic career. Parents are encouraged to also engage with their young readers by asking big picture questions to kids like who are the characters, what is the setting, what is the plot, etc. These great literacy components will help students to grow as readers and as thinkers. It also provides parents with opportunities to show their own interests and engagement in literacy.

Limiting the technology will have so many positive benefits for both the child and for the family dynamic. In this day and age, elementary-aged students are exhibiting tendencies that are very similar to textbook addiction. Our team members are noticing increases in anxiety and frustration in the classroom setting, as well as in social interactions. Conversely, overusing technology also has a very negative impact on the stamina students are developing in the classroom setting. Our team recommends limiting technology and closely monitoring devices when students are engaged with them.


Furthermore, we are noticing increases in students with cell phones and/or smart watches that give parents unlimited and immediate access to students while they are at school. We are concerned about students who become overly engaged with their devices as they are always (intentionally or not) waiting for the next notification and opportunity to connect with their parent when they are not at home.

Also, we suggest ending device use approximately two hours before bedtime as there is a great deal of brain research that references the impact that blue light and over-stimulation has on the sleep patterns of school-aged kids.

Lastly, we recommend parents look into incorporating <u>Summer</u> <u>Bridge Activities</u> workbooks to keep students on track over the summer. The workbooks are offered by grade level and contain great review materials of the content they just learned during the school year. They also provide a bridge between the grade just completed and the new grade starting in the coming school year. These workbooks can be found online at sites like Amazon.

Summer Bridge Activities workbooks have quick and easy assignments that are connected to curriculum standards. This tool is a great resource to help children battle "summer slide" and maintain the learning growth they have worked so hard to build during the school year. As mentioned, routines are very important to maintain over the summer. These activities are short and are great to use as the work that needs to be completed, in order to earn time on technology or high interest rewards.

As parents ourselves, these ideas are things we highly suggest as we see the positive outcomes with our students and even with some of our own children.

Pick Up and Drop Off

We are very proud of the pickup and drop-off processes we have in place at Kurtz. We work hard to make this daily routine safe and effective. There are Kurtz staff members assigned to ensuring our systems work effectively, while still making sure to use the time to connect with students and provide support when and if support is needed. We assure you that our system works and is most effective when visitors follow our plan. We are always focused on getting you in and out of the parking lot as quickly as possible. Visitors can help us make pick-up and drop-off times flow best by not parking on the curb during pick-up and drop-off times.

- Mind the 15 MPH speed limit on Kurtz Drive.
- Vehicles should be pulling all the way up and quickly getting child(ren) in and out of the car. Please do not get out and help children in or out of the vehicle.

- Utilize pick-up and drop-off Kurtz staff or park if your child requires extra support.
- Visitors should never pass in the left lane of the loop because it is not safe for our students and could (and has) resulted in damage to

vehicles, adding unnecessary stress on individuals. We feel strongly that passing really only has the potential to save a few sec-

onds on your commute and strongly expect you not to do it.

 If you are planning to park, please park in a designate parking space. Kurtz staff members park in the back of the lot in order to make it as easy as possible for parents to find a parking space in our small parking lot. Also, students should never be walking through the parking lot without an adult. Parents, please observe the posted speed limit sign on Kurtz Drive.

 We ask parents to respect our neighbors and nev-

our neighbors and never block driveways when you are picking up or dropping off. We have also been contacted by our neighbors at the Document Store to ask parents not to use their parking lot as a pick-up space.

Parents are not to escort their child(ren) to their classrooms for

various health and safety reasons. Teachers meet their students outside each morning to start the day in a positive and personal manner. Your participation in this process is both expected and appreciated. Please feel free to share ideas and suggestions in writing with me, Mr. Chisik, at your earliest conven-
