#### **BUILDING PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:**

### **Student Highlights:**

- Open House was a fun night, but not as highly attended as in previous years.
- Holding Open House and orientations prior to the first day of school provided plenty of time for the guidance office to respond to questions and tweak schedules. As a result, the opening day (and week) went amazingly smoothly with very few students needing last minute adjustments to their schedules.
- CCS is working with CCE 4-H After School to offer our older students an "Internet Cafe" option after school as an alternative to ASP.
- Students have been provided the STOP!t app for the purpose of anonymous reporting. So far this has been a successful way to reach out to students in need and to address incidents that would have otherwise gone undetected.

### **Administrative Highlights:**

- Principals are recertified to perform evaluations for teacher APPRs.
- Administrators attended ESSA training to learn how school accountability will be measured for the foreseeable future. This information was shared with teachers at the first faculty meeting.
- A portion of the opening day for all staff was a focus on cultural awareness.
- Fall fire drills will be done next week.

## **BOE Goal #1:** To provide a complete educational experience for CCS students.

- Students in grades 6, 8, 10 and 12 will be completing the Prevention Needs Survey this year.
- College Week is October 15-19. There will be many activities happening throughout the school including classroom presentations by our counselors, college visits, guest speakers among other things.

### **BOE Goal #2:** To continue to lead in technology integration

- CCS was very well represented at the annual Teacher Tech Fair, both as attendees and as presenters.
- Student devices are being deployed at the highest rate possible without going so fast that students who aren't ready would receive them in haste.
- The staff, representing many stakeholder groups, are doing a great job with CCS branding. Our social media presence has increased and has become very uplifting and positive.
- Nearly 100% of students have opted to take home their devices. It will very likely be 100% in days to come.
- We are reaching the final stages of security upgrades, including cameras and access to exterior doors, with anticipated training to happen before the end of September.

# **BOE Goal #3:** To maintain a positive working relationship with all employees.

• This year's "welcome back" address focused on our CCS family and what we all can do to do to make it easier to help each other. The new "pineapple chart" has gotten off to a great start.

- Arrangements were made so any staff member who wished to attend calling hours could do so without worrying about the Superintendent's Day agenda.
- What has become the annual first day pot luck luncheon was wildly successful with most staff participating.
- Early dismissal days are being planned with at least one of them remaining unstructured so teachers can work on a "passion project."

#### PK – 5 ELEMENTARY PRINCIPAL'S REPORT:

**BOE Goal #1** To Provide a Complete Educational Experience for CCS Students

- The 4-H Afterschool Program began on September 5<sup>th</sup> with 54 total students registered. Students are able to participate in activities both before and after school.
- Response to Intervention (RTI) screenings and data chats for grades K 3
  have taken place. Students performing below the benchmark in targeted
  areas have been scheduled for academic intervention, which will begin on
  September 18th. Preliminary data points to the success of curriculum
  alignment and summer programs.
- K-5 wide behavior expectations were shared with all K-5 students as they
  rotated through various locations on the first day of school during a First
  Day Kick Off.
- Programming especially designed for students based on the NYS 3-8 test scores has been implemented in grades 3-5. AIS Services are scheduled consistent with NYS adjusted cut scores, and high achieving students are scheduled in enrichment programs.
- The Summer Reading Challenge "It's a Mystery!" was a great success! Twenty -one students read 1,000 minutes or more, and a total of thirty - four students participated.
- Wee Knights are served breakfast each morning as part of their preschool program. Breakfast is served family style, with conversations revolving around manners, nutrition and the art of conversation included!

 Mrs. Harvey invited students and families interested in participating in 4th grade band to an Instrument Information Night. More than 10 families attended and learned ways to be successful in 4th grade band.

• Planning for this year's Family STEM Nights is in the works. We are hoping to host 4 family nights throughout the school year.

- Mr. Connell and Mr. Luther have been attending windmill meetings. The next meeting is September 25<sup>th</sup>. Maple Ridge windmills are at the point where the money is going to have to be split. The Deer River Project talks are on what the payments will look like. We have learned that developers don't like to pay out in the beginning of a project due to costs still being encurred. It isn't advantageous for us to make all the money at the end. Continued conversations will take place.
